

Through our programs, people across Portland will embrace preservation and reuse as a key component in creating equitable, livable, and sustainable communities.




We make it easy to see Portland and learn about our history

EXHIBITS in our 4 gallery spaces on our city's development, architecture (lost and saved), and cultural history.


TALKS & EVENTS illuminating Portland history, heritage, architecture, and restoration how-to's.



Together with a citywide tour and lecture series, a major exhibit will utilize a massive wooden model of the City of Portland and convene leaders and plan for the future.










Architecture of Portland's Streetcar-Era Main Streets


ADVOCACY WATCH PSU Historic Residence Halls Black Stone & Montgomery Ct

- 200 units of Existing Housing
- Significant Architectural, cultural and women's History
- Major climate Impacts
- Un-necessary demo: PSU has existing land to build on now
- Both buildings eligible for national register designation. PSU is our largest landowner in downtown, what is their responsibility? (torn down 5 other historic buildings and parcels are still vacant)



ADVOCACY WATCH PSU Historic Residence Halls Black Stone & Montgomery Ct

- Appreciate Landmarks for your leadership and advocacy letter! 1,000 community members agree and have signed our online petition (more info & upcoming webinar on 6/18 here:visitahc.org/save-historic-psu-housing)
- Climate impact: Retaining the core and shell of these buildings would be a savings of 72 to 89% of carbon emissions vs. building new residential
- Combined for both buildings this is equivalent to:
 - 5 million pounds of coal burned
 - 1,084 gas powered passenger vehicles for a year
 - Energy use of 624 homes
- Response to PSU Cost Letter: still significantly cheaper to retrofit, they can still build new on other vacant parcels




Using data from the Carbon Leadership Forum (CLF), estimate retaining the core and shell of these buildings would be a savings of 72 to 89% of carbon emissions vs. building new residential on the same lot. More if including demolition waste.

ADVOCACY AHEAD

Top 3 Priorities

- 1. State Rehab Tax Credit: Commercial
 - a. 39 other states have this tool for adaptive reuse
 - b. Could help with housing conversions, seismic/URM's, energy upgrades
- Incentives & Financial Tools for
 Adaptive Density: Existing Residential
 - Density without demolition!
 - a. Need the package of tools: Technical assistance, low interest loans, fast track permitting, fee waivers, tax abatement



w-rise Storefront Commercial – Analysis Areas

ADVOCACY Top 3 Priorities

3. Streetcar-era Main Streets Conservation

- Portland's <u>undesignated</u> historic main street commercial centers are vulnerable without tools
- DOZA policy process identified priorities for additional work
- Mixed use Zoning Commercial Storefront Analysis has excellent mapping and research already for 13 areas.
- Related historic buildings inventories and/or character statements to leverage


