

October 7, 2009

Jerry Rundorff of Southwest Charter School (SWCS) meets Dale Bernards of Canterbury Commercial at a South Portland Neighborhood Association meeting and first discusses both 680 Bancroft and the 4310 SW Macadam properties for SWCS consideration.

October 26, 200

Dale Bernards, working as Stuart Lindquist's broker gives a tour to SWCS of the 4310 SW Macadam property.

October 26, 2009

Also on 10/26, SWCS presents both the 680 Bancroft and the 4310 SW Macadam buildings to Commissioner Randy Leonard's office for preliminary approval of occupancy by SWCS.

November 9, 2009

Dale Bernards reviews the first proposal from SWCS to lease the 680 Bancroft building. Stuart Lindquist plans to purchase 680 Bancroft and SWCS would lease the space from him.

December 7, 2009

1/26/2011

Dale Bernards notes he is about to "draft the final counter" to the SWCS Letter of Intent to lease 680 Bancroft.

December 9. 2009

SWCS receives signed "Counter offer to Southwest Charter School Letter of Intent" from Rod Grinberg of Lindquist Development.

December 18, 2009

Email from Dale Bernards indicates that September 1, 2010 is the target date to occupy 680 Bancroft.

February 5, 2010

First actual lease document received by SWCS from Rod Grinberg.

March 17, 2010

Following several rounds of discussions and costly legal review (pad by SWCS), Dale Bernards presents SWCS with an entirely new lease.

April 14, 2010

Dale Bernards

April 20, 2010

Dale Bernards indicates to Squire Smith, SWCS broker, that they are "signed around on the GSA deal" and that they can resume work on our lease. Dale Bernards spells out the 4 changes they plan on making.

April 26, 2010

SWCS receives an email stating that an ICE facility will go in at 4310 SW Macadam. The email notes that "the property will have armed guards and secure fencing." No more detail was provided.

## April 26, 2010

Eric Lea sends a message to Squire Smith indicating that after months of negotiations, SWCS has no alternative but to pursue 680 Bancroft or close its doors.

April 26, 2010.

There is no signed lease still from Lindquist. Eric meets with Lindquist's broker and meets JD Wadamull, the current owner of 680 Bancroft at the meeting.

May 5, 2010

JD Wadamull's broker, Bob Niehaus, is notified of the deadline imposed on SWCS by the Oregon Department of Education (ODE).

May 14, 2010

Two board members reported that based on their research, there would "unlikely to be any detention" at the ICE facility. Eric alludes to the fact that the city and BDS have also indicated that the ICE facility was to be an office.

May 20, 2010

Lease was signed, the day before our requirement to have signed lease by the ODE.

Information below from board meeting on January 20, 2011

## January 18, 2011

Wadamull's broker, Bob Niehaus emails Eric a letter supporting the ICE project expecting Eric to sign it.

-note, we were first asked before that to write our own letter. The purpose of this letter is to state that "we did not object to the facility". In addition to emailing the letter, there were numerous follow up calls and emails insisting that we sign it.

The following is the letter that Eric Lea, SWCS Board President was asked to sign.

January 18, 2011

To Whom It May Concern,

Watumull Bancroft LLC owns the building at 0680 SW Bancroft Street. We entered into a lease with Watumull Bancroft LLC in May of 2010. We were informed of the lease with the Federal Government, Department of Homeland Security, Immigration Customs and Enforcement Division, at 4310 SW Macadam Avenue, prior to signing our lease.

We did not object to locating in the building next to this use.

We are looking forward to opening our school soon.

Eric gets a message from Squire, the school's real estate agent, saying that Lindquist is pulling out of the project and removing his work groups.

-Marlene got a message from Dale on Jan. 19<sup>th</sup> at around 4pm I believe (either while the council meeting was going on or just after). Perhaps stronger than the message Eric received.

-In addition to the many emails and calls we got prior to the 19<sup>th</sup> regarding the letter, Dale left a message with Marlene (I believe that insisted we "reign our people" [the parents] in).

Transcript Message 1 From Dale Bernards who represents Stuart Lindquist Left on Marlene Dorfman's, SWCS office manager's phone.

It's 6:30 right now on Tuesday, I believe. Um, we just got an email from the city saying that parents of the school have been writing a lot of letters in support of the appeal of the project next door which is the GSA building. This is going to create a huge, huge train wreck. Ah...it's just, it's enormous. I mean, we have a letter or an email from [name unclear] supporting it or saying they weren't objecting to it but now all of a sudden they have a potential of parents at Southwest Charter objecting to the GSA building next door is enormous. So um, I'm probably, you know, I'm just giving you the heads up-- ah, Eric always slaps my hand when I, when I call you, so I just thought, you know, please keep this confidential that I'm talking to you (garbled). Squire's gonna get a hold of Eric to see what we can do to avoid this but it's enormous. (garbled) Message 2 From Dale Bernards who represents Stuart Lindquist Left on Marlene Dorfman's cell phone in the evening after the City Hall meeting.

Hey Marlene, Dale. Sorry I'm calling you late but we've got a serious issue with Eric not writing that letter. I mean, Stu's going to pull everybody off the job or I'm going to pull everybody off the job right now. Ah...you have no idea the impact this has as far as ah, you know, cost savings and everything else and everything that we have been trying to accommodate for the school to have them turn on us like this. Call me if you get a chance 503-701-4000 but I'm leaving town tomorrow so this is huge.

The Type III DZM appeal hearing for LU 10-145100 DZM was held on January 19, 2011. Before the conclusion of the hearing council members made specific requests for staff to provide follow-up. This memo addresses those requests.

