4. History of Agenda Item/Background:

The Barbur Concept Plan will create a long-term vision for the six-mile Barbur Boulevard corridor, from Portland's Central City to the Tigard city limit. Beginning in summer of 2011, a community working group will explore alternative land use concepts for the corridor through an 18-month public process. The concept plan will recommend key future transportation investments, stormwater solutions, and changes to City policy and zoning. In addition, the public process will inform regional decisions for future High Capacity Transit in the southwest corridor.

8. How Does This Relate to Current City Policies?

In July 2009, the City supported the Metro Council action selecting the southwest corridor as a priority for investment in High Capacity Transit (e.g. light rail, bus rapid transit). Metro is convening local jurisdictions, ODOT, and Trimet to create a plan for the entire corridor from Portland's central city to Sherwood – called the Southwest Corridor Plan (<u>www.swcorridorplan.org</u>). The Barbur Concept Plan is an opportunity for the City, residents, and business in southwest Portland to influence regional decisions related to future investments in High Capacity Transit along the corridor.



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
