The agreements entered into under the authority of this ordinance will provide Portland Parks with funds or in-kind services needed to develop or operate community gardens. The average cost to construct a new community garden is \$35,000. In most cases, Parks encourages community partners to fundraise in order to share the cost of building a new garden. The amounts of such contributions will vary, and, in many cases, garden development funds will be given on a reimbursable basis as Parks constructs the garden.

While most, if not all, garden construction costs will be covered by the funds received from the groups we enter into agreements with, there will be ongoing O&M costs associated with each new garden. a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

This item allows Parks to enter into agreements with funders and other community partners to leverage existing Parks resources and increase program offerings to the community. These agreements would allow Parks to increase education and outreach activities and build more gardens that would allow Portlanders to grow their own food. These actions would meet 2009 Climate Action Plan Objective 15 to significantly increase the consumption of local food.

In 2009 the Governor designated the Community Gardens Program as an Oregon Solutions project in order to identify ways to strengthen the program and increase Portlander's access to fresh healthy food. Through the Oregon Solutions process, stakeholders representing over 30 local public and private organizations and governmental entities met to identify ways to expand and enhance the Portland Community Gardens Program.