- 1. Does the impact of phasing change the definition of the project's use?
  - ➢ No. The phasing of the project is entirely related to the development of the site; Phase 2 simply upgrades the site with regard to landscaping, paving, pedestrian amenities, street standards, a water feature, etc. There has been no mention that the use will change with implementation of Phase 2.
- 2. Experience of the existing facility.
  - Bureau of Development Services records do not indicate Code Compliance cases with regard to the facility at 511 NW Broadway. This information is based on records dating from 1998 until 2010. The summary of findings is attached.
  - Police Bureau records from 2005-2010 indicate the type and number of Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) calls and offenses tied to the address of 511 NW Broadway. These CAD calls and offenses are not necessarily tied to the facility at 511 NW Broadway, they are associated with the address and may be tied to the facility. The information provided does not confirm or deny the CAD calls and/or offenses are connected to persons associated with the facility. The records are attached.
  - There are a few records from 2005 and 2008 for Multhomah County to provide services at this address. Staff was unable to locate details beyond this broad information.
- 3. What is Phase 2a?
  - As part of the original Staff Report and Recommendation to the Design Commission (dated 9-28-10) the recommended Condition of Approval referenced Phase 2 as being broken into "Phase 2a for Phase 2 development associated with the SW Moody extension" and "Phase 2b for Phase 2 development associated with the SW Bancroft realignment". At the November 4<sup>th</sup> hearing staff and the Design Commission discussed revisions to the original Condition of Approval, which included breaking the original Condition of Approval into 2 Conditions and referencing Phase 2 as "Phase 2 associated with SW Moody" and "Phase 2 associated with SW Bancroft". These revisions eliminated the subcategories of "2a" and "2b"; it was agreed the revisions made the Conditions of Approval more straightforward.

#### Memorandum for LU 10-145100 DZM

- 4. Clarification on how proposed Conditions of Approval B and C will require Phase 2.
  - Requiring Phase 2 was a very specific point the Design Commission wanted to confirm before they granted approval. Thus, Conditions of Approval B and C were added to the final decision as follows in italics:

*B.* The proposed on-site SW Moody Avenue frontage improvements (noted in the approved plans as "Future Development" and including the proposed conversion of parking to ground level retail at the East Elevation and the kinetic water feature at the intersection of SW Moody and Bancroft) shall be completed within 120 days of substantial completion of at least the adjacent half-street public right-of-way improvements.

*C.* Subject to the applicant's or its successor's acceptance of conveyance of property currently held in the public right of way to the landowner, on-site SW Bancroft Street frontage improvements (noted in the approved plans as "Future Development") shall be completed within one year of a City Council approved street vacation and the vacated property reverting back to 1S1E10CD 500.

Condition of Approval B: BDS staff is confident Condition of Approval B will require full Phase 2 improvements within 120 days of substantial completion of at least the adjacent half-street public right-of-way improvements associated with SW Moody. The City of Portland's street project for SW Moody extension will trigger the Phase 2 requirements along SW Moody. Regarding the responsible party for complying with the Condition of Approval, it is not necessarily the lessee who is the responsible party; as noted in all Land Use Review decisions, "These conditions of approval run with the land, unless modified by future land use reviews. As used in the conditions, the term "applicant" includes the applicant for this land use review, any person undertaking development pursuant to this land use review, the proprietor of the use or development approved by this land use review, and the current owner and future owners of the property subject to this land use review."

One minor edit to make Condition of Approval B unambiguous would be to add the term "applicant" (shown underlined below); this addition would be an intentional establishment of the responsible party. The Condition with this edit would read as follows:

*B.* The proposed on-site SW Moody Avenue frontage improvements (noted in the approved plans as "Future Development" and including the proposed conversion of parking to ground level retail at the East Elevation and the kinetic water feature at the intersection of SW Moody and Bancroft) shall be completed <u>by the applicant</u> within 120 days of substantial completion of at least the adjacent half-street public right-of-way improvements.

Condition of Approval C: The originally suggested Condition of Approval C (requiring Phase 2 improvements for the portion of the site facing SW Bancroft) mirrored the language of Condition of Approval B above. However, PBOT staff raised concerns with regard to how the previous right of way land would be conveyed. These concerns led to the current wording requiring Phase 2 improvements along SW Bancroft to happen with "the applicant's or its successor's acceptance of conveyance of property currently held in the public right of way to the landowner." The way in which the current Condition of Approval C is written suggests that Phase 2, with regard to SW Bancroft development, will happen only if the applicant accepts the property.

BDS staff and PBOT staff will work together to determine more definitive language requiring the applicant to be the responsible party for developing Phase 2 at SW Bancroft with the street's realignment. This revised language will be provided to you prior to February 16, 2011.

5. If the proposed processing center and its supporting offices are determined to be a Detention Facility, a Type III Conditional Use Review is required per Table 130-1 and a Type III Central City Parking Review is required per 33.510.267 A.6.b.(2) third bullet point. The approval criteria for the Type III CU are found at 33.815.205, Detention Facilities and they address appearance, safety and public services. Such a review would normally consider not only the Detention Facility portion of the project, but also the part of the project that would normally be allowed by right. So, all of the transportation impacts, for example, of the office portion of the project will be subject to the service adequacy criteria. Council directed staff to suggest a Condition of Approval for the current land use review case if the determination is made that the processing center and its supporting parking and offices are classified as a Detention Facility, which would require a Type III Conditional Use Review and a Type III Central City Parking Review. Staff offers below 2 conditions for Council to choose from. The first would require a Conditional Use review that would consider the entire project; the second would require a Conditional Use review that would consider only the portion of the project that is directly related to the Detention Facility (including associated office and parking).

#### > Suggested new Condition of Approval for the entire project:

"If the building is to include a use subject to a Type III Conditional Use review per Table 130-1, building permits in compliance with LU 10-145100 DZM cannot be issued until a final City decision is made on the required Type III Conditional Use and Central City Parking Reviews."

