A REGULAR MEETING OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PORTLAND, OREGON WAS HELD THIS 8TH DAY OF MARCH, 1990 AT 2:00 P.M.

379 TIME CERTAIN: 2:00 PM - Recommend an increase in parking fines to the District Court (Resolution introduced by Commissioner Blumenauer)

Discussion: Anne Svoboda, Parking Patrol Division Manager, said parking fine increases are justified because of concerns with public safety, available spaces and overall compliance. She said current fines are not a deterrent as shown by the fact that the number of requests for compliance have more than doubled in the last year from 325 to 725 requests per month. Turnover rate has decreased in the downtown area because motorists are choosing to stay in their parking spaces.

Ms. Svoboda said parking fines have not kept up with other costs of parking. The last raise was in 1981, nine years ago, and our fines are tremendously low compared to other jurisdictions. Many community groups have written in support of the increases.

Commissioner Lindberg asked if we need more money for enforcement to ensure compliance.

Ms. Svoboda said no increase in enforcement is proposed right now and that the higher fines should increase compliance and thereby cut the workload. She said 50% of the fines are kept by the City and 50% go to the State Courts.

Commissioner Blumenauer said Council will have an opportunity to talk about patterns of investment when the Parking Patrol budget comes up for discussion.

Commissioner Koch asked if they had considered raising fines in certain areas and not others and then evaluating the deterent effect in each.

Ms. Svoboda said this would be difficult to administer but they will evaluate calls for compliance by area and shift resources where they are most needed.

Commissioner Blumenauer said we only make a recommendation to the District Court which is already very concerned about the burden of administering the fines and unlikely to agree to having a double system in some parts of City and not others.

Commissioner Koch said we don't know where City revenues are going.

Commissioner Blumenauer said the District Court has no say in where money goes and that the increases are intended to increase compliance not to raise revenues.

Leo Cross, President, Downtown Community Association said his group opposes the increases because of the financial inequities they impose on downtown residents. He said they would reconsider if a residential parking permit district for downtown residents was estabished as they had requested.

James E. Wikander, 3334 NE Oregon, said the meters should be there to benefit citizens. He said too many are for too short a time and that too often 90 minute spots or spaces in parking lots can't be found.

Claudia Efurd, Goose Hollow Neighborhood Association, said her group supports the increases. Because tickets don't exceed the cost of parking in private lots, many drivers overstay time limits and take away spaces from businesses and residents who have been issued permits.

Sandy Perry, Downtown Retail Council, said the DRC supports the increases because turnover rates for downtown meters have decreased indicating access to shoppers and visitors is on the decline. She said all forms of illegal parking are on the rise because the existing fine structure doesn't encourage compliance and this hurts retailers in terms of traffic flow, congestion, and accessibility. She added a plea to increase public awareness of the availability of low-cost parking in the seven downtown public garages.

Jay Margulies, 2421 NW Pettygrove, said he wanted to distinguish between places where parking is always illegal and places where parking is time-limited. He asked for a review of the fine structure, stating that simply increasing fines without considering other consequences, such as environmental factors and neighborhood goals, could have unfavorable consequences.

Ellen Vanderslice, 2951 NW Raleigh, representing Northwest District Association, spoke in support of the increases as a deterrent but said that increased enforcement would be the best deterent.

Ms. Vanderslice also said the current proposed fines favor drivers over pedestrians and asked that the fine for blocking the sidewalk, crosswalk or curb ramp be raised from \$6.00 to at least \$25, instead of the proposed \$15.

Len Davis, Chief Fire Marshall, said the Fire Bureau believes increasing fines would positively affect enforcement of the emergency vehicle access problem.

Commissioner Lindberg moved to change the recommended increases and raise the fines for blocking the sidewalk or crosswalk from \$6.00 to \$25 and for blocking the driveway from \$10 to \$25. Commissioner Bogle seconded. The motion carried. (Y-4)

Commissioner Blumenauer said the Oregon Motor Vehicle Code establishes a minimum fine for parking in a disabled zone and asked for an amendment to set the fine at \$100 to conform with state law. Commissioner Koch so moved and Commissioner Lindberg seconded. The motion carried (Y-4)

Commissioner Koch said he'd like to see a systemic approach so we can evaluate what acts as a deterrent. He moved to increase the fine for fire hydrant blocking to 100. Commissioner Lindberg seconded. The motion carried (Y-4)

Commissioner Bogle said the major issue is equity, stretching the limited number of spaces to a large number of people.

Commissioner Koch said he would like to see a report in eleven to twelve months on the impact of these fines on deterence so that we can evaluate their effectivness.

Commissioner Lindberg said it will make it easier for people to find a place to park as well as increase the appeal of the public parking garages.

Commissioner Blumenauer said if the District Court approves the increases the Parking Patrol Division can prepare a report in six months to see if there's been a change in compliance patterns.

Liquor license application for Robert Daryl Bennett, dba Beer Nutz, 6526 SE Foster Road, Retail Malt Beverage license, New Outlet, favorable recommendation (Report)

Discussion: John Werneken, License Bureau, said the application is being treated as a new outlet because there has been no liquor license in use at this location for some time. A remonstrance was received based on severe problems in the past. The issue now is whether Mr. Bennett is likely to suffer similar problems and both License and Police Bureau staff have concluded he will run a completely different kind of operation and therefore recommend a favorable endorsement.

Jerry Billings, 6605 SE 36th, said that the previous operation attracted dope pushers and sellers of stolen goods and he has no reason to believe the same crowd won't return.

Robert Daryl Bennett, Beer Nutz applicant, said the difference between the previous operation and his will be as night from day and that having the space occupied instead of vacant would be a positive benefit to the neighborhood.

## Commissioner Dick Bogle

Liquor license application for Gary L. and Eun Sil Grace Lowe, dba Triple Crown Food Market, 8203 N. Denver, Package Store License, Change of Owner, unfavorable recommendation (Report)

Henry Emrich said this store is in an area with a history of liquor-related problems and that the License Bureau and Kenton Neighborhood Association had worked out a voluntary "Good Neighbor" agreement with three package stores in the area to ban the sale of fortified wines. Mr. Lowe refuses to sign such an agreement even though he is not presently stocking fortified wines and without such a restriction the License Bureau recommends an unfavorable endorsement.

Harold Williams, CH2A and Associates, representing Gary Lowe, said Mr. Lowe believes forcing him to sign an agreement not to sell fortified wines when others in the area do so penalizes him and implies that he has done something wrong.

Commissioner Koch asked if he knew that Council can't impose restrictions until licenses come up for renewal.

Henry Emrich said no one else in that area of the block is allowed to sell fortified wine and the other package stores have signed the agreement.

Commissioner Bogle told Mr. Lowe that if he wants a liquor license it comes with a provision that he sell no fortified wine. If he doesn't sign this agreement he doesn't get any liquor license at all. If he does sign, the License Bureau will change its recommendation to favorable.

Mr Emrich obtained Mr. Lowe's signature on the agreement and said the License Bureau would now like to change its recommendation to favorable with the restriction on selling no wines greater than 14%.

Commissioner Koch moved to accept the revised License Bureau recommendation of favorable with a condition on restriction on sale of fortified wine. Commissioner Lindberg seconded. The motion carried. (Y-4)

Disposition: Recommendation changed to favorable. (Y-4)

At 3:30 pm., Council adjourned.
