Updates	<ul> <li>Mary Li reported that Multnomah County programs fared pretty well but still are facing reductions in federal and state funding. More information can be found on Multnomah County's website. There is a public hearing at the Multnomah County building from 6-9 p.m. tonight and another one at IRCO located at 102<sup>nd</sup> and Glisan on Wednesday, May 23<sup>rd</sup> from 6-9 p.m.</li> <li>Sally Erickson gave an update on the PHB budget. Almost all programs associated with ending homelessness are experiencing cuts, with some being eliminated. There will be a City budget hearing at David Douglas School at 6:30 tonight.</li> <li>Beckie Lee and Dr. Paul Lewis gave an update on the "Domicile Unknown" study which used medical examiner statistics to review deaths among people experiencing homelessness in Multnomah County in 2011. The study was done in partnership with Street Roots and the County. The report showed 47 deaths in 2011, and is most likely an undercount of overall deaths which occurred. A task force will be convened to look at future efforts to collect this information and how to engage community stakeholders more broadly around policy and advocacy opportunities. Action for Prosperity	Mary Li gave an update on the Action for Prosperity program which assists low income families with getting stable housing. This is the third year of the program and it was set up with the idea that there are three elements to ensuring successful housing: stability, relationships with people who will encourage your success and access to education and ability to navigate systems to obtain training and job opportunities. Oregon TANF Alliance	Jessica Chanay from Partners for a Hunger Free Oregon gave an update on the TANF (temporary assistance to needy families) program. In order to qualify you must have a child and be at less than 40% MFI. There are 90,000 people on TANF statewide, 60,000 of which are children. This program is vital and needs to be protected. A bill was introduced in Congress a few years ago that reduced some aspects of the program and then the recession hit. The cuts to this program need to be aggressively fought with advocacy and testimony to lawmakers. Jobs money needs to be re-infused into this program. The TANF Alliance invites other agencies to join in its efforts, including identifying people who use the program and are willing to testify about its importance.
