

Summary of changes made in response to PSC testimony and direction, 2/28/12

2. Resiliency, Emergency and Hazard Planning	<p>Added resiliency emphasis to Introduction (page 8).</p> <p>Seismic upgrades to schools added in TEY strategy (page 51).</p> <p>Emergency preparedness better integrated into HCC strategy (pages 101-102, 105, 108)</p>
3. Multigenerational City	<p>New insert after TEY strategy outlining our goals to be a place for all generations (pages 52-53).</p> <p>Portland is one of only two U.S. cities accepted as pioneer members of the World Healthy Organization’s Global Network of Age-Friendly Cities. A new action has been added to the HCC strategy to highlight this work (page 109).</p>
4. East Portland	<p>A new insert has been added highlighting how East Portland is leading the way toward implementation of the Portland Plan. In the final layout this will include an index to all east Portland Actions (pages 127-128).</p>
5. Basic Public Services	<p>A new section outlining the case for strong basic services, and the role of those services play in realizing the goals of the plan (pages 9 -11).</p>
6. Implementation of Equity Framework	<p>New language in the Equity framework to explain how the chapter should be used to guide implementation of all of the Portland Plan strategies (page 18).</p> <p>Equity Actions now have partners listed (pages 18-28).</p> <p>A new insert was added to the HCC strategy on gentrification (see below)</p> <p>Additional clarification added to the Implementation Chapter (see below).</p>
7. Youth Comments	<p>Language changes throughout the TEY strategy in response to youth testimony (pages 32-53).</p> <p>Additional youth and teen program actions in TEY strategy (page 47).</p> <p>Outdoor school action added to TEY strategy (page 51).</p>
8. Traded Sector Clarity	<p>New narrative to define and explain the role of traded sector (pages 59-60).</p> <p>Expanded text to explain target clusters (page 61).</p> <p>New action to emphasize regional economic coordination (page 62).</p> <p>Additional text in Trade and Freight Hub element to highlight economic role of freight infrastructure (page 69).</p>
9. Transportation and Green Infrastructure Innovation	<p>Additional policy to explicitly cite transportation system innovation as an aspect of the Urban Innovation strategy element. This policy statement also notes the business case for green Infrastructure (page 65).</p>
10. Housing Strategy Alignment	<p>The Access to Housing strategy element has been substantially re-written to better align policies and actions with the Portland Housing Bureau’s recent strategic plan (pages 84-88) .</p>
11. Gentrification	<p>A new insert was added to the HCC strategy describing gentrification and displacement, with an outline of how different policies and actions in the Portland Plan can help move us in the right direction (pages 103-104).</p> <p>Several policies and actions have been re-written to make a more direct point (for example, pages 67, 80, 87, 105).</p>

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12. Bicycles and Active Transport	<p>New definition and narrative on Active Transportation (page 113).</p> <p>Re-written action about reinventing the transportation revenue model (page 123).</p> <p>Integration of the term “protected bikeways” in various places (for example, pages 124, 125).</p> <p>New policy to cite transportation system innovation as an aspect of the Urban Innovation economic strategy element (page 65).</p>
13. Historic Resources	<p>New policies addressing historic resources in neighborhood centers (pages 105 and 114).</p> <p>Rewritten action stresses role of cultural resources in centers and corridors (page 117).</p>
14. Community Action	<p>New section on community-lead-action in Implementation chapter (page 117).</p>
15. Geographic Recommendations/Data	<p>Removed local measures and action lists – to be published as a working draft under separate cover, after City Council adoption.</p>
16. Implementation Next Steps	<p>Significant re-write of Implementation chapter with more specific narrative about next steps and roles of partners (pages 171-175).</p> <p>A specific action list was added to the Implementation chapter to more clearly identify and assign the next steps (pages 174-175).</p>
17. Prioritization, Action Item Review	<p>A number of actions have been consolidated or deleted throughout the document in the interest of keeping the plan focused. Actions without clear or committed partners were deleted. See separate action table for a list of what was merged or deleted.</p>

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