OR

- Suggested new Condition of Approval for the Detention Facility portion of the project: "LU 10-145100 DZM only approves a building addition, building renovation, and sitework that includes Office and Retail uses with associated parking. Building permits for Office and Retail uses with associated parking can be issued once this land use review is final. Building permits for a Detention Facility with supporting office use and associated parking cannot be issued until a final City decision is made on the required Type III Conditional Use and Central City Parking Reviews."
- 6. Legislative intent regarding the Zoning Code definition of Detention Facilities:
  - Staff was unable to find any legislative intent/commentary regarding the inclusion of the Detention Facility use category, and its characteristics and examples, as part of the new Zoning Code in 1991. Prior to 1991 the Zoning Code didn't provide a definition or specific approval criteria for such facilities, only stating that corrections facilities require approval through conditional use.
- 7. City records regarding previously approved Detention Facilities:
  - LU 10-146928 (Wapato Jail). Approval of a Type III Conditional Use in order to remove and replace previously applied conditions of approval for a 525 bed Detention Facility. The Zoning Code in 33.920.520 classifies jails as Detention Facilities.
  - LU 09-110935 (2205 NE Columbia Blvd). Approval of Type III Conditional Use for a Detention Facility involving the expansion of an existing probation/parole office operated by Multnomah County. Expansion will increase existing floor area from 9,987 square feet to approximately 17,256 square feet. The Zoning Code in 33.920.520 classifies probation centers as Detention Facilities.
  - LU 09-111841 (6000 NE 80<sup>th</sup>). Approval of Type III Conditional Use for a Detention Facility to increase the number of beds at the Oregon Halfway House, a program serving federal offenders for post incarceration and community sanction services. The Zoning Code in 33.920.110 classifies halfway houses where residents are supervised by "peace officers" as Detention Facilities.
  - LU 02-116629 (Inverness Jail). Approval of Type III Conditional Use to increase the number of inmates of the jail from 971 to 1068. The Zoning Code in 33.920.520 classifies jails as Detention Facilities.
  - Downtown Justice Center. The building was built in the 1980's. Staff is unable to find Conditional Use history for the <u>use</u>. Staff only found conditional use reviews for rooftop antennas and for parking associated with the uses in the building. The parking was subject to a Conditional Use review because the Zoning Code at that time required Conditional Use reviews for downtown parking.
- 9. Legislative intent regarding the Zoning Code definition of Basic Utilities:

- "Public safety facilities" are Basic Utilities. While the subject processing area resembles a Basic Utility, which specifically speaks to "holding cells", the definition of a public safety facility states it is a "facility necessary to respond to an immediate hazard to the public health and safety, and that is <u>owned</u>, leased, or operated by the City of Portland. (emphasis added) Staff was unable to find any legislative intent behind the requirement for City ownership.
- 10. City records regarding previously approved Basic Utilities:
  - BDS has processed many Conditional Use reviews for uses such as fire stations, police stations, pump stations, water towers, light rail stations, etc. These facilities have all been owned, operated or leased by the City of Portland. At the January 19<sup>th</sup> hearing, Commissioner Leonard specifically asked about the east side precinct. That facility located on SE 106<sup>th</sup> Avenue was originally reviewed in 1995 as a Basic Utility through a Conditional Use review because the site was zoned R1 (Table 120-1 Primary Uses in Residential Zones). The project included administrative offices, a community meeting room, locker facilities for officers, and a prisoner detention area. Through the Outer Southeast Community Plan, the site was rezoned to CXd and today the use is allowed by right and all conditions of approval associated with the conditional use review no longer apply.

Central City Fundamental Design Guidelines and the South Waterfront Design Guidelines. Central City Plan Design Goals

8. Assist in creating a 24-hour Central City which is safe, humane and prosperous;

Finding: There is a K-8 school located adjacent to the subject site. The applicant has not demonstrated how the proposed building will meet Goal 8 and therefore has not met the burden of proof. The applicant, knowing that the building will temporarily house people charged with and/or convicted of serious crimes, has not addressed safety impacts to the children attending the adjacent school and to neighborhood residents. The applicant has also not addressed how ICE clients/people in holding cells will be transported into and out of the building. In order to evaluate potential impacts, needed buffering, effective mitigation, the conditional use process should be required. Therefore Goal 8 has not been met.

We are writing to express our strong support of the appeal, to the city council, requesting a Conditional Use Hearing on the Detention and Administrative Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) facility next to the neighborhood Charter school that is scheduled to relocate in the Discovery Center, 60 feet east of the detention facility. We understand that the city approved the detention facility with just a Design Review. Design Reviews are limited to architectural issues such as how a proposed building will look in the neighborhood.

However, city code *requires* a Conditional Use Review for detention facilities and for schools. On that basis, the South Portland Neighborhood Association filed an appeal and testified in strong support of the need for a Conditional Use Hearing. The need for a Conditional Use Hearing is clear considering the following critical factors:

- 1. **Safety**: If an emergency occurs, it is questionable whether or not local law enforcement agencies have the budget, equipment, training and staffing levels to deal with such an emergency.
- 2. **Transportation**: The intersection of Bancroft and Moody appears to be too narrow to handle the 120 plus official cars, trucks and buses ICE claims it needs to support the facility, including transporting the detainees to and from South Waterfront. Also, it has to be determined whether or not the public transportation system can handle additional passenger load.
- 3. **Parking**: ICE anticipates a work force of at least 150 employees. No on-site employee parking is planned. Therefore, those who drive cars will have to park on the street. Given the limited parking spaces in South Waterfront, this presents a significant problem for that area.
- 4. **School location**: The ICE facility will be less than 300 feet from a school. U.S. Government (GSA) regulations specify that this sort of detention facility cannot be within 300 feet of a school. The ICE facility will be located just 60 feet from the neighborhood school. Mayor Adams, and to whom it may concern,

At this point I am wondering what in the world the city and the federal government are doing. This area has struggled so hard to overcome the downturn in the economy and the over building of condos in the Portland area. At this juncture, the proposal for this building that will house federal offices and holding for illegals, is designed so badly, I find it hard to fathom why, with these kind of changes, you would expect the area to grow and thrive. The traffic patterns are already not great, there is a large office building going in on Moody, Moody avenue is going under a huge construction, and there are really only 2 entrances and exits from the immediate area. There is also a low income housing project going in on Bancroft and we pay one of the highest millage rates in the entire Multnomah County, a real cash cow for Multnomah County and Portland. We have no supermarket or other needs for a neighborhood, other than a park, like even being able to buy a postage stamp, available to us. As a green planned area, it seems strange to me that we have to get into our cars for the most simple errands. And yet, this kind of construction will not make it any easier to engage prospective merchants to the overpriced leasable spaces still sitting empty. Where has the planning gone? Do we actually have a PDC anymore? What is their role in the development of an area? At what point do they just abandon a planned project and let it become a mishmash of design elements and inconvenient and inappropriate choices? I am less than impressed with the mess that is taking over the area and yet, no one at city hall seems to have any concerns about the overall plan or lack of development planning now happening in the South Waterfront. I am all for low income housing, certainly my 3 children would no doubt qualify to live there, but a holding building with not one, but two fences. Then there is the possibility that the lower portion will have to be rebuilt when the lightrail goes in. What a mess! Please take more time and care in the planning aspects of these changes to this marginal area and consider the residents who have bought into the original plan and actually LIVE there.

