Project title:

Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program Fiscal Year 2014 Local Solicitation to assist the Portland-Metropolitan area law enforcement and criminal justice community to prevent and reduce crime and violence.

Project goals:

1. To retain a 1.0 FTE Senior Management Analyst (SMA) for approximately 14 months. The SMA is responsible for recommending, developing, and implementing Police Bureau policies and procedures to include: Facilitating the development of bureau directives, applicable manuals, and associated handbooks, and other written communications related to city and bureau policies and procedures.
2. To contract with a local service provider that coordinates treatment, temporary housing, counseling, and training opportunities for women involved in prostitution-related offenses.
3. To retain a 0.45 FTE Deputy District Attorney (DDA) Level 2 for 12 months. The DDA2 will be assigned to a Neighborhood Office and will work with citizens, citizen groups, business owners, community associations, and law enforcement to identify crime issues pertinent to the community.
4. To retain a 0.5 FTE Parole and Probation Officer (ACCESS PPO) for 12 months. The ACCESS PPO will strengthen the referral and education system surrounding appropriate referrals to alcohol and drug treatment.
5. To hire a 1.0 FTE Enforcement Deputy for 6.95 months. The deputy will be assigned to work with the Sheriff's Office River Patrol Unit (RPU). The RPU provides safe access to the Multnomah County waterways.
6. To contract with a local service provider for a 1.0 FTE gang outreach and prevention employee for 12 months. The street-level gang outreach employee is expected to identify and intervene, utilizing effective violence reduction strategies in the cycle of street-level violence between high-risk gang members and their associates.

The City of Portland will act as fiscal agent for the grant and distribute funds to the units of local government identified in the disparate certification. Each partner has agreed to the allocation of grant funding.

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City of Portland Programs

Retention of Personnel

The City of Portland will retain a 1.0 FTE Senior Management Analyst for approximately 14 months. The position is assigned to the Portland Police Bureau Strategic Services Division at a total cost of \$125,548.

The Senior Management Analyst is responsible for recommending, developing, and implementing policies and procedures, to include: Facilitating the development of directives, applicable manuals and associated handbooks, and other written communications related to policies and procedures. The Senior Management Analyst will also conduct research and analysis of best practices in support of city and bureau activities, functions, and programs and will recommend action and assist in formulating policy, procedure, and legislative positions related to those best practices. The Senior Management Analyst will also convene and facilitate committees and work groups, obtain input and feedback, and present reports based on the assigned responsibilities.

The focus of the limited-term grant-funded position will be bureau-specific and involve law enforcement-related administrative duties.

Community-based Program

Prostitution, as well as the compelling and promotion of prostitution by pimps, has created key public safety concerns in the City of Portland's East neighborhoods along the major north-south highway, 82nd Avenue, as well as general concerns for the victims of these crimes. That said, because the actual sex acts are performed throughout the city, many other

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neighborhoods are affected by these crimes. Presently, the Portland Police Bureau's East Precinct Prostitution Coordination Team (PCT) utilizes a three-prong multidisciplinary approach in addressing the problems surrounding prostitution related offenses. Not only does the PCT consist of highly trained and experienced officers, it also includes a Multnomah County Deputy District Attorney (DDA) and the LifeWorks New Options for Women (NOW) Program. This multidisciplinary approach allows the team to move beyond traditional law enforcement responses by utilizing social services to help victims of human trafficking and target those who purchase sex from these victims.

The Fiscal Year 2014 JAG grant will provide funding to the LifeWorks New Options for Women Program at a cost of \$110,000.

