There are formal regulatory requirements for public involvement for biosolids programs in Oregon. All biosolids management and land application plans in the state of Oregon are subject to public participation via Oregon Administrative Rule Chapter 340 Division 50 which requires public notice by Oregon DEQ during the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit issuance or renewal process. Opportunity for public review and comment is provided during this process; the last public comment period for the City's biosolids management plan was in 2011. Public notification (i.e., neighbor notification by mail or door-to-door visits) by the permit holder is also required when land application sites are proposed for use. Public participation and public notice for the Madison Farms biosolids land application program have been completed by the City of Portland in accordance with these requirements.

7. BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

The Bureau of Environmental Services (BES) serves the Portland community by protecting public health, water quality, and the environment. The Bureau's Wastewater Group operates and maintains wastewater collection and treatment facilities, and ensures compliance with all applicable permits, regulations, and contracts. BES operates and maintains sanitary sewer and stormwater collection and treatment systems in a service area which covers approximately 92,000 acres. The City of Portland produces approximately 15,000 dry tons (75,000 wet tons) of biosolids per year at the Columbia Boulevard Wastewater Treatment Plant (CBWTP).

Having previously reviewed alternate options, the City has worked extensively with the Oregon DEQ over the last twenty-three years to permit the lands to receive biosolids. The City requires locations which have an Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) issued site authorization letter thereby allowing biosolids dewatered at the CBWTP to be transported and land applied year-round at City leased property sites. Since 1990, the City has land-applied biosolids to lands owned by Madison Biosolids, Inc. These lands are located approximately 200 miles from Portland in north, central Oregon. The cost to authorize a similarly sized area today would be excessive and the permitting process would be lengthy; in addition to new DEQ permits, new land lease agreements and hauling contracts would need to be procured for any alternative option.

On July 29, 2013, the Chief Procurement Officer posted a sole source procurement notice for Land Application Services with Madison Biosolids, Inc. No comments, responses or protests were received. On November 20, Ordinance 186343 was passed by Portland City Council giving the Bureau of Environmental Services authorization to proceed with a sole source award to Madison Biosolids, Inc. for biosolids land application services.

Madison Biosolids, Inc., is located in Echo, Oregon and has a current City of Portland business license tax account, is in compliance with the Equal Benefits Program, and their EEO Certification is current through April 6, 2014. The Bureau's level of confidence in the cost estimates for this project is high as there is very good historical information showing purchases made for these types

of services for the bureau.

Awarding a price agreement to Madison Biosolids, Inc., will allow the Bureau of Environmental Services to continue its efficient and cost effective process of year-round land application of the City's biosolids
