C.A.N. The Ride Share Winner!

CNN received a City of Portland Transportation grant to promote RideShare in CNN neighborhoods and business districts. William Warren was CNN's RideShare coordinator.

CAN residents took part in the RideShare program sponsored by PDOT, which divided the \$10,000 grant money with Madison South and Hollywood. The CAN winners will receive Road-side Kits. There were a total of 1,729 round trips made during the five months RideShare was in force. A thank you goes to Hollywood and Madison South for donating one each of the Roadside Kits to CAN winners. The awards will be presented at the October 13, meeting. CAN's share of the money will be used to purchase street signs to mark the CAN boundaries and main streets. We will be able to purchase signs with the \$3333.33. It will take a total of 76 to mark the boundaries.

Carbon Monoxide Silent Killer!



We will begin to close our homes for the Fall and Winter months. Running a vented dryer, without additional fresh air, can cause carbon monoxide to be drawn from your furnace and gas water heater into the laundry area, causing symptoms similar to the flu: dizziness, headache, and nausea, which can cause physical and mental damage and even death. Make sure there is enough fresh air for you as well as the furnace, dryer, or water heater. Install a CO detector to make sure. You can purchase them at any home improvement center.

N.E.T.



The Cully Neighborhood Emergency Team (NET) received their Chevron emergency kit in May. It has medical supplies needed during a disaster and pry bars and ax to help rescue people. We have the Staging area at Trinity Church playground set up, and now we just need the people. Seeing the recent article in the paper about the Nairobi bombing and the medical student stating "There are so many casualties, we didn't know who to attend to. We were so few, and the numbers of injured so large." That could very well happen in our neighborhood if we don't have enough volunteers trained. This is a very important issue, please consider being trained to help in an emergency. The next NET class will be held Jan 6, and 9, and the number to call is 823-1260 to register.

Concordia Farmers' Market

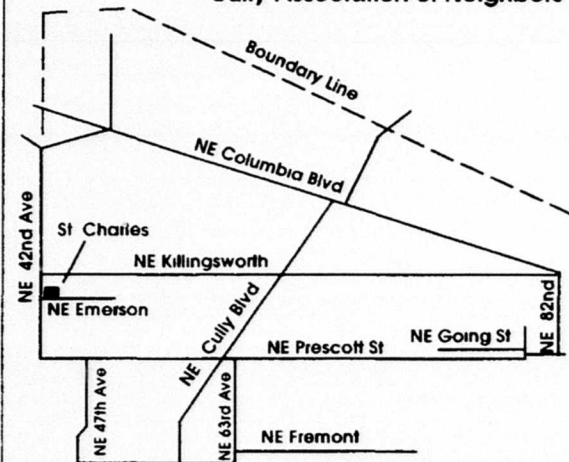

Non-emergency Number Changed

The non-emergency number has been changed, the new number is 823-3333. Calls to the old number (230-2121) will automatically be forwarded until sufficient time has passed to obtain a good level of public awareness.

The Bureau of Emergency Communications (BOEC) decided to change the number so the new number could be routed through the city switch and reduce overhead costs. You can dial the non-emergency number 24 hours a day for non-emergency police help. Using the non-emergency number keeps 9-1-1 available for true emergencies. 9-1-1 call takers receive the non-emergency calls, most frequently, the call is from someone wanting to report a crime which occurred a few hours, or even a few days, ago. Some examples of when you should call 823-3333 are:

- Your house or car was broken into yesterday
- You need to add additional items to the burglary report which you made last week
- Your car was stolen sometime overnight

For information on other police services, call the Police Information Line at 823-4636.

