The City's cost for the contracts described in this ordinance will be a total of \$1,253,400 in U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Housing Opportunities for

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Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) program funds awarded to and accepted by the City of Portland for this purpose. There is no match required for this grant. As such, there is no direct cost to the City as a result of this legislation.

### 9) If "YES," please answer the following questions:

a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

As part of the 2011-2016 Consolidated Plan and 2011-2012 Action Plan, the City allocated \$10 million in federal housing and community development funds to its community partners to implement strategies to preserve and develop affordable housing; provide housing access and stabilization services to people experiencing homelessness and others facing barriers to housing.

The unmet housing and service needs of People Living with HIV (PLWH) is clearly documented in the 2011-2012 Action Plan. By obligating funds from this awarded and accepted grant, the City of Portland will help close the housing gap among people affected by HIV/AIDS.

Through obligation of these funds, effective community partners will house 50 to 60 people each year of the three-year grant. Funds also will go toward comprehensive planning and coordination of local resources to meet the ongoing housing and service needs of the HIV population, including connections to employment and job training opportunities.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved? As required by federal regulations, a Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) describing the overall framework for public involvement was developed and adopted with the 2011-2016 Consolidated Plan.

A series of hearing and public meetings were held regarding the development of the Plan, in all areas of the city to ensure access to a broad range of community members. Translation services were provided when requested. All hearings locations were accessible to persons with disabilities. All documents were posted on the Portland Housing Bureau website.

As part of the Plan, the Portland Housing Advisory Commission (PHAC), the bureau's advisory body, reviewed the Plan and its recommendations. The Federal Funding

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Oversight Committee, a representative body of the three jurisdictions (Portland, Gresham, and Multnomah County) also reviewed the Plan.

Furthermore, the Multnomah County Health Department, through its office of HIV Care Services Program (HCS) and the Ryan White Planning Council, has its own public involvement process. Because HOPWA and the Ryan White Planning Council share the same service area, we can utilize the results from client surveys and community forums to assess the service needs and gaps of PLWH in the Portland grant area performed by Multnomah County.

### c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item?

In the Consolidated Plan process, public involvement affected the City's understanding of community needs. For this particular initiative needs include addressing the increase in homelessness, continued lack of affordable housing, the fragmentation of the HIV system, and the lack of sustainable income for PLWH who have intermittent health issues.

These needs, in turn, influenced the set of investment priorities that shaped PHB's 2011-13 Strategic Plan and budget decisions. PHB's Strategic Plan, a goals- and outcomesdriven framework guiding Portland's housing investments, synthesized available data on trends, needs and program outcomes, as well as community input gathered from focus groups, surveys and the strategic plan community forum.

## d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item?

The public involvement process used in the decision to apply for HOPWA funds through the Office of HIV/AIDS Housing is contained in the Citizen Participation Plan (CPP), within the 2011-2016 Consolidated Plan. The CPP was adopted by the former Housing and Community Development Commission, and reviewed by the new Portland Housing Advisory Commission. Implementation of the CPP is managed by public involvement staff of the Portland Housing Bureau.