I am forever standing up for you with voters who are less than enamored with the way things are going throughout the city, would you please stand up for us? This is not just a rant, I am very upset about the overall changes to the original plan for the area without regard for the residents who live there. This letter is to urge you to hold a "Conditional Use Review" concerning the Detention and Administrative ICE facility at 4350 SW Macadam Avenue.

A Conditional Use Review is needed for you to hold a thorough, complete, and transparent review process of the ICE location project.

My husband and I have lived on Landing Drive and on Bond Avenue. The intersection governed by the light at Bancroft and Moody is a narrow road, narrowing to 2 lanes just at the entrance to the building. We do not see how 120+ official cars, trucks, buses needed to transport detainees and support a detention center can possibly be handled without causing serious congestion. Cars may be backed up through the light, onto highway 43 (Macadam).

Parking will also be very difficult. ICE has indicated it will need a work force of at least 150. Yet there is no on-site parking planned. Where on the nearby streets will employees park? There are only a few parking spaces on the street; the lot across from the building becomes a construction site this spring. ICE mentions attorneys and family members visiting detainees; where will they park? South Waterfront residents have limited parking available now; their guests compete for the metered spots.

Of greater concern to us is the fact that the City and South Waterfront planning groups have wanted to include young families with children in the area. A great deal of money and effort have provided the Elizabeth Caruthers Park, the walkway from Bancroft to the Greenway, a new childcare facility and school near OHSU, and a development for lowincome families. A neighborhood school will be just 60 feet from the ICE, just across the trolley lines. By Oregon and federal law, a school and a detention center cannot be located so closely. If there is an emergency now in a neighborhood, law enforcement locks down a school. The chances of an emergency rise considerably if ICE is so close to a school. There would be little time to marshall law enforcement people to protect the school children.

We ask you to hold a "Conditional Use Review" sos that answers to these concerns can be examined and shared with all who use the South Waterfront area.

We are residence of South Waterfront and urge you to order a "Conditional Use Review" of the proposed ICE detention facility at South Waterfront.

The presence of a detention facility in our neighborhood raises serious questions that can only be addressed in a Conditional Use Review. These include:

**Safety:** The facility will be less than 300 feet from the neighborhood charter school, as is required by Federal code. Also, it is not clear whether or not local law enforcement agencies have the budget, personnel, equipment and training to deal with an emergency at the detention facility.

Please consider the following as our continued testimony in the Appeal Hearing of LU 10-145100 at 4310 SW Macadam Avenue commonly referred to as the ICE facility. This in reference to the use issue for the project at said address. Title 33 of the City Code details the Planning and Zoning regulations for the City of Portland. These regulations define the zones which are assigned throughout the City and spell out what is allowed in each zone as well as what is not allowed in each zone. Title 33 also details the procedures to be followed as projects make their way through the approval system. City staff has followed a course with this project so that we have been denied the protection that we should have had under Title 33. This appeal is made to ask that City Council correct the project course so that we can have the protection provided under Title 33 through the process of the Conditional Use Review. We also think that City Council and Staff should be interested in the answers provided during the Conditional Use Review.

In the Preface of the Title 33 Document it says that one of the goals is "providing certainty in regulations". We are sure that you will see the certainty in the definitions and examples. Lets take a quick look at some applicable portions of Title 33 as they relate to this project. Portions of the Title 33 text are included on Page 3 for your convenience.

Some questions surfaced during the testimony at the appeal hearing about Primary Uses and about Conditional Uses. Here the Item C of Conditional Uses falls under the heading of Primary Uses. The uses shown on Table 130-1 as a CU are allowed if approved through the conditional use review process. So the Detention Center Use is a Primary Use. (See Table 130-1)

Clearly Detention Facilities are a use allowed within Zone CX with Conditional Use Review Required. We maintain that this table means just what it says and nothing less. A proposed project that includes Detention Facilities is not allowed in the CX Zone without going through the Conditional Use Review. Period. Contrary to what staff suggests, there is no limitation that if the detention use portion of a project is less than a specified percentage of the total area, it can be ignored or it can be otherwise approved. <u>There is no alternative to the Conditional Use Review</u> <u>because it is required.</u> (See Table 130-1)

**Detention Facilities** (under the heading of Conditional Uses) This is the criteria of the review process that this project would have to address if you direct City staff to submit the project through the Conditional Use Review. There are several of the items here that you heard concerns about during the hearing on Wednesday.

Concerning safety, there will be no answers for the neighborhood without going through the required Conditional Use Review. Is it possible that even City Staff is not asking these questions either? Of course we can't imagine a school right across the trolley tracks where someone may decide to create a hostage situation in order to free their family or friend. We must recognize that some of the detainees are from different cultures and "solve" their problems differently than our law abiding citizens. Remember the lady who owns Columbia Sportswear for a recent example.

We think there are problems with the existing street and driveway configuration. There is a short piece of Bancroft Street between two intersections where the driveway enters the street. The only way we can envision them getting their busses and cars out into traffic is to send a couple of the Law Enforcement Officers out to stop traffic so that they can exit the driveway. Is that the way they are planning to do it?

We also need to hear how the designers plan to provide parking for the 100+ employees of the building since they are not providing any on-site parking for them. Will they be parking at the Old Spaghetti Factory? The City closed the off-street parking lot available to us residents last fall. In order to get a parking lot approved on one of the South Waterfront Blocks, the project will have to go through a Conditional Use Review. Isn't that just too much of a coincidence? But continuing the thought of parking; where will the immigration attorneys park when visiting their clients who are detained at the facility? Where will the families and friends of the detainees park while they are visiting? You see, for us parking is a big issue here in South Waterfront because there is so little of it here. OHSU had to provide several parking lots for their employees and students to park because there was no other parking available. Currently people are parking on Block xx but that will start construction in the spring and will not be available for parking any longer. We can't imagine ICE allowing "clients" and "client families" to park within their secure facility while they are being processed or visiting. By following the Conditional Use Review process required for Detention Centers, these questions could be asked and could be addressed. Up to this point, we are not sure even your staff are asking these questions because they have not followed the required procedure.

Finally we get to the Descriptions of the Use Categories where we can determine what Detention Facilities are for Title 33 Uses. Can this project be defined without acknowledging the detention facility use? ICE testified that most of the detainees at the proposed facility come from prisons or jails. Those **persons have not been released** and are still under custody and are now being "considered for deportation.