New Options for Women provides trauma-informed care to women in Portland in order to help them exit the sex industry. Most, if not all, of NOW's clients are survivors of childhood sexual abuse and/or molestation, which includes human trafficking. This severe trauma does not go away when these women turn 18. The NOW program works with these women to reduce relapse into the lifestyle that traditionally surrounds prostitution. NOW's services include addictions treatment, treatment for mental health disorders (including psychiatric care, as needed), challenging criminality, domestic violence education and support, parenting education, urinalysis (to make sure they stay drug-free and are not lying about drug usage), and mentoring/case management. NOW provides an environment in which these women are able to speak about their experiences of being trafficked and prostituted and truly address their issues. NOW assists the women in the program in finding stable housing, legal income, obtaining

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education, and assisting them in obtaining any form of identification they may need. Prior to the formation of NOW three years ago, the women in this population had no other options.

NOW staff meets weekly with PCT officers and the DDA to discuss the women's progress. During these meetings, the team discusses the status of each client and how to best help her successfully complete both the NOW program and probation.

Multnomah County Programs

Retention of Personnel

Multnomah County District Attorney's Office

The Multnomah County District Attorney's Office (MCDA) will retain a 0.45 FTE Neighborhood Deputy District Attorney Level 2 (DDA2) for a period of 12 months with Fiscal Year 2014 JAG funds at a total cost of \$61,692.

The Neighborhood Deputy District Attorney program is unique to MCDA. Each Neighborhood DDA (DDA) in Multnomah County is assigned to a specific City of Portland Police Bureau (PPB) precinct: North, East, and Central Precincts. They are also assigned to the City of Gresham Police Department and the regional transit authority TriMet as part of PPB's Transit Division. The DDA screens all quality of life misdemeanor cases, as well as select felonies of specific interest to the assigned precinct. Those cases deemed of particular import to the community are kept on the DDA's caseload and personally handled through all stages of

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prosecution, from indictment to sentencing. The DDA attends various neighborhood specific community meetings, including, but not limited to meeting with the following groups: Neighborhood associations, private citizen and business groups, public safety councils, government agencies, and crime prevention committees. The DDA works closely with precinct police officers to educate them on search and seizure issues, to improve report writing, and to develop strategies to address recurring quality of life problems in their neighborhood area.

The North Neighborhood DDA

The FY 2014 JAG funds will be applied towards a DDA position already assigned to PPB's North Precinct. The North Neighborhood DDA assists community groups in maintaining current crime reduction and prevention strategies, as well as aiding in the development of new strategies viewed through the lens of improving residents' and business owners' quality of life.

The North DDA works collaboratively with PPB's North Portland Neighborhood Response Team (NRT) regarding drug houses in the North Neighborhood by utilizing a collective impact model, which includes NRT, Portland's City Attorney's Office, and citizen groups. The consideration of different viewpoints allows the group to create unique solutions for these locations, some of which have plagued the community for years. The results have been apparent as certain persistent problem locations have been quieted or altogether eliminated.

The DDA works with the PPB Burglary Task Force. This assignment represents an effort to reduce burglaries in the North Neighborhood and to facilitate better prosecutions throughout the criminal justice system. The DDA regularly attends PPB Burglary Task Force roll calls in an effort to educate themselves about cases that are important to the community.

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The DDA is then “on call” to Task Force members in the event legal questions arise during the course of an investigation or if assistance is needed with a specific case.

During County Fiscal Year 2013-14, the North Neighborhood DDA indicted aging cold cases with new DNA evidence and resolved a 48-count burglary case involving close to 30 victims and affecting a huge swath of the North Neighborhood. Because those cases involved a Neighborhood DDA, community meetings were attended by both neighbors and local public safety groups for case progress updates. As a result, not only were the individuals responsible held accountable for their actions, but the community was involved in a manner that was not possible without a Neighborhood DDA heavily involved in community efforts.

Additionally, the North Neighborhood DDA assists in the writing and execution of search warrants. Because the DDA sits in close proximity to the officers working in the assigned neighborhood, the DDA is easily accessible for questions. These consults cover everything from whether a search warrant is required to strategies involving service of a warrant and when additional evidence is needed for adequate probable cause. When appropriate, the DDA will accompany the writing officer to Judges Chambers for warrant signing in the event there are legal questions requiring the DDA’s assistance. In FY 2013-14, the North Neighborhood DDA worked closely with NRT to write and serve a search warrant based exclusively on controlled buys of stolen property utilizing two confidential informants. Inside the house, the warrant service team found stolen property from a number of area residential burglaries.

