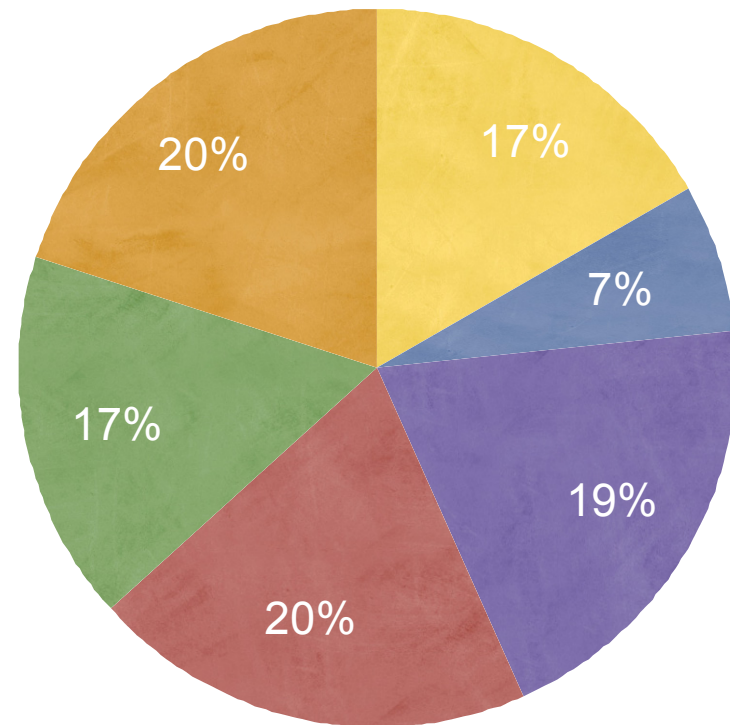

Education Strategies



Summer Youth Connect: A continuum of services that connect youth to academic support, career and college opportunities over the summer time.

Future Connect Scholars: Helping academic priority youth access post-secondary opportunities and support at local high schools and community colleges.

Opportunity Connect: Enhancing youth opportunities to connect to social service, academic and health supports through SUN system and other extended day programs and providers.

Community Connect: Building caring relationships with youth through support from families, communities and educators.



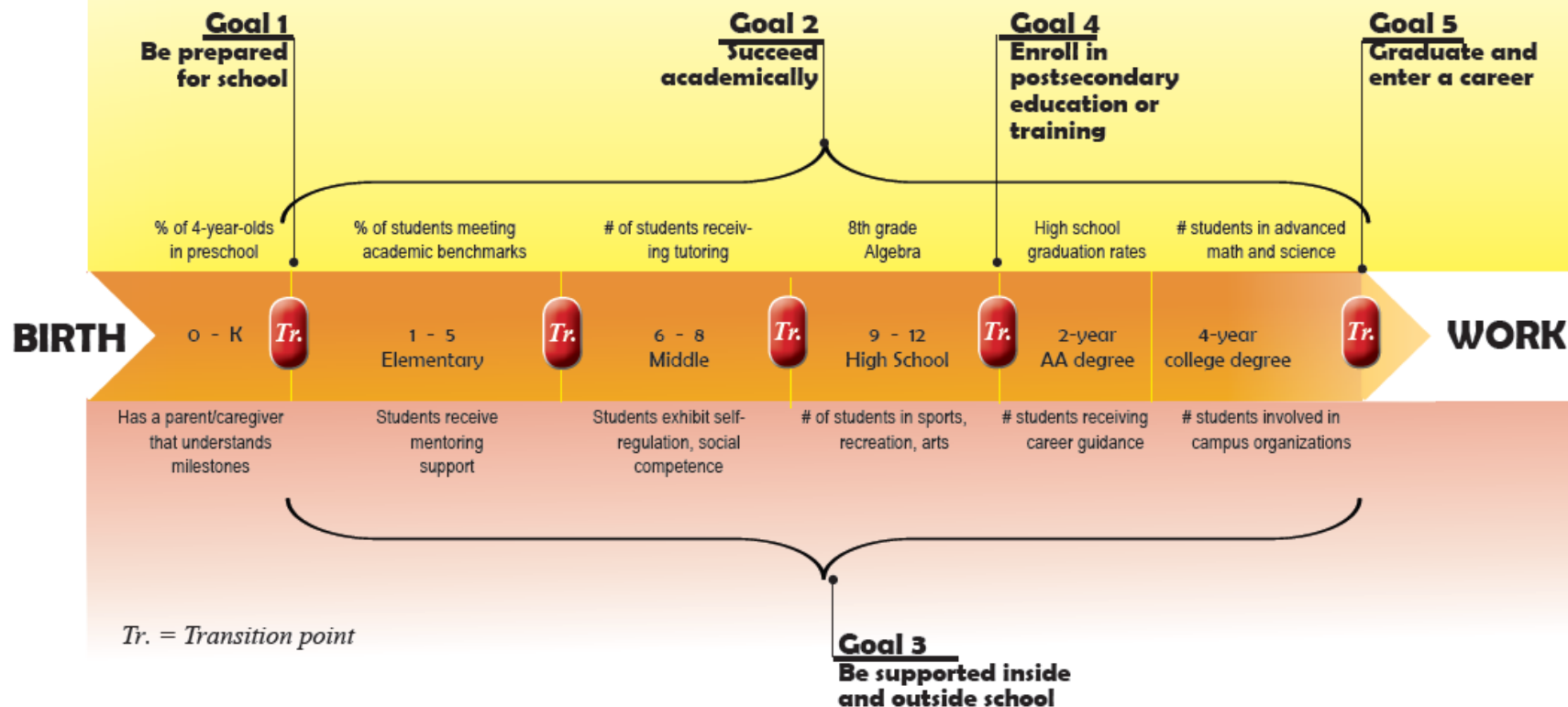
Outcomes



- Increased alignment and integration of City and County services to young people
- Increased investment in summer workforce and engagement opportunities and forged partnerships with over 100 private and non-profit sector employers, 20 colleges and 20 CBOs
- Higher percentage of students entering high school on-track as reported by local superintendents
- Analyzed poverty data and altered college-access outreach to serve larger concentration of parents in low-income neighborhoods
- Changed SUN policy to more effectively engage high-school aged youth.
- Conducted first-ever inventory on drop-out prevention services and now know where investments are being leveraged and how.
- Mapped where our youth and youth services were to know where in our region there are disparities in access to services and the youth that need them
- Held first community-wide education summit to determine how we, as a community can better support our youth