Some of the testimony at Wednesday's appeal hearing would have us believe that since deportation is a civil matter (really?) rather than a criminal matter, this detention can't be considered to be judicially required, therefore not meeting a characteristic required. They also state that this center will only be operational for 12 hours each day and therefore the 24 hour requirement would not be met. Here again most of the detainees will be picked up at prisons or jails, taken to the project facility, held and processed for deportation and then taken to Tacoma for further detention, never being free from the appropriate supervision of peace officers. This use seems to have the characteristics of the detention use even though all of the facility is not specifically designated for this use.

The accessory uses are some of the uses planned in this facility, so that appears OK with the definition.

The Examples were discussed by several of the speakers at the appeal hearing. In order to get to the bottom of the meaning, I would take us back to the Preface where it says, "providing certainty in regulations". We should be looking at these examples as types of uses that would be included in the definition of detention facilities. In this project the ICE detention facilities portion of the building use would probably fall somewhere between a probation center where the clients are not restrained and the other three examples. How could that part of the building not be Detention Center? It is used as a Detention Center.

No matter how we look at it, the detention facilities use portion of the project has to require the Conditional Use Review. We urge City Council to direct staff to process this project through that process. If you still have any doubts, better to be safe than sorry. Thank you.

I took time off from work to attend the meeting at City Hall on Wednesday. I had heard about the installation of an ICE facility in my neighborhood and thought it would be prudent to find out exactly what it was. I went there with the opinion that many in my neighborhood might be reading more into this project than warranted, and were worrying for no reason. I thought the questions the commissioners asked were in line with what I would have

asked. All in all it was a great experience.

Now, I would like to give you my take on what I heard. I heard that the developer does not feel they need to go through some of the litmus tests other developers are subjected to. They stated it is just a business office that happens to have a few holding cells. They explained the people using these holding cells are not legally incarcerated detainees, and therefore are not considered prisoners, which alleviate them from certain rules and regulations. They presented a couple of codes to support their claims.

This is where the waters got a little muddy.

One code spoke about office buildings. An office building is allowed to have additions that would serve as conveniences to the employees. The code mentioned, exercise rooms, lunch rooms, etc. The developer stated this code is not all inclusive and open to interpretation. This would support their including "Holding Cells"

Another code was brought up.

This code was one that required developers to follow certain restrictions when dealing with legally detained or incarcerated men and women. The description of what a legal detainee would include, was written much like the description of what additions to offices included in the previous code. No surprise, the developer decided this code was NOT open to interpretation, and concluded the people they would be ushering to and from that site under "Armed Guard", did not meet the criteria of a prisoner or legally incarcerated detainee.

Now, I consider myself a logical person. Any man or woman that is being escorted by an official police force, and does not have the freedom to choose where they are going and when, are in fact legally incarcerated. Building additions to be used by the office employees do not include Holding Cells. This is in fact a very small jail, which will received criminals awaiting deportation hearings.

If they can meet the proper codes and guidelines for jails and the area usage guidelines, by all means let them build. But please do not let the developer and their legal staff get away with slipping something into my neighborhood using back door methods.

It is an amazing school with a focused vision (Science, Arts and Civics) and the promise to help our children both grow into responsible adults and to contribute back to the community.

Therefore I am alarmed and saddened that the City did not follow its own procedures in permitting what will be our neighbor for Southwest Charter for years to come. The permit for this neighboring space was permitted as "Office Space." However, part of the intent of the building is to house a jail. Having a federal prison (even if a small one) directly adjacent to an elementary school is inappropriate and potentially dangerous. In the long-term, it could mean a devastating event which the City is then responsible for in permitting this use. In the short-term, it could mean the demise of a fantastic new educational option in a place that is underserved by Portland's current public education options, in an area set to grow and be a place of great strength for the city.

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#### Members of the City Council,

I appreciate the opportunity to voice my opinion and share my concerns regarding the proposed ICE facility to be located at the intersection of Bancroft and Macadam Avenues. My son's school building is in the process of being renovated and nearing completion. Our building is 100' away from the proposed ICE facility. After attending the hearing on January 19<sup>th</sup> I was left with a lot of questions. I am hopeful that during this extended review period I will be able to have my questions answered by those in charge of this project.

- 1. How and where will individuals being serviced at this facility enter the building?
  - a. Will they enter on their own free will, unrestrained?
  - b. Will there be instances when individuals are entering under armed escort?
  - c. Will individuals enter or exit the building in restraints?

My concern with the above is both line of sight and safety. If restrained individuals are entering or exiting the building in close proximity to our school facility what steps are being planned to prevent the children from witnessing this? I do not see how the vision of a man or woman in restraints and under armed escort would not make a lasting impression on a 5 year old Kindergarten student. Could there be an alternative entrance and exit for the detention center portion of the building? My other concern relates to safety. If an individual is escorted in under armed guard would our school receive notification so we could make adequate arrangements to protect our children? I'm not sure what the effect this would have on any sort of safety/lockdown policy that most schools have in place. It's my understanding that if there's a legitimate threat of gunfire then the children need to be kept indoors. If there's an armed guard 100' away isn't there constantly the legitimate threat of gunfire?

2. Approximately how much foot traffic can we expect to see passing through this facility? And what impact does ICE expect to see on car traffic?

Our children spend a great deal of their day outside exploring their environment; it is part of our school's mission statement. We seek out opportunities to get them outside the classroom so that they can connect with the world around them. If there is a substantial increase in vehicle traffic what steps are being taken to ensure the safety of the children walking through the neighborhood? Will there be additional cross walks added or speed humps to slow traffic? How will this effect on street parking? Where will the buses park that would be used to transport the detainees to Tacoma? What time of day would that bus leave? How will this impact the flow of traffic from 150 families dropping off and picking up their children?

I realize that at the end of the hearing on the 19<sup>th</sup> comment was made comparing this situation to the current NW Broadway building and the proximity to Emerson School. I looked at Yahoo Maps after the hearing. Those two facilities are .3 miles apart, on parallel streets and separated by approximately six city blocks, I hardly think that this can be considered the same thing. Our facility is .01 miles, quite literally a stone's throw,

away. While I understand the desire to make sense of this situation by comparing it to Emerson and the NW Broadway building I see more differences than similarities and I would caution against using that as a model for this unique situation. My son will be able to wave hello to the armed guards outside this building some families at Emerson may not have even been aware that there was a government building .3 miles away.