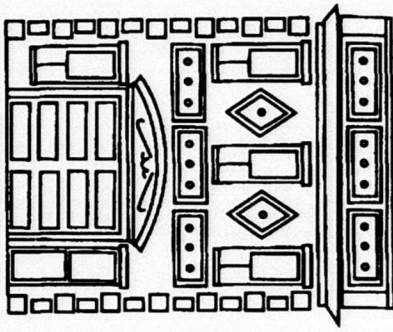

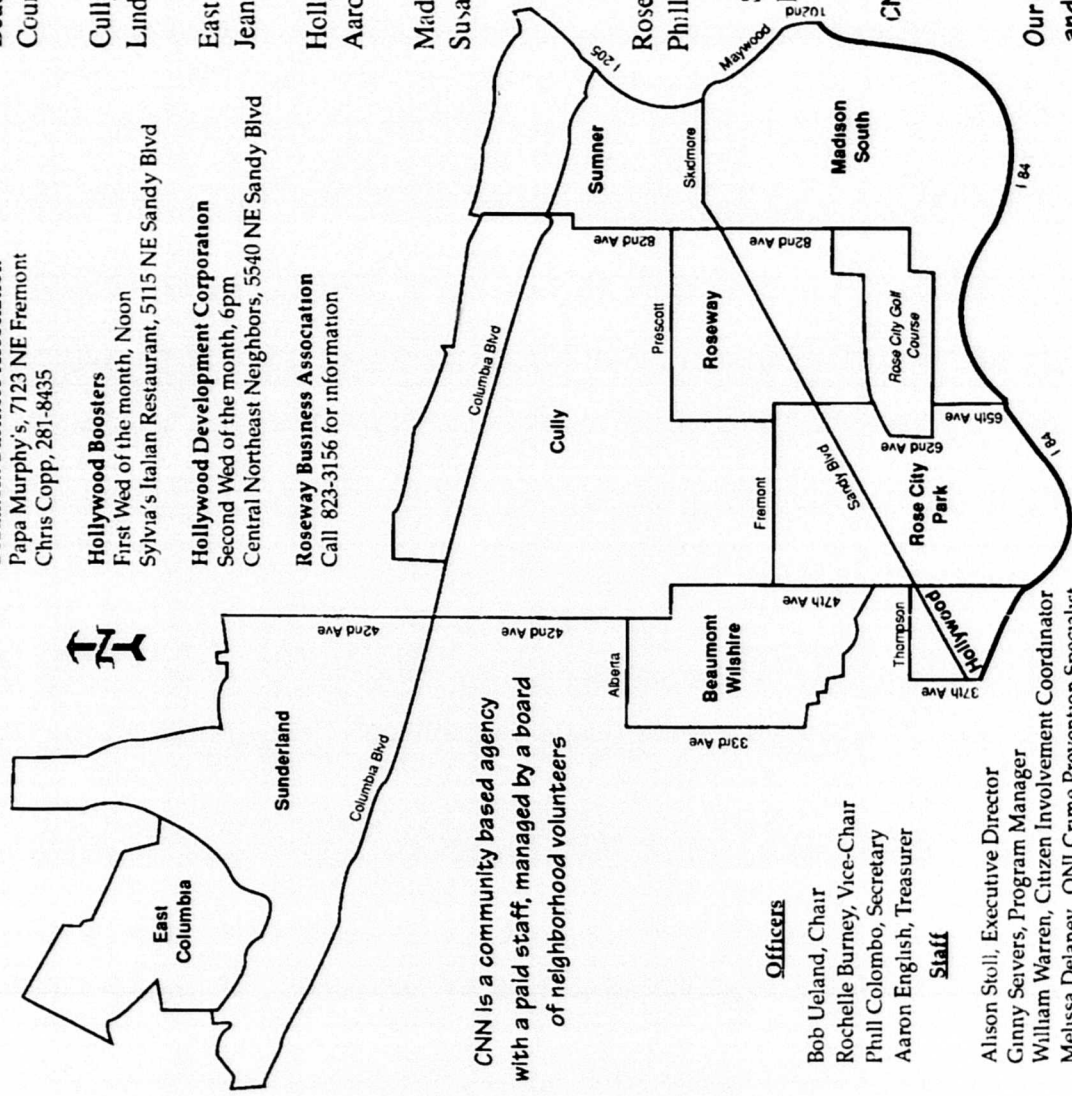

Re RideShare Report

Thank you for the opportunity to report on Central Northeast Neighbors, Inc's RideShare activities

The success of the one-year grant from August 1997 to August 1998 is enjoyed by many. Congratulations go to the Oregon Department of Transportation, the City of Portland's Bureau of Traffic, most particularly Ms. Francie Royce, our primary contact. This spotlight of success is all the more glowing considering the participation of the principal partners with Central Northeast Neighbors, the Cully Association of Neighbors, Madison South Neighborhood Association and the Hollywood partners which included the Hollywood Neighborhood Association, the Hollywood Boosters, the Hollywood Senior Center, and the Hollywood Theater.

In a true spirit of collaboration, let me stress that the Hollywood-based organizations pooled their points to create an opportunity that benefits their community. And that collaborative spirit extended to three groups (Cully, Madison, and Hollywood). They all agreed to split the 10,000 RideShare points evenly at 3,333.33 each, given that they had surpassed their individual organization's target goal of 1,000 points. The greater Hollywood community agreed to work together to promote their street banners. Cully and Madison South too are involved in heightening neighborhood pride and networking via their respective neighborhood signs and green space beautification.

RideShare is a form of transportation demand management. It refers to traveling in a vehicle which is carrying more than one person. Carpooling, vanpooling, and riding the bus are considered forms of ridesharing.

Incentive points are earned by RideSharing to and from common destinations. Each vehicle must have a constant minimum of two travelers to qualify to earn points. For example, two travelers going to the grocery store each earn ten points for traveling.

together When they complete the return trip together, they qualify for another ten points each Their trip has accumulated forty points, twenty per traveler

So how did we do? In a word, splendidly Does RideShare work? Yes The stats tell the story But more importantly, remember that our three partners continued to promote RideShare long after they had accumulated their maximum number of incentive points In fact, the 10,000 grant total number of points was surpassed to total 35,900 points

Thus 896 roundtrips would be 224 carpools, based upon 4 persons per carpool

Participants liked the program because it afforded them an opportunity to make a lifestyle change and participate in a betterment opportunity for their community. Making the change has carried over to be a semi-permanent opportunity to think RideShare vs SOVT (Single Occupancy Vehicle Trips). 99% of the trips were by personal vehicle, though a few did take the bus to travel to a driver and RideShare in a personal vehicle.
