Before sending our daughter to Kindergarten, if you had said "SUN program" to me, I wouldn't have a clue what you were talking about. I remember seeing that word around, but no one knew what it was. Some knew it stood for Schools Uniting Neighborhoods, but didn't know what that meant.

We enrolled our daughter in her first SUN class at the very tender age of 5. The class was a mixed ages, drama class for kids in Kindergarten through 2nd grade. My wife enrolled her in the class because she was struggling to make friends at the school. Well, not only did she make friends, but she had a bevy of older kids who supported her on the playground when anyone so much as started to make fun of her. Being a drama class with scripts, it also encouraged her to read — in Kindergarten, no less!

Our daughter, and our entire family (including extended family), have been involved with SUN for 6 years now, taking a myriad of classes, making cultural crafts and gifts, riding our bikes and walking to school, donating to Season of Sharing and the Food Bank, stomping our feet (and sweating) at all the community dances and even teaching some classes, and I still struggle to define SUN. Yes, we all can understand the after school enrichment programs; classes teaching instrumental music, foriegn languages, self-defense, drawing, carpentry, gardening, sewing, LEGO robotics, self esteem, reading, math, and science, just to name a few. But SUN also provides tutoring, in groups and one-on-one. This alone, has made a huge impact on our smart, but lagging student, who struggled to do homework at home without turning into an emotional wreck. Her brother attends a school that does not have a SUN program and he is driven to his sister's school so that he can take some of the above mentioned classes. Next year, we'd like to send him to Buckman's SUN program to receive the same homework support he sister has received, that his school cannot provide.

When our school needed math and writing support, SUN provided highly-entertaining and deeply memorable experiences that included stilt walkers, chocolate fountains, debating in togas and writing new laws on "ancient" scrolls — each scroll had singed edges to look and feel like ancient greek scrolls — who does this kind of stuff? SUN does! I still don't think those kids ever realized they were doing math or writing. When they are older, I have no doubt that they will devise clever ways to get kids to do things they don't want to because of these magical experiences that SUN has provided.

This year, I am taking a parenting class that SUN has facilitated. I was apprehensive — who would recognize me? Does this mean I'm a failure as a parent? Without question, it has helped me to understand and relate to my kids better and for us to have more meaningful relationships. It didn't take years for this to happen, just a couple, hour long classes. And I will forever thank SUN for that.

Over the years, I have seen firsthand, the benefits of kids who were matched up with mentors through SUN-one student and his mentor were invited to Washington, DC to attend the national Mentoring Week, where they met President Obama. Not one single person in this child's family would have ever imagined that that would have been possible. SUN made it happen. I've seen families in tears after receiving the bounties of a generous community who donated bags and boxes over-flowing with holiday gifts. Who arranged all this? SUN did. The results were the same with the winter coat program.

I know one family, who had not been struggling before, but found themselves days from being evicted because of a summer of drastic and necessary medical procedures that had drained their savings. Who helped them stay in their home through a vital partner? SUN did. And this isn't the only story like this.

In a way, I am glad that the SUN program is at risk, because it has made me reflect and realize just how valuable SUN is and the great impact it has had in our lives, our school and our community. It is shameful that SUN is hacked at year after year, when it has proven to be an invaluable asset for the entire community. Yes, schools uniting neighborhoods. That's what SUN does. Let's continue to support this.