This facility was approved and pushed through as an office with a detention center on the side yet it was characterized by commission member Ben Kaiser as a "jail".

"It's too bad that a jail is the city's gateway to South Waterfront," said commission member Ben Kaiser after looking at a scale model of the building. "But if it's going to be located here, I'd like to see it be more appealing."

So, which is it? Is it a jail or an office? I do not know of many offices that require a "secure entranceway with a bulletproof guard post" as reported in that same article. And those that do are not typically located 100' away from a K-8 public charter school.

I write today first and foremost as a mother. Protecting my son and ensuring his health, well being and safety is my primary motivation. I want to feel assured that my son will be safe to continue at SW Charter School through 8<sup>th</sup> grade, as we have planned, if this office/detention center goes through. But by being kept out of the planning and review process I cannot feel assured of anything remotely close to that. No one has said, ask me your questions, I will answer them and that is honestly all I'm asking for. Because of that silence, I just don't know what to expect from ICE as our neighbor. I don't know that my son would be safe. And neither do you. Such a small distance separates the facilities, .01 miles, 100', that feels like nothing compared to the 1/3 of a mile that separates Emerson and the soon to be vacant NW Broadway building. I also write today as a frustrated citizen. I do not understand why this building was not subject to Conditional Use from the beginning. Mr. Davis commented that the Naturopathic College had to go through Conditional Use, but a far more controversial facility was allowed to be pushed through until people started jumping up and down, figuratively speaking, and making noise. This is a dramatic change for the neighborhood and I cannot understand why the neighborhood was not involved in the process sooner. It certainly could have eased my personal fears to have been invited into this process sooner. Instead for me, I feel like this building is being foisted on us when we are on the verge of moving into our newly renovated home.

Our school is like the Little Engine that Could, we have worked so hard to surmount challenge after challenge all for the sake of our children. My son loves his school, as do I. It is unique and a true blessing for him and for the City. We've waited for this opportunity of having our own building where all the grades can come together and we can settle and focus on building our school and enhancing our program even further and now there is a cloud hanging over what should be a very joyful time. I should be thrilled to be close to moving into our Bancroft building; instead I'm waiting, unsure, unsettled and afraid, waiting to see what happens with this ICE project. I know I for one just want some answers and I hope that this process will enable me to get those answers.

Thank you for reviewing my questions, comments and concerns. I would welcome any opportunity to continue this discussion with the City and I look forward to seeing this issue resolved in the best interest of all involved.

Commissioner Fritz,

First, thank you for giving me the opportunity to voice my concerns, however briefly, today. This was my first experience as an adult down in City Hall. I don't think I've actually been inside the building since I was 8 and my class had a field trip down for lunch with Mayor Bud.

My son and I had to leave early today due to a scheduling conflict with our school auction committee meeting. I'm curious to know what, if any, decisions have been made.

I understand citizens have an opportunity to pose more questions about this facility and I am not sure where I should be directing my questions. If you are not the appropriate person please pass on my questions to whoever that might be.

After seeing the design renderings, for the first time, I did have some logistical questions come to mind. First, under what circumstances will potential detainees enter the building? Specifically, will they be entering on their own volition, as if in response to a summons, walking in unguarded? Will there be circumstances where individuals will enter the building escorted by police or armed Immigration employees? If there are individuals being escorted in or out under armed guard would our school then require notification so we can lock down the children? (I'm not sure how that process works but it was my understanding as a parent if there was any threat of gunfire we would have to have some sort of response in place.) Would there be circumstances of individuals entering or leaving in restraints? And through what door would that occur? My primary concern with this facility is that such individuals would enter or exit in plain view site of my son and his classmates and that would be a frightening thing for a child to see.

My son is only six years old. Yesterday when I explained what the building was to him he was upset, frightened even. He actually told me that maybe he'd need to change schools and this came from a child that loves his school and worships his teacher. The mere face that he felt scared enough to say that broke my heart; children should have associate school with fear.

I'm grateful that we have the opportunity to continue this discussion, honestly though I wish we would have been invited into this process earlier on. It feels so late in the game that some families may feel discouraged from speaking up. Being new to this political process it's all a bit overwhelming and somewhat confusing, so if you would be so kind as to forward my questions to the appropriate parties I would be very grateful.

Good afternoon Commissioner Fritz,

My name is Krista Rodriguez. I was born and raised in Portland; I attended Skyline Elementary, West Tualatin View Elementary, West Sylvan Middle School and graduated in 1992 from Benson High School. After I graduated from Western Oregon University I resettled in the Portland metro area to raise my family and am now running a successful automotive shop with my husband in SW Portland.

I write to you today as a life long Portland native and as a concerned Mother. You see, my son is a 1<sup>st</sup> grader at Southwest Charter School. As I am sure you are well aware there is some debate going on in the City about the decision to locate an Immigration Detention Center a few hundred feet away from my son's new School Building which is in the final stages of renovation before we can occupy it. I am very concerned about this decision and I truly believe it is not in the best interest of the City to allow this to proceed. I think we can all agree that the City of Portland needs to invest in the future. That future is our children. Our children have a right to feel safe when they walk into their school building. They have a right to feel safe when they are outside for recess-our kids get recess twice a day-I ask you, can they feel safe when there is an armed guard shack a few hundred feet away? Can I as a Mother feel safe with a decision to house potentially dangerous people a stone's throw away from my son? Would you? I realize we are talking about hypothetical danger here but it is a legitimate concern. All it takes is one attempted escape. One shot fired. Bullets do not always find their intended target.

Our school is one of Portland's best kept secrets. It is an amazing place where my son is inspired every day to be a thinker, to

become a leader, to become the future of Portland. I would hate to see the enrollment drop in this school because of the City's decision to proceed with this and this is something that I think parents will factor in when they consider our school. It would be a tragedy in its own right if enrollment was effected and the school closed. If you could see the dedication of these people you would understand why I feel so passionate about our school. These teachers love my son, even the ones that have never taught his class, they all know him by name. They are all working together to create the best education possible for my son and so many other children, and the school needs you to support it. My son needs you to support him and keep him safe so he can thrive and become a future leader in the City. It might sound cliché, but the children really are our future and they should come first on our priority list.

