Graffiti Abatement Coordinator ...1 FTE

- Manage Graffiti Hotline .3 FTE
- Facilitate Graffiti Task Force
- Enforce two city codes (14B.80 & 14B.85)
 - Inspect retailers for compliance with PCC14B.85
 - Represent GAP at Code Hearings
- Manage 2 databases (23,500+ reports)
- Coordinate cleanup -all property within City
- Supervise two contracts for private property cleanup

Portland City Codes 14B.80 – Graffiti Nuisance Property

- ·Work with owners to facilitate cleanup
- •Provide free assistance to:
 - Owner-occupied residential properties
 - Some small businesses
 - Most non-profits
- •Mail abatement notices (av. 10 per wk)
- •Obtain administrative warrant for cleanup (8 since 1998)

14B.85 - Graffiti Materials Sales

- Requires merchants to lock up or otherwise secure spray paints, tips, paint pens
- Requires merchants to obtain photo identification and record purchaser information, including signatures, in sales log for 2 years

Graffiti Volunteer Coordinator 1FTE

(start date April 16, 2011)

- Recruit & train volunteers

 - Mapping
 - Compile hours
 - Provide ongoing retention activities
- Supervise Youth Walking Crew contract (IRCO)
- Oversee Small Grants to Coalitions (GAP \$\$)






Volunteers - 500+ signed up from community

- Community Volunteer Corps (CVC) is homeless-to-work program
- Saturday Morning Collaborative Cleanups
- Cleanups in response to group requests
- Special events
 - GREAT program
 - Friends of the Children
 - Paint the Town Clean (sponsored by Alpha Broadcasting & Rodda Paint)

Graffiti Abatement Program VOLUNTEERS (cont'd)

- Since April 2011, volunteer coordinator conducted and/or facilitated 102 cleanups
- By comparison, from June to November 2010, there were 31 volunteer cleanups with 575 hours of participation
- Results indicate that there were 68 volunteer cleanups with 1,166 hours of participation during same six months in 2011, more than doubling volunteer efforts in only one year







Graffiti Task Force

- Started by Mayor Vera Katz in 1994
- Still meets 3rd Thursday every month
- Communication network of graffiti abatement partners shares information for mutual benefit
- Expanded to include regional partners including other law enforcement: Hillsboro PD; Tualatin PD, Washington Co Sheriff, Troutdale, Fairview, Vancouver and Clark Co agencies, Salem PD
- Friendly Streets (non-profit) Co-Sponsors of Graffiti Summit (April 19, 2011)

Assist Police and District Attorney

- Document incidents of graffiti
- Compile information including photos and property owner information from database for cases
- Testify to Grand Jury and Court
- Testify at Sentencing hearings
