Explain why this DOES or does not require a presentation or Council discussion: This IGA is for a relatively small sum to help off set costs in the residential food scraps curbside collection pilot program. It is non-controversial. **Emergency Item (answer below):** <u>x</u> or Non-Emergency Item:

If emergency, why does this need to take effect immediately: Metro funding is essential to support the compost pilot and such funding is only available in the current fiscal year; therefore this ordinance needs to be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Council.

- 4. History of Agenda Item/Background: A new residential curbside collection program for food scraps mixed with yard debris began in May 2010. Four waste and recycling hauling companies (franchisees) are participating in the pilot program. BPS has agreed to help off set costs incurred by the franchisees during the pilot program, including buying down the "tip fee" charged for reload, transportation and composting of the mixed food scraps and yard debris. Metro has also agreed to provide funds for the tip fee buy-down.
- 5. **Purpose of Agenda Item:** Approve IGA with Metro to provide funds to the City to reimburse franchisees for the costs of handling, transporting and composting the mixed food scraps and yard debris collected in the residential compost program.
- 6. Legal Issues: None
- 7. What individuals or groups are or would be opposed to this ordinance? Supportive? Recycling advocacy groups would support the ordinance. Ordinance is not expected to generate opposition.
- 8 How Does This Relate to Current City Policies? The funds from Metro will help keep the costs down for implementing the new food scraps pilot program. This will compensate franchisees participating in the pilot for higher processing.

10. Other Government Participation: BPS is partnering with Metro to reimburse residential solid waste franchisees for costs incurred in collecting food scraps in the City's new curbside pilot program.
