RECOMMENDATION

City Council should pass this ordinance to authorize acceptance of a grant in the amount of \$40,000 for Mt. Tabor Park Invasive Plant Control and Revegetation Project.

II. BACKGROUND

The Mt. Tabor Park Invasive Plant Control and Revegetation Project is a multi-year project to restore a healthy native forest community. The project is part of BES's Tabor to the River Program and is a partnership between BES, Portland Parks and Recreation, and the Portland Water Bureau. The project will remove non-native, invasive vegetation, restore native trees, shrubs and grasses and control erosion in natural areas. Removing invasive plants and planting native plants in Mt. Tabor Park will enhance watershed health by improving stormwater management and habitat, just as Tabor to the River green streets do in urban areas.

Friends of Mt. Tabor Park, Portland Parks & Recreation volunteers, and school groups from the Tabor to the River Program area are working to control invasive vegetation in the park. Volunteer efforts are important, and compliment the large-scale project necessary to restore the park's natural areas.

The Mt. Tabor Park Invasive Plant Control and Revegetation Project will restore a healthy native forest community with the biological and structural diversity necessary for clean water and wildlife habitat. The project will remove non-native, invasive vegetation, restore native trees. shrubs and grasses and control erosion in natural areas. This multi-year project will eventually remove invasive plants and plant native plants on 74 acres.

There will be \$40,000 in new grant revenue. Local match in the amount of \$69,571 will be provided in the form of salary, benefits, volunteer hours and services in the FY 2011/12 and FY 2012/13 proposed budgets of the Bureau of Environmental Services. Matching funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund, Bureau of Environmental Services, ESEN000023/PUWSWR0000.
