#### T. RECOMMENDATION

The Ordinance allows the City to amend the existing cost-shared feasibility study with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) to complete a feasibility study of ecosystem restoration and environmental dredging options in the Lower Willamette River under WRDA and increase the local in-kind match by \$660,000. This additional amount will be shared equally between the Port of Portland and the City.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Historically, the Willamette River in the Portland area comprised an extensive system of active channels, emergent wetlands, riparian forest, and adjacent upland forests. Urban and industrial development has created relatively steep, stable shoreline areas through construction of docks, bulkheads, and piers, reducing natural habitat. The Corps has authorities and funding under the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) that could be used for extensive ecosystem restoration. In 2002, at the City's request, the Corps obtained authority to broaden its existing WRDA environmental dredging feasibility study to encompass the City's broader ecological restoration objectives. The City agreed to become the local sponsor of this project. Congressionally authorized study area is from the confluence of the Willamette River with the Columbia River (WRM 0) up to the Willamette Falls (WRM 26.5).

As a local co-sponsor along with the Port, the City is working to complete a feasibility study that will provide initial engineering and environmental background for restoration sites and three environmental dredging sites throughout the Lower Willamette River. Currently, the Corps anticipates completing a draft feasibility study by late summer/early fall 2012. The document

will then be vetted through the Corps internal review process, which is estimated to be completed by the end of 2013.

#### III. FINANCIAL IMPACT

We expect to rely on existing Corps appropriations and in-kind City work to complete Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the feasibility study. The City's and Port's share totals 50 percent, and will be covered with in-kind work the City is already doing in the Superfund, ESA or Watershed programs. There will be no additional financial impact. Based on the estimated cost of City's efforts, the in-kind work so far for Phase 1 was \$639,806.90. As described in the Study's revised Project Management Plan (Jan. 2008), increased costs are expected to be incurred in connection with implementing Phase 2 activities. It is anticipated that the City's and Port's shares for Phase 2 will also be 50 percent, unless another local government entity becomes a local sponsor or partners with the City. This two-phase planning work will set the stage to seek a congressional authorization for more substantial project work contemplated in the future. This authorization could make in excess of a hundred million dollars of federal money available for future ecosystem restoration projects. In the project phase, the local sponsor's financial share is 35%.

#### IV. LEGAL ISSUES

Agency and Tribal coordination as it relates to specific laws or regulations (ESA, National Historic Preservation Act, and Water Quality Certification) will be an important part of this effort. Coordination will be needed with the broad range of other activities already being conducted in the Lower Willamette under the federal Clean Water Act (CWA), ESA, CERCLA, and related state laws.

As a potentially responsible party in the Portland Harbor Superfund Site, the City may be liable for damages to natural resources caused by sediment contamination in Portland Harbor, as determined by a Natural Resources Damage Assessment (NRDA). The ecosystem restoration work envisioned under WRDA is not intended to address potential liabilities under NRDA, but may inform the future NRDA work.

## V. CONTROVERSIAL ISSUES

Very little, if any, opposition would be expected. This ordinance does not have any additional fiscal impact – ongoing and planned City activities will constitute the City's in-kind contribution. The work supports ongoing City efforts in improving watershed health and natural resource restoration, and has the potential for the City to secure significant federal funding for these types of efforts on the Lower Willamette River.

#### VI. LINK TO CURRENT CITY POLICIES

The vision for this project provides for a diverse array of fish and wildlife habitat in the Lower Willamette River within the context of an urbanized area with a prosperous working harbor and with vibrant waterfront districts and neighborhoods – directly supporting the vision set out in the City's River Renaissance work. Numerous City activities are ongoing in the Lower Willamette River relative to fish habitat analysis, remediation and ecosystem restoration. Work under WRDA has the opportunity to augment ongoing ecosystem restoration projects in the Lower Willamette River.

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### VII. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

The success of this project will require coordination with local, state, and federal programs and stakeholders. Interested stakeholders will include, but are not limited to federal, state, and local agencies, Tribal governments, neighborhood associations, and community, environmental and business groups. The WRDA process includes a formal public notification and involvement process when a draft feasibility study is available, providing an opportunity for public input on the choice of sites and proposed work at those sites. This public process is tentatively scheduled for June 2012. City staff will be working with Corps staff to identify interested stakeholders and attend public meetings.

## VIII OTHER GOVERNMENT PARTICIPATION

The natural resource trustees – at the federal, state and Tribal government level - through the Portland Harbor Natural Resource Trustee Council - have been part of the process to date, and we expect and welcome their further involvement and participation. We will also be coordinating the work with the U.S EPA, in light of the ongoing Superfund cleanup in Portland Harbor.
