Budget Overview

- Total Budget = \$198.8 million
 - \$ 76.5 million Operating
 - \$ 122.3 million Capital
- Revenue
 - Rates & Charges = \$131.4 million
 - Retail = \$111.1 million
 - Wholesale = \$16.4 million
 - SDCs = \$1.0 million
 - Other Fees & charges = \$2.9 million
- Positions = 627


Primary Rate Drivers for FY 2011-12

- CIP 2.1%
 - LT2 3.5%
 - Interstate facility 0.8%
 - Project deferrals & underspending -2.0%
 - Project cost savings -0.2%
- Economic Factors 3.2%
 - Inflation (COLA, PERS, health benefits) 3.6%
 - Lower interest earnings 0.6%
 - Favorable borrowing rates -1.0%
- Deferral of prior year rate increases 5.7%
 - Resources were available to offer temporary rate mitigation, but those resources are being used up.
 - Covered increased maintenance, increased CIP, new wholesale contracts, decreased demand
- Retail Demand 1.0%
 - 1% demand reduction
- Budget Reductions -1.4%
- Other 2.3%
 - Reduced non-rate revenue 1.6%
 - Less Reimbursable Work & SDCs 0.9%
 - More low income discounts, higher bad debt expense, etc. 0.7%
 - Cost changes 0.7%
 - Higher General Fund Overhead 0.5%
 - ECC 0.2%

1.5% Mandatory Cut Package

- \$2.5 million:
 - 1.5% \$1.2M operating budget reduction
 - 7 positions
 - Security
 - Community Outreach and Information
 - Operations
 - Maintenance and Construction
 - Field Support
 - Customer Service (2)
 - Electricity
 - Professional Services
 - Seasonal & part time staffing
 - Finance
 - Engineering
 - Invasive species management
 - · Tree trimming
 - These are being taken as <u>on-going</u> cuts (not one-time).
 - \$1.3M capital budget reduction
 - One-time capital project spending cuts

FY 2011-12 Rate Summary

- The average effective retail rate increase is 12.9%.
- Low income discount program
 - Discount for single family residential customers of 50%, which is \$12.38 per month (\$148.56 per year in total discount).
 - Crisis vouchers of \$150, safety net, fixture repairs, payment plans, and more
- System Development Charge (SDC) increase is 1.3%.
 - Basic residential SDC increases from \$1,710 to \$1,732
 - Portland remains well below other regional providers.
 - Waivers for affordable housing continue and temporary ADU exemptions.
- Fixed prices for services, mains, and other facilities
 - Provides bill certainty for developers


Water Bills

- Typical residential (6 ccf) monthly bill increases \$3.19,
 from \$24.66 to \$27.85.
- Qualified low income residential (5 ccf) monthly bill increases \$1.42 - from \$10.96 to \$12.38 (with discount).
- Medium commercial (200 ccf) monthly bill increases \$73.80 - from \$571.39 to \$645.19.
- Portland water bills are only about 6 percent of the typical utility services for retail residential customers.
