5. Purpose of Agenda Item:

Authorize amendments to grant agreements to increase Northwest Health Foundation grant funding for two nonprofit agencies that are working with the Portland Bureau of Planning and Sustainability (BPS) to engage apartment residents and make policy recommendations for design changes to retrofit multifamily rental housing in East Portland.

6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

The City has been working with a coalition of partners called the Healthy Kids Healthy Communities (HKHC) Initiative that includes public health advocates, community representatives and others who have identified projects that could address health disparities among low-income households living in multi-family rental housing in East Portland. The consortium's findings have resulted in the City's project, "Promoting Health through Multi-family housing."



Since August 2012, project partners have been pursuing two prongs: 1) engaging with low-income immigrant and refugee households in apartment complexes in East Portland to better understand health-related issues related to the built environment from tenants' perspectives and experiences; and 2) working with housing developers, property managers and private and non-profit property owners to identify cost-effective and practical design and construction practices, management and maintenance practices, and resident practices that would improve tenants' health. The resulting product will be a web-based Best Practices Handbook by June 30, 2013.

- 8. What individuals or groups are or would be supportive or opposed to this action?

Supporters include the members of the Healthy Kids Healthy Communities project, the Northwest Health Foundation, and the affordable housing development community.

9. How does this relate to current City policies?

This project helps implement goals of the Portland Plan and East Portland Action Plan for healthy, connected, equitable communities in East Portland.