I realize, sadly, that there is a need for a facility such as this but I cannot believe that there is no better location than next door to an Elementary School. I do not believe that locating this facility next to my son's school and in the middle of an up and coming urban development area is in the best interest of the City and it definitely is not in the best interest of my six year old son. I am asking as a life long Portland native, a business owner and a Mother for the City to reconsider this decision and relocate the Detention Facility to a more appropriate area.

#### GSA remarks for Portland City Council hearing January 19, 2011

Thank you for your time today. My name is Scott Matson, and I am the Branch Chief of the Real Estate Acquisition Division for the Northwest Arctic Region of the U.S. General Services Administration, or GSA.

GSA is a federal government agency that manages real estate needs for federal agency customers. We signed a lease on behalf of our customer, the Department of Homeland Security Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) with the applicant in April 2010. We are here to ask for your support of this project.

ICE needs this new building because their existing facility no longer meets their requirements. ICE is currently housed in the 511 Building, a federally-owned facility in the Pearl District that was declared excess to the government in 2005. A new facility will allow ICE to consolidate operations currently housed in separate facilities, which will save taxpayer money. Once ICE moves out of the 511 Building, the facility will be transferred at no cost to the Pacific Northwest College of Art, providing additional classroom space to meet their expanding needs.

The process of finding a new home for ICE began in the early 90s. Executive Order 12072 mandates that the "process for meeting Federal space needs in urban areas shall give first consideration to a centralized community business area," or CBD. We understand the importance of a vital and healthy downtown and only move agencies outside the CBD when their mission requires it, or when no suitable space can be found. The site at 4310 SW Macadam meets the Government's requirements and is located within Portland's CBD.

We have heard the message loud and clear from you Mayor Adams, from the PDC, and from Portland's congressional delegation that keeping federal agencies in the CBD is critical for the economic health of downtown Portland. This lease will inject 2.1 million dollars per year for 15 years into Portland's struggling downtown real estate market.

GSA believes this neighborhood and facility are good matches for our customer and for Portland. This move does not represent an expansion of ICE's mission, just a consolidation of existing staff and operations. The operations currently ongoing in the Pearl District will simply move to the South Waterfront neighborhood. I spoke with Elizabeth Godfrey, the Assistant Field Office Director for ICE. Elizabeth has worked on immigration issues in Portland for more than 20 years, and informed me that her organization's neighbors in the Pearl District have never registered a complaint, and that ICE hopes to have the same positive relationship with their new neighbors in the South Waterfront neighborhood.

Finally, we have heard objections to this project on the grounds that the Southwest Charter School plans to expand their facility into a building within 300 feet of the new ICE facility. It is

correct that ICE may not locate within 300 feet of an educational institution, and at the time the lease was signed no educational institutions were located within the limitation. We have offered to brief the South Portland Neighborhood Association on this project and discuss their concerns about the ICE facility, and that offer still stands.

GSA believes this project is beneficial for ICE, for the federal employees who will work there, for Portland's CBD, and the American taxpayer. Granting this appeal will mean that GSA will have to start over for a third time to find a new location at additional cost to the taxpayer and risk moving outside the CBD.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak in support of this project.

Mayor and City Commissioners and City Staff:

In the past it has been my responsibility to supervise staff at various levels. Occasionally I have had to revisit decisions made and directions followed by those staff members. And so it is with you here today. Staff had defined this project as an addition to existing office building. The proposed use of this new building will be <u>Office with accessory uses</u>. Then those accessory uses are described as Lobby, Loading Area, Processing Area, General Office layout, Gym, Lunch Room, Circulation space and Outdoor Terrace.

But the Architect memo of 5/11/10 described the facility as a <u>High Security Jail or</u> <u>Detention Center with accessory Office use</u>. And the GSA document SFO No. 60R0135 states that holding cells be of high security construction and that space must be capable of maintaining a high level of security.

It is now your task to determine if this Detention Center use can be allowed in South Waterfront without following the Conditional Use procedure. The last paragraph of the Central Commercial Zone (CX) from Title 33.130.030 (H) is as follows: "Development is intended to be pedestrian-oriented with a strong emphasis on a safe and attractive streetscape". Title 33.130 Table 130-1 shows Detention Facilities in the CX zone as "**Conditional Use Review Required**". It does not say "Allowed, but Special Limitations" like some other uses. It does not say allowed if less than 40% of total building use or 20% of building use. It **says required**. And that is what we are asking for today. Please tell staff to run this project through Conditional Use Review like what is required by City of Portland Code. Even Title 33.920.520 has a definition of Detention Facilities which includes Item B as "<u>Accessory uses include offices</u>, recreational and health facilities, etc."

The City of Portland along with developers has created a sustainable neighborhood in South Waterfront and we thank you for that. Now we are asking you to keep it sustainable and send this project through the Conditional Use Review Process. Just the traffic problems with this site will probably cause ICE to move on. Thank you.

Towers may be self supporting, guyed, or mounted on poles or buildings.
- B. Accessory Uses. Accessory use may include transmitter facility buildings.

At least 3 issues require further study and a "Conditional Use" study and approval for the above referenced project.

1. Use: The proposed project will contain 59000 sq. ft. of space of which a portion is identified as "holding cells". Although these actual cells may only require 10% more or less of the space they are not incidental to the use of the building, they are the primary purpose of the facility, and require 8 foot double fencing, security checkpoint, guard house, and vehicle inspection. Such a jail type use should be subject to Conditional Use hearing and approval.

2. Parking: The proposed project will contain 54000 sq. ft. of parking. The proposal suggests 101 cars or approximately 2 cars for each 1000 sq. ft. of finished space. A very liberal ratio compared to other Downtown buildings. 400 sq. ft. per car would provide 135 car parking and possibly even more. One car per 1000 sq. ft. would provide 54 car parking a more likely standard. A Conditional Use study is needed to determine the appropriate allowance.

3. Traffic: The intersection of SW Macadam and SW Bancroft is an unusual configuration, with a stop-light. Macadam is one-way going north at this juncture. Bancroft only proceeds east. The east bound cross traffic comes from north to south either from an I-5 ramp off the Marquam Bridge, a Ross Island Bridge west bound ramp,or downtown via Naito Parkway. Traffic backs up under a freeway overpass and has no left turn sight line. There is no immediate on-street parking on Bancroft or Macadam. Traffic could back-up on both Bancroft and Macadam seeking entry which could create a dangerous problem. This should require a traffic safety study as part of the Conditional Use study.

