Authorizes an Intergovernmental Agreement with Oregon Consensus, National Policy Consensus Center-Portland State University for \$14,000 to assess issues related to sedimentation and the need for maintenance dredging in the Central and South reaches of the Willamette River.

2) Purpose of the Proposed Legislation:

The above funding will support an assessment of issues related to maintenance dredging of sediment for public and private property owners along the Willamette River. Members of the Office of Healthy Working Rivers Advisory Committee raised concerns about the cost of maintenance dredging and the process to get such dredging permitted. This is an issue for Portland parks facilities as well as commercial docks, private docks and floating homes. The product of this IGA will be a report identifying key issues related to sedimentation and maintenance dredging and recommendations for possible next steps to resolve key issues identified in the assessment process.

I. RECOMMENDATION

Authorize an Intergovernmental Agreement with Oregon Consensus-National Policy Consensus Center, Portland State University to assess issues related to sedimentation and the need for maintenance dredging in the Central and South reaches of the Willamette River. (Ordinance)

II. BACKGROUND

This project was identified as a priority by members of the Office of Healthy Working Rivers (OHWR) Advisory Committee. Members reported that sediment in the river builds up and impacts public and private uses of the river including marinas, boat ramps, park facilities and floating homes. Dredging of sediment is subject to regulatory requirements and management and disposal of dredged materials may be expensive. It is critical for watershed health that dredging and dredge material disposal be conducted in a manner that minimizes any environmental impact.

In response to the Advisory Committee, OHWR determined that it would be useful to have an independent assessment of the nature and extent of issues related to maintenance dredging. The assessment would be the basis for a report with recommendations to the OHWR and the Advisory Committee.

Project Goals

• Determine and report on the nature and extent of sedimentation in the South and Central Reaches of the Willamette River based on a review and analysis of existing data sources.

Project Elements

- Analysis of existing information on sedimentation in the South and Central Reaches of the Willamette River in Portland. Interviews with parties who have or need to conduct maintenance dredging to address sedimentation impacts to their floating homes, docks or other facilities. Case study of permitting activity related to Willamette Park's maintenance dredging project.
- Identification of costs associated with maintenance dredging.
- Assessment of permitting requirements.
- Final product will be a report identifying key issues related to sedimentation and maintenance dredging and recommendations for possible next steps to resolve key issues identified in the assessment process.

III. FINANCIAL IMPACT

The Office of Healthy Working Rivers is committing \$14,000 to fund this Intergovernmental Agreement with Oregon Consensus – Portland State University. Funds are available in the Office of Healthy Working River's FY 2010-2011 budget.
