This Agreement obligates the City to fund 17% of the cost of the trail connectors. Final costs will be determined later upon final design, but the obligation is currently estimated at \$408,580. The City expects to pay for these costs as part of the larger South Waterfront Greenway Trail to be built between Gibbs Street and the Marquam Bridge. Sources may include urban renewal area funds, Parks SDC funds, General Fund, Regional Flexible Funds, and other sources that are currently being identified for the South Waterfront Greenway Trail.

Once built, the transition trails will also be maintained by Portland Parks and Recreation. Currently, a low confidence estimate for annual operations & maintenance is \$49,568. A formal request for these operations & maintenance funds with a more precise amount will be made in the future, most likely when the larger South Waterfront Greenway Trail project is built.
