- 5. Purpose of Agenda Item: This Ordinance authorizes funding of \$20,000 to Portland State University in support of the services of the College of Urban and Public Affairs Institute of Metropolitan Studies to host and update the Greater Portland Pulse database with data gathered in developing the Portland Plan strategy. PSU will provide a report on updated information by June 30, 2013.
- 6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

In 1991 the City of Portland contributed to the funding and establishment of the Institute of Metropolitan Studies (IMS) at Portland State University to foster studies and analysis of regional issues for the benefit of the community. Starting in 2009 IMS joined with Metro to create the Portland-Vancouver Indicator project to use both data and dialogue with community members to identify indicators of progress in subject areas focusing on social, environmental and economic well-being. That program is



now called Greater Portland Pulse and reflects a growing partnership that encourages coordinated action for better results across the region. The project has a Web site at portlandppulse.org.

- 7. What individuals or groups are or would be supportive or opposed to this action? This Greater Portland Pulse program benefits the entire City of Portland, from Portland City Council to residents interested in progress in implementing Portland Plan goals. This effort coordinates city-level goals and metrics with that of the region; so, it is likely to be supported by those supporting city and regional coordination efforts, from Portland City Council, to local non-governmental agencies and local and regional residents.
