Re-appointment:

Guenevere (Gwen) Millius' term on the Design Commission will expire on December 31, 2010. I am recommending Gwen be re-appointed to a second 4-year term from January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2014. She has been an exceptional asset for this group as a marketing and design representative filling the same "marketing and design" position, and has expressed her interest in staying on for a second term.

Additionally, and perhaps more importantly, Gwen was also nominated as Chair of the Design Commission by her peer Commissioners when the previous Chair, Jeff Stuhr, completed his term in October 2010. This is momentous as she is now the first woman Chair of the Design Commission since its inception in 1975.

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Design Commission:

The Design Commission, authorized under Portland City Code 33.710.050, provides leadership and expertise on urban design and architecture and on maintaining and enhancing Portland's historical and architectural heritage. The Design Commission consists of seven members, none of whom may hold public elective office. The Commission must include a member of the Planning Commission, a representative of the Regional Arts and Culture Council, one person representing the public at-large, and five members experienced in either design, engineering, financing, construction or management of buildings, and land development. No more than two members may be appointed from any one of these areas of expertise. The Planning Commission member is chosen by the Planning Commission chair. The Regional Arts and Culture Council member is nominated by the Regional Arts and Culture Council chair and approved by the Mayor. The other members are appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. The term shall be maximum 4 years, limited to a maximum of two full terms.

The Commission powers and duties include:

- 1. Recommending the establishment, amendment, or removal of a design district to the Planning Commission and City Council, except Historic Districts and Conservation Districts;
- 2. Developing design guidelines for adoption by City Council for all design districts except Historic Districts and Conservation Districts;
- 3. Reviewing major developments within design districts, except those projects involving or located within the following:
 - a. Historic Districts;
 - b. Conservation Districts;
 - c. Historic Landmarks; and
 - d. Conservation Landmarks.
- 4. Reviewing other land use requests assigned to the Design Commission; and
- 5. Providing advice on design matters to the Hearings Officer, Planning Commission, Historic Landmarks Commission, Portland Development Commission, and City Council.

The Commission meets the first and third Thursday of each month at 1:30 PM.
