2) Purpose of the Proposed Legislation:

To authorize the City of Portland Bureau of Planning and Sustainability (BPS) to accept a Historic Preservation Fund grant in the amount of \$14,500 from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). The grant supplements program funding for the City's historic resources program. The Historic Preservation section of the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability requested the grant as per Ordinance 185135.

SHPO grant funds are appropriated for FY 2011-12 and will be appropriated in FY 2012-13 in the budget for Planning and Sustainability, Green Building Program (PNSD000002). This action will supplement the program budget.

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The Historic Preservation section of the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability requested the grant. This grant will fund projects including inventory of historic masonry structures that are at risk from natural disasters and demolition, and it will supplement program funding for the City's historic resources program.

6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

The SHPO grants consist of federal and state funds and require a 50/50 match of local funds or donated services. The City of Portland has requested and received SHPO grants on a yearly basis since the mid-1990s. Grant funds have been used to supplement City funding for historic preservation programs and projects. Past projects have included improvements to the City's regulations affecting historic properties, and



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historic inventory work in East Portland and Central Portland. Work under this grant will focus on inventorying historic masonry structures that are at risk from natural disasters and demolition and also located within identified "hub" areas, to aid in historic preservation planning and rehabilitation strategies. The grant application was authorized under Ordinance 185135.

- 7. Legal Issues: There are no known legal issues.
- 8. What individuals or groups are or would be supportive or opposed to this action? The Portland Historic Landmarks Commission and historic preservationists would be supportive of this action.

9. How does this relate to current City policies?

State Goal 5 includes a provision for the protection of historic resources in the State of Oregon. Portland Comprehensive Plan Goal 3 - Neighborhoods has policies that call for preserving and reinforcing the stability and diversity of the City's neighborhoods. Policy 3.4 Historic Preservation calls for preserving and retaining historic structures and areas throughout the city. Under Comp Plan Goal 12 - Urban Design, Policy 12.3 Historic Preservation calls for enhancing the city's identity through the protection of Portland's significant resources. Work under this grant will focus on gaining a greater understanding of historic resources that are at-risk from natural disasters and/or demolition. Therefore, the proposal supports and will help the city to comply with these goals and policies.



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
