
Context: What is Metro Title 13?

- Goal: Maintain continuous system of riparian corridors & protect water quality
- Minimum, regional requirements to: protect, conserve, and restore
 Habitat Conservation Areas (HCAs)

Waterways, wetlands, floodplains, vegetation, wildlife habitat, steep slopes

Multiple benefits and services


Public health, safety, resiliency, environmental quality, community livability






Title 13 Approach

- Flexible compliance options
- "Avoid, minimize, mitigate" hierarchy
- Balance of watershed & development goals



Portland's Compliance Status

- City had well-established programs before Title 13
- City asked Metro for time to progress on key projects
 - Natural Resource Inventory
 - Portland Plan
 - River Plan North and Central Reaches
 - Airport Futures
 - Citywide Tree Project
 - Invasive Plant Project






Natural Resources Inventory (NRI) Update

Greenway Overlay







 Portland Area Watershed Monitoring and Assessment Program "PAWMAP"



Portland/Metro Voluntary Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA)

Purpose to confirm that:

- After compliance with Title 13, our watershed work continues
- The City intends to:
 - Continue multi-objective planning efforts that address watershed health; and
 - Seek funding for ongoing watershed programs



The City and Metro will collaborate on issues of regional concern

10-year term w/periodic progress reports

Portland/Metro IGA - Items Addressed

Multi-objective planning efforts:

- Comprehensive Plan (policies, actions)
- West Hayden Island decision
- Willamette Greenway Plan update (River Plan)
- Columbia Corridor Plan

Ongoing programs:

- Tree project/code implementation
- Willing-seller land acquisition
- Restoration and invasive species management
- Green infrastructure investments
- Watershed Monitoring

Issues of regional concern:

- Meeting goals for healthy economy and watersheds
- Emerging compliance issues (FEMA/ESA)
- Ecological site design



Recommendation

Planning and Sustainability Commission recommends:

- 1. Council accept the report, "Title 13: Request for Metro Determination of Substantial Compliance"
- authorize staff to incorporate minor edits and updates
- 2. Approve the Ordinance authorizing:
- Bureau of Planning and Sustainability Director to submit the Title 13 compliance request to Metro, and
- Planning and Sustainability, Environmental Services, and Portland Parks
 Directors to sign voluntary City/Metro Intergovernmental Agreement
