## **BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:**

The Portland Plan, adopted by Resolution 36918, includes a Framework for Equity to guide plan implementation and improve City operational and business practices, support actions that promote accountability, close disparity gaps and increase community engagement in civic activities. The City of Portland Disparity Study Report, adopted by Resolution 36868, reviewed among other things, the City's public contracting methods for construction contracts to determine whether these processes were affected by race or gender discrimination. Additionally, the 2009 Disparity Study found there was evidence of disparities in the utilization of minority and women as prime contractors on City construction contracts

The Disparity Study Report directed a number of recommendations to the City, including the need to continue a program similar to the City's Sheltered Market Program which would provide prime contracting opportunities for state certified developing firms to work directly with the City. The new Prime Contractor Development Program (PCDP) was described in the Social Equity Contracting Strategy, adopted by Resolution 36944 on July 19, 2012. This new program is intended to achieve lower prices, establish economic growth in the Portland community and remedy the findings found in the Disparity Study Report. Oregon Revised Statute 279A.100 provides that the State Public Contracting Code may not be construed to prohibit the City from engaging in public contracting practices designed to promote affirmative action goals, policies or programs. Therefore, the City's public construction contracting may adopt the Prime Contractor Development Program.
