#### 5. Purpose of Agenda Item:

Intervene in proceeding of Oregon Public Utility Commission to present and protect the City's interests in addressing PGE's recent filing for rate increases. The city's list of issues include how demand charges are derrived and analysis of charges related to street lighting. Also the city Revenue Office has an interest in collection of utility franchise fees.

### 6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

The City of Portland's Climate Action Plan establishes short- and long-term goals for carbon reduction which are influenced by the carbon emissions from generating electricity and use of natural gas. Portland has histroically participated in PGE's general rate case and in other PUC dockets when our interests are affected. Participation of in this PUC proceedings allows the city to 1) obtain information regarding gas and electric fuel efficiency and other matters not readily available; 2) hear other parties' actions and comments in proceedings; and 3) influence outcomes of proceedings for the benefit of Portland bureaus. The Bureaus engaged in this rate case include Transportation, Environmental Services, Water, Revenue, Planning and Sustainabilty and the City Attorney. OMF Facilities and Parks may also have interests.

## 8. How does this relate to current City policies?

City of Portland 2009 Climate Action Plan establishes goals for reducing carbon emissions generated by utilities. The City has Charter authority to oversee activities of utilities.