Thank you so much for your service for our beloved city Portland.

Unfortunately, I have been very concerned for the last several months that a "High Security" detention facility with accessory office use would be very close to my new peaceful condo home. I moved to South Waterfront community to have a more peaceful and secure life. I never dreamed that the high security jail would be the South "gateway" to my community.

My specific concerns are as follows:

- 1. I am afraid of traffic congestion and safety issues at the corner of Bancroft, Moody and Macadam. The only entrance to the proposed jail right now is on Bancroft Street, which has only one lane for each direction. "With more than 54,000 square feet of planned parking on the site, traffic could be heavy in mornings and evenings, especially with fast-moving traffic on Macadam Avenue, which runs perpendicular to Bancroft."
- 2. I understand that the proposed jail is located less than 100 feet of the Discovery Center which is now planned as a charter school, a facility that is much needed in our community. Will we lose the charter school because it would be less than 300 feet from the jail?
- 3. The jail is inconsistent with approved affordable housing to be constructed diagonally across the street on Moody and Bancroft.
- 4. Some real estate folks estimate a 10% further reduction to our already depressed home prices. Especially since the jail is located at the South "gateway" to our community.

In error, BDS staff made a determination that the above referenced land use matter should not be required to go through a Conditional Use Permit. Staff concluded that the proposed detention facility is an office use and therefore an outright permitted use. In fact, the true nature of the land use is a detention facility -- not an office use as city staff has stated. The purpose of the land use in question is to hold individuals in custody. It is not an office in the traditional sense and the office use is in fact secondary to the detention facility, not the other way around as staff has concluded. Without the detention facility, there would be no need for the office support. Furthermore, converting the use from an existing retail use to the proposed detention facility is clearly a change in use and should be required to go through a Conditional Use Review. There are numerous impacts from the proposal, including safety and transportation, which need to be thoroughly addressed.

Lastly, there are significant issues in terms of land use compatibility. Adjacent to the proposed detention facility is an elementary school serving K-8. In no way is this a compatible land use. In addition, there is a Montessori school located within one block.

Ultimately the nature of the facility does not fit with the goals of the South Waterfront vision. The vision called for embracing the principles of Smart Growth in terms of land uses. A detention facility in no way embodies this vision of creating a vibrant, walkable urban neighborhood.

Dear Mayor Adams;

My wife and I recently moved into Mirabella retirement community on the South Waterfront. This location was important to us because of the high quality of the area and its potential for further development. The appeal of the area includes, but is not limited to, access to public transportation, the provision for affordable housing, the proximity to OHSU, the new park, and the recently announced land bridge across Interstate 5. Also, we are looking forward to new residential construction that will encourage the development of a strong infrastructure for the area, including grocery markets and other retail outlets.

It has recently come to our attention that the Portland Design Commission has approved a three-story building connected to an existing four-story building to provide office space for the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Unit operations and include seven temporary holding cells for those facing criminal and administrative violations tied to customs or immigration laws. The property will be surrounded by an 8 foot high metal fence that has a security checkpoint, a guardhouse and a vehicle inspection site.

It has further come to our attention, that this project was approved for construction without benefit of a use study. It would seem that moving ahead with this building, without studying the impact on the surrounding area, does not take into consideration the negative affect that such a facility would have on this community.

Some real estate people estimate that the facility could result in a 10% further reduction to the already depressed home prices in this area. A traffic congestion and safety issue at the corner of Bancroft, Moody and Mcadam is another problem. The construction of a jail like facility in a largely residential area is not consistent with the vision of a first-rate residential compound within the city. A planned charter school probably would not be opened because it would be less than 300 feet from the jail. Not having the school would have a negative impact on the age diversity we all hope for.

Developers and residents have each invested well over \$600 million in the South Waterfront. The city of Portland has invested several hundred million as well. Further depressing prices will reduce much needed tax revenues and delay further investment and related jobs.

Because there is so much at stake concerning this project it would seem prudent to at least look at the impact such a facility could have on the neighborhood. There are issues that need to be addressed because of the potential

My name is Krista Rodriguez. I was born and raised in Portland; I attended Skyline Elementary, West Tualatin View Elementary, West Sylvan Middle School and graduated in 1992 from Benson High School. After I graduated from Western Oregon University I resettled in the Portland metro area to raise my family and am now running a successful automotive shop with my husband in SW Portland.

I write to you today as a Portland native and as a concerned Mother. You see, my son is a 1<sup>st</sup> grader at Southwest Charter School. As I am sure you are well aware there is some debate going on in the City about the decision to locate an Immigration Detention Center a few hundred feet away from my son's new School Building which is in the final stages of renovation before we can occupy it. I am very concerned about this decision and I truly believe it is not in the best interest of the City to allow this to proceed. I am concerned that we, as the potential new neighbors, only heard about the true nature of the building recently. I am positive that the City would have received quite a bit of feedback from our families had we known the true intent of the building early on in the development stage. It is my understanding that it was presented as an office building, but I do not know of any office building that requires an armed guard shack or barbed wire fencing. I think we can all agree that the City of Portland needs to invest in the future and in this particular area of Portland. There is a huge growth potential in the South Waterfront area. Part of that investment is served by getting businesses to move into that area, that's true. But the other part of that investment is our children and our school, this school is one of Portland's best educational opportunities. My son loves his school, he loves his teacher, he is excited to go and learn everyday and he knows that he's safe, loved and respected. Our children have a right to feel safe when they walk into their school building. They have a right to feel safe when they are outside for recess-our kids get recess twice a day-I ask you, can they feel safe when there is an armed guard shack a few hundred feet away? Can I as a Mother feel safe with a decision to house potentially dangerous people a stone's throw away from my son? Would you? I realize we are talking about hypothetical danger here but it is a legitimate concern. All it takes is one attempted escape. One shot fired. Bullets do not always find their intended target.

I realize, sadly, that there is a need for a facility such as this but I cannot believe that there is no better location than next door to an Elementary School. I do not believe that locating this facility next to my son's school and in the middle of an up and coming urban development area is in the best interest of the City and it definitely is not in the best interest of my six year old son. I am hopeful that a more appropriate location can be found for a building such as this.
