7. BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

On November 2, 2010 the citizens of Portland authorized the sale of \$72.4 million in City of Portland general obligation bonds, a portion of the bonds to be used for capital construction, improvements and costs, which include "providing a fire station and related facilities". The related facilities may include: a boathouse and dock on the river, capable of housing three emergency response watercraft and access between the dock and the fire station.

Portland Fire & Rescue (PF&R) responds to emergency incidents along 149 miles of navigable waterways of the Columbia and Willamette Rivers. Fire Station 21 (formerly Station 7) returned to active service in 2009, primarily to address the ever-increasing marine emergency service demands on the Willamette River in the downtown core area requiring either quick rescue boat response or a boat with high pumping capacity. This Station was built in 1960 and is located between the Eastbank Esplanade and the Willamette River at the base of the Hawthorne Bridge. Fire Station 21 sits on highly liquefiable soils making it extremely vulnerable to a seismic event and unsuitable for remodeling.

Fire Stations must be designed to remain in operation after a major earthquake or other natural disaster; it is not sufficient for such a structure to just remain standing. Fire personnel and equipment must be able to respond to the needs of the public after a major disaster. Accordingly, fire stations are defined as "essential facilities" to meet the most current requirements for essential facilities as defined in the Oregon Structural Specialty Code.

As part of the effort to bring Station 21 up to essential facilities status while offering both land and water emergency response that meets the operational goals of PF&R, City Council passed Ordinance 185401, PF&R authorizing the issuance of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Fire Station 21 Boathouse. The RFP required the manufacturing, delivery and attachment of the boathouse to existing piling located in the Willamette River. The new boathouse will house both the new vessel and an existing rescue boat.

The Chief Procurement Officer advertised RFP No. 114647, issued on October 8, 2012, for the Portland Fire & Rescue Station 21 Boathouse. A pre-proposal meeting was held in which six interested firms were in attendance. Proposals were due on November 6, 2012 and one (1) proposal was received. A five (5) person selection committee with representatives from Portland Fire & Rescue and the Minority Evaluator Program reviewed, evaluated, and scored the response in accordance with Portland City Code 5.33. Oregon Iron Works, Inc. was determined to be responsive to the City's RFP #114647. The City issued a Notice of Intent to Negotiate and Award a contract to Oregon Iron Works, Inc., on November 8, 2012.

Oregon Iron Works, Inc., has a current City of Portland business license, is in compliance with the Equal Benefits Program, and their EEO Certification is current through February 1, 2014. The company is located in Clackamas, OR and is not a State of Oregon Certified M/W/ESB contractor.
