None. This is two ongoing volunteer-citizen appointments to the DRAC.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

DRAC positions are designated to represent various customer and stakeholder groups to the development process, including neighborhood interests; the positions referenced in this legislation represent Land Use Planning Professionals and Large Developers. BDS sent a notification to the Office of Neighborhood Involvement (ONI) about the vacant positions, inviting neighborhood and business associations to assist in reaching out to potential applicants. BDS also included information about the vacancies in the January/February 2012 issue of its *Plans Examiner* newsletter (see <http://www.portlandonline.com/bds/index.cfm?c=57426&a=380262>). The *Plans Examiner* is widely distributed electronically to BDS customers and stakeholders, as well as neighborhood associations and community groups. In addition, BDS encouraged DRAC members to spread the word about the vacancies in their spheres of influence and encourage others to apply.

Subsequent to these outreach efforts, applications were received by ONI and forwarded to BDS.

c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item?

Since individuals must apply for DRAC vacancies, the participation of neighborhood associations, ONI, and other stakeholders was crucial to generating applications and filling the vacant position.

Subject: Appointments to the Development Review Advisory Committee (DRAC)

Portland City Code Title 3.30.030 specifies that members of the Development Review Advisory Committee (DRAC) may serve up to two 3-year terms. There are currently three vacancies on the DRAC. After a thorough review process, I am recommending the following candidates for appointment to the DRAC for 3-year terms.

Keith Jones has worked for over 10 years in both the public and private sectors in the Portland metropolitan area as a land use planner. He is intimately familiar with land use processes and brings the perspective of someone who has worked on both sides of the application counter.

Joe Schneider has worked for over 20 years as a project engineer/manager/executive, and has spent the last 10 years in construction management at Skanska. He has experience with both the design and construction of a variety of commercial and public projects in Portland.

These candidates will replace former DRAC members whose service ended on January 25, 2012. Several other DRAC members will be finishing their service on the same date in future years. I waited until now to fill these positions in order to avoid having a large number of DRAC members ending their service on the same date.

The background and experience of these candidates will make them welcome additions to the DRAC. Their appointments will help ensure the continuation of the good work of the DRAC on behalf of BDS and other City bureaus, the development industry, and the community. If these proposed appointments are approved, one vacancy will remain on the DRAC in the large construction contractor category. We are continuing our outreach efforts to fill that position.

Development Review Advisory Committee:

The Development Review Advisory Committee (DRAC) is a citizen advisory body, representing those with interests in the outcome of policies, budgets, regulations, and procedures that affect development review processes. The purpose of the Committee is to foster a timely, predictable and accountable development review process that implements the City's goals for land use, transportation, housing, economic development, neighborhood livability and the environment. The Committee advocates for and supports consistent and fair application and implementation of regulations.

The Development Review Advisory Committee consists of seventeen members. These members are appointed by the Commissioner in Charge and confirmed by the City Council. The members are elected to provide representation of those persons concerned about planning, design and development. The areas of interest of members shall include, but not be limited to, development, planning, construction contracting, design professions, neighborhood association membership, business association membership, historic preservation, environmental organizations, and institutional properties. Members of the Development Review Advisory Committee shall serve no more than two, complete three-year terms.
