Local Match for this project is estimated at \$936,000.

#### Operation and Maintenance Costs(O&M)

Annual Trail O&M for Parks maintenance of the new trailand structures is estimated at \$17,300, includes Urban Forestry, Natural Resources and Structures.

<u>One time costs for trail construction, includes Urban Forestry and Natural Resources</u> Trail Construction:  $1^{st}$  year inspection and  $2^{nd}$  year tree establishment as required by Land Use Decision =\$9100

Total Trail O&M (17,300 Annual +9,100 One time) = \$26,400 Requested from General Fund this Ordinance.

Parks requests that OMF include this funding in its five-year forecast for the fiscal year 2012/2013 going forward.

1. **Background:** Swan Island is a major employment center with over 10,000 employees. Geocoding of current employees shows that the highest concentration resides above the bluff within walking and biking distance. Although two bus routes serve Swan Island, transit access from these adjacent neighborhoods is poor and takes several transfers to reach Swan Island. The "island" is substantially lower (100') than the adjacent neighborhoods and a single road serves the entire industrial sanctuary. Providing a trail that employees could safely walk and ride would help preserve road capacity for freight movement to and around Swan Island. The trail will also

serve as a key neighborhood link to the future North Portland Greenway Trail.

2. **Financial Impact:** Bureau of Parks and Recreation (Parks) Operation and Maintenance cost for the trail project is estimated at \$17,300 annually as well as one time costs of \$9,100 that include; 2 year monitoring and the second year of plant establishment as required by the Land Use Decision.

3. **Controversial and/or legal issues:** A. Port of Portland would not grant a trail easement but did sell property (which is contaminated) to Parks. Contaminated soils will be addressed as part of the construction contract. B. In order to construct a small portion of the upper trail on unassigned City property Parks may have to accept 9 acres of steep hillside below Willamette Blvd from BGS. The BES Portsmouth Main Project is staging where the lower trail is to be built. They are scheduled for completion in November 2011 but the schedule has slipped several times already and this may become a schedule issue.

4. Link to current City policies: Adopted plans and policies supporting the Waud Bluff Trail include *the Swan Island Trails Action Plan* (January 2004), Portland's *Transportation System Plan, River Renaissance Strategy* (July 2004), Portland Park's 2020 Vision Plan (July 2001), and the *Economic Development Strategy for the City of Portland* (2002). In June 2004, the Portland City Council directed the Portland Office of Transportation to include the Waud Bluff Trail in the Portland *Transportation System Plan*.

5. **Citizen participation:** Two community Open House events were held November 11, 2010. The events took place on Swan Island at the Daimler Corporation Building during the noon time and at the University of Portland that evening. Project information was provided at both open houses and attendees were given the opportunity to ask questions, provide written comments and vote on design options.

Letters of support have been received from the North Portland Greenway and Swan Island Transportation Management Association, Union Pacific Railroad, adjacent businesses and nearby neighborhood association.

6. **Other government participation:** BES awarded a \$192,000 Community Benefits Opportunity Grant for the construction of the lower trail. Metro made \$198,000 in High Priority Project funding available for construction at a 10.27% local match.
