Passing the ordinance gives the Bureau of Environmental Services (BES) the opportunity to seek \$100,000 in grant funding for design of Glenwood and Bybee culverts, two of nine fish barriers that blocks juvenile fish passage, daylights the stream, and restores floodplain and riparian habitat in Crystal Springs.

 - a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item? Although public involvement and community outreach specific to this ordinance has not yet occurred, this grant request to EMSWCD is part of a broader effort to focus on salmon recovery in one watershed Crystal Springs. In 2010, BES worked with Reed College, the Sellwood-Moreland Improvement League (SMILE) Neighborhood Association, and adjacent property owners to perform a culvert replacement at SE 28th Avenue. If the grant application is successful, the bureau anticipates informing and involving the community in the design of the Bybee and Glenwood culverts through presentations to the SMILE Neighborhood Association, Woodstock Business Association, the Johnson Creek Watershed Council, and Friends of Crystal Springs Creek; mailings; tabling at community events and fairs; and meetings with individual property owners.
 - b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

In 2010, BES involved Reed College and the SMILE Neighborhood Association in the design and construction of the SE 28th culvert. BES anticipates involving the SMILE Neighborhood Association, Sellwood-Westmoreland Business Alliance, Johnson Creek Watershed Council, Friends of Crystal Springs Creek, and the newly formed Crystal Springs Creek Community Partnership in the design of the Bybee and Glenwood culverts, as well as adjacent property owners. Additionally, BES is working with the Army Corps of Engineers, NOAA Fisheries, Metro, Portland Parks, and TriMet on removing a total of nine culverts throughout the Crystal Springs watershed and restoring Westmoreland Park.

c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item?

Although public involvement and community outreach specific to this ordinance has not yet occurred, this grant request to EMSWCD is part of a broader effort to focus on salmon recovery and restoration in one watershed – Crystal Springs. If the grant application is successful, the bureau anticipates informing and involving the community in the design of the Bybee and Glenwood culverts through presentations to neighborhood organizations listed above, targeted mailings to residents, tabling at community events and fairs, and meetings with individual property owners.

- d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item? Public involvement to date has been a joint effort by the BES Science, Fish and Wildlife Division and the Johnson Creek Watershed Team. Ronda Fast and Maggie Skenderian designed and implemented public involvement to-date and will continue to collaborate on future public involvement activities.

RECOMMENDATION I.

City Council should pass this ordinance to authorize application to EMSWCD for a grant in the amount of \$100,000 for Crystal Springs Culverts Removal and Habitat Restoration Designs.

II. BACKGROUND

In 2007, the City launched the Grey to Green Initiative (G2G), aimed at accelerating the implementation of the Portland Watershed Management Plan. G2G focuses on seven key components. Most pertinent to this proposal are the removal and/or repair of 9 fish barrier culverts, the acquisition of over 400 acres of land, and invasive species removal, among other focal areas that add up to a \$150 million effort. Of the \$50 million earmarked by the City Council, \$2 Million were specifically targeted to the culvert effort. After an exhaustive inventory, ranking and review by a steering committee comprised of professional representatives from NOAA Fisheries, the US Fish and Wildlife Service, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Johnson Creek Watershed Council, and the Portland Bureaus of Transportation, Parks and Recreation, and Environmental Services, the City selected the 9 fish barrier culverts in Crystal Springs as the top priority for replacement. The idea is to focus all of the culvert effort in one watershed that has the highest potential for salmon recovery.

This proposal is to design two (Glenwood and Bybee) of nine culverts with fish-friendly passage features. Replacing these fish barriers will provide access to the most intact and oldest riparian habitat in the stream, as well as cold, spring headwaters where spawning habitat exists. BES is currently replacing six of the other culverts along this stream.

I. FINANCIAL IMPACT

If awarded, there will be \$100,000 in new grant revenue. Local match in the amount of \$100,000 will be provided in the form of salary, benefits, volunteer hours and services in the FY 2011/12 budget and FY 2012/13 proposed budget of the Bureau of Environmental Services.

Matching funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund, Bureau of Environmental Services, WBS element E08967.
