a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

Positive impacts on the community are expected as a result of this change. Nuisance behaviors that are not currently classified under the code, will now be able to be addressed, and a lower threshold will allow for problem solving to occur earlier with recourse available if the licensee is unresponsive.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

The community was engaged in the original implementation of the Time Place Manner code and representatives from police, alcohol industry, businesses and neighborhoods participated in the Time Place Manner Oversight Committee since 2004. The Oversight Committee has reviewed case activity over the years and provided input regarding the proposed changes based on the history of case activity. Input was also gathered through the Liquor License Team, which includes participation from many City bureaus.

The Community at large was engaged through 2 public hearings with invitations going out city-wide. Updates on the proposed changes were forwarded to Neighborhood and Business associations. Written feedback was requested and received.

Changes were made to the proposed code language based on feedback received from the community.

7. BACKGROUND ANALYSIS

In 2004, Council adopted Portland City Code 14B.120 Time Place and Manner Regulations of Establishments that Serve Alcohol (TPM code). The code was established to use the authority granted by ORS 471.164(1) to regulate the nuisance aspects of establishments that serve alcohol. As authorized by Council, the Office of Neighborhood Involvement Liquor Licensing Program has coordinated the implementation of the regulations and the Liquor License Team (LLT) for enforcement of the regulations. The TPM code has been effective in addressing many livability and public safety issues that arise out of the sale of alcohol. The goal is to work with the licensee to address the issues before they become egregious. However, the LLT identified that there are several areas that the City's authority is insufficient to address problems. The proposed changes will expand the authority slightly to allow:

- Drug activity, prostitution, overcrowding, and serious incidents involving death or the risk of death to be considered nuisance activities for the purpose of this code.
- A violation and abatement process if three nuisance incidents occur in 60 days (rather than 30 days currently allowed).
- A violation and abatement process in the event that a serious incident occurs at an establishment.

The proposed changes have been reviewed and supported by the LLT as well as the Time Place and Manner Oversight Committee, which includes community and industry representation. Time Place and Manner is a reasonable process to a responsive licensee and has been effective in mitigating harm. These changes will help to better serve the communities of Portland, and ensure that licensed establishments do not act irresponsibly or negligently at

the cost of the community. It will also allow the City of Portland to take intervening steps with a premise earlier and avoid more serious problems from occurring. This is the only avenue to address problems at licensed establishments at the local level. All other regulatory authority is held by the state Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

8. FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no tangible financial impact to the proposed code changes. The infrastructure is already in place to administer the changes. Some increased cost may be incurred in problem solving with businesses through the TPM enforcement process, but will likely be no more than what is spent in informally problem solving while waiting for the incidents to reach a threshold where the city may compel some action.

9. RECOMMENDATION/ACTION REQUESTED

Approve the ordinance and adopt the proposed changes to PCC 14B.120 and the corresponding administrative guidelines.
