5. Purpose of Agenda Item:

This Ordinance authorizes the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability to apply for a grant in the amount of \$25,000 from The Bullitt Foundation and a matching grant of \$25,000 from the Funders' Network for Smart Growth and Livable Cities.

6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

In 1993, the City of Portland became the first city in the U.S. with a climate action plan. Since then the City and many partners have worked comprehensively to reduce carbon emissions, and the City has twice adopted substantial revisions to its climate plan, most recently with the 2009 joint City/ County Climate Action Plan. In 2013, the CAP will be updated to include new actions. The 2009 CAP acknowledged the



importance of equity, but it did not establish specific metrics or actions to prioritize equity outcomes.

With the City's recently completed Portland Plan, which identifies equity as the preeminent overarching strategy of the City's 25-year strategic plan, and with the timing of the CAP update, the project aims to elevate equity as a key outcome of a climate action plan.

Grant funding from the Bullitt Foundation and the Funders' Network for Smart Growth will create an opportunity for a thoughtful, collaborative process to develop tools to measure, evaluate, and prioritize carbon-reduction actions that advance equity and an updated 2013 Climate Action Plan that integrates equity outcomes with carbon reduction strategies.

- 7. What individuals or groups are or would be supportive or opposed to this action? Community organizations that work to advance equity, including many of those involved in the Portland Plan, would likely support this ordinance.
- 8. How does this relate to current City policies?

 The proposed project implements the Portland Plan by advancing equity in climate action work. It also advances Portland's leadership in climate work via the Climate Action Plan by broadening the reach of climate initiatives and goals to a more diverse population.
