RECOMMENDATION

Authorize Intergovernmental Agreement with Portland State University to plan and implement stewardship activities (Ordinance).

II. BACKGROUND

The purpose of this agreement is to provide graduate assistant involvement in program implementation for the Community Watershed Stewardship Program (CWSP) and for Willamette Watershed stewardship and outreach activities. Portland State University (PSU) has been participating in CWSP since 1995 when the first intergovernmental agreement was approved by City Council. CWSP has won national awards, including the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Partnership Award for Campus Community Collaboration, recognizing CWSP as a national model partnership program. Through this partnership, more than 43,000 community volunteers have donated 325,000 hours planting 147,000 native plants and trees, restored over 191 acres of land and enhanced more than 10 miles of waterways. Individual projects have been led and supported by over 700 students working as part of the class projects, resulting in several graduate theses and faculty research publications. In addition, PSU has been partnering with BES on implementing stewardship and outreach activities related to green stormwater facilities and tree planting.

The university more than matches the funding provided by the city through tuition reimbursements, class and a capstone program that focuses on stewardship and faculty support. This arrangement has allowed extension of university services and knowledge to the community while expanding the capacity of the program through more citizen stewards. Through the agreement two graduate assistants will work parttime as coordinators of the grants program and one will provide equity outreach for the grant program. An additional graduate student will work part-time to develop and implement Willamette Watershed outreach and stewardship activities.

The established cost is \$53,846 for 9/16/12 - 6/30/13 and \$66,000 for 7/1/13 - 6/30/14 for a total of \$119,846. Funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund, FY 2012-13 Budget, Bureau of Environmental Services, Cost Centers ESWS000007 (Amount \$26,846) and ESWS000006 (Amount \$27,000) Account 529000 and FY 2013-2014 Cost Centers ESWS000007 (Amount \$37,000) and ESWS000006 (Amount \$29,000) Account 529000.

On March 8, 2006, the Council adopted the 2005 Portland Watershed Management Plan, which describes actions for watershed health including citizen led activities such as stormwater management, revegetation, education, involvement and stewardship. On May 2, 2012, Council adopted resolution #36920, reaffirming the City's commitment to watershed health.

The CWSP program provides incentives for citizens to increase watershed health at their residences, congregations and other community spaces. The Willamette watershed team's graduate assistant will focus on education, outreach and watershed improvements.

VII. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

The purpose of this project is to build community knowledge and capacity so that community groups have resources to restore neighborhood streams, plant trees, build ecoroofs, bioswales and other stormwater retrofits and education their community about watershed health.

VIII. OTHER GOVERNMENT PARTICIPATION

The outreach and technical assistance that the Willamette watershed and grants projects provide connect citizens to resources at BES, other City bureaus such as Portland Parks and Recreation and Portland Bureau of Transportation and other governmental entities such as Metro, Portland Public Schools and Portland Community College, East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District, and neighborhood coalitions.
