 - a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

Staffing the Hickman Butte fire lookout in the Bull Run watershed is compatible with the fire prevention, detection and suppression goals identified in the Bull Run watershed Management Unit Agreement (Agreement).

The Agreement guides cooperative management and protection of the watershed by the City of Portland and the Mt. Hood National Forest. This Agreement was adopted by the City and the Forest Service in 2007 to replace a 1979 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).

This council action will have a minimal financial or social impact to the rate-payers of the Portland Water Bureau (PWB), and community-based organizations. Positive impacts include the assurance that qualified personnel are available to staff the fire lookout throughout the duration of the fire season from 2012 through 2016.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

The PWB and the Mt. Hood National Forest solicited public input from the community at several key points in the process of developing the final Agreement, beginning in October 2000. These efforts are documented in a Report to the Community, published in 2007. The seven year development process culminated in a formal public review (following National Environmental Policy Act guidelines) of the Agreement in February 2007 and included publication in the Federal Register and an expanded Federal comment period.

A coalition of fifteen non-profit organizations and government agencies and organizations such as Oregon Wild, Friends of the Reservoirs, Citizens Interested in the Bull Run, Inc., Portland Utility Review Board, and Sandy River Basin Partners provided input into the final Agreement both through informal and formal public participation processes.

In addition to the Agreement and it's subsequent outreach efforts, there is a Bull Run Working Group that meets semi-annually and provides semi-annual reports. These meetings and reports offer an additional opportunity for public involvement. The meeting announcements are sent to over 800 interested members of the public and are posted online. The semi-annual reports, which specifically describe lookout services, are also available on line and at the meetings. The Working Group is made up of Forest Service and PWB staff. Bull Run quarterly project updates posted on the website also describe the status of Hickman Butte projects.

c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item? Feedback and input from the Bull Run stakeholders substantially contributed to the format and substance of the final draft of the Agreement, including the adoption of new City code that applies formal protections to City-owned lands within the Bull Run that are consistent with neighboring Federal lands (Ordinance 183540).

d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item?

The PWB and Mt. Hood National Forest implemented a multi-phased approach to incorporate public involvement opportunities in the creation of the Bull Run Agreement. The agencies used public involvement experts RESOLVE, Davis & Hibbits, Inc., and provided both informal and formal access to agency personnel and managers, through meetings, field tours, and electronic and telephone feedback mechanisms over the course of seven years. The final document underwent an expanded National Environmental Policy Act public notification and input process, although not required by law, and followed the public comment process outline provided by that Federal legislation.