Grant Performance Measures

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DCJ will report on the Personnel program during the reporting periods in accordance with performance measure reporting requirements.

MCDA is committed to employing evidence-based practices in order to make certain the goals of the program are fully realized. To that end, MCDA will demonstrate success through performance measures that include the capture and reporting of the activities outlined in the narrative for their agency. In addition, MCDA will track the outcomes of those activities to ensure that results are consistent with the goals of the position. MCDA will utilize data points provided by the Local Public Safety Coordination Council, a body that tracks objective crime data in Multnomah County, in addition to data provided internally, which measures the number of cases issued and indicted, as well as the case outcomes. Further, the DDA will personally track law enforcement and community contacts.

In order to further advance the program goals, the DDA will screen misdemeanor and select felony cases with a particular emphasis on prosecuting chronic residential burglaries, problem drug, and chronic nuisance properties. The DDA will meet with precinct police officers, attend community and business group meetings, and develop and maintain projects and cases that specifically target quality of life problems in their neighborhood area.

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Multnomah County Department of Community Justice

Retention of Personnel

The Multnomah County Department of Community Justice (DCJ) will retain a 0.5 FTE Probation and Parole Officer (Access PPO) for a period of 12 months with Fiscal Year 2014 JAG funds at a total cost of \$61,692. The remainder of the personnel costs will be paid with Department of Community Justice funds.

The Access PPO position was created with Recovery "ARRA" JAG grant funds in 2009, and has been retained because of annual JAG funding.

Centralization of referrals to residential treatment programs helps DCJ be certain that very limited resources are being spent on the highest risk and highest need individuals on probation or post-prison supervision. Approximately 70 percent of high risk offenders have serious addiction problems and commit their crimes while using illegal drugs. The Access PPO will continue to strengthen the referral and education system surrounding appropriate referrals to residential alcohol and drug treatment. The Access PPO works closely with the transition counselor for the County jails, which are operated through the Sheriff's Department. Through close collaboration, some individuals are allowed to be released from jail early to a residential treatment bed.

DCJ contracts for almost 8 million dollars of residential and outpatient treatment for offenders. The Board of County Commissioners continues to make treatment for offenders a priority. In addition, DCJ has worked with a variety of community-based programs to ensure those people on supervision receive services through grant- and County-funded treatment. This

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diversity in treatment and earmarked services for specific populations has made referral making cumbersome and very time consuming for Probation and Parole Officers. The Access PPO will work with County jail employees, assigned PPO's, and evaluators to make sure clients are able to enter treatment upon release from jail. They provide transport from jail to prison or treatment programs.

The Access PPO works with Assessment and Referral Center corrections counselors, jail and prison discharge planners, and Service Coordination Team members to identify and place clients that need housing services in order to stabilize them while waiting for residential treatment. The Access PPO is a member of the county Addictions Treatment Providers group, providing information to community providers and seeking input on system improvements.

Multnomah County Sheriff's Office

Hiring of Personnel

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) will hire a 1.0 FTE enforcement deputy for six months with Fiscal Year 2014 JAG funds at a total cost of \$61,692.

The deputy will be assigned to work with the Sheriff's Office River Patrol Unit (RPU). The RPU provides safe access to the Multnomah County waterways. The RPU also responds to all life threatening marine calls, carries out search and rescue services, and provides boater safety education services. This deputy will report to the RPU lieutenant and will ensure safe and legal

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boater operations on Multnomah County waterways. This will be accomplished through water and shore patrol, compliance checks, and boat inspections.

The RPU will provide quarterly reports to MCSO supervisors, which will track performance measures. The performance measures will include the number of Boater Examination Reports completed, the number of Compliance Checks conducted, and the number of Hull Identification Number Inspections.

Grant Program Performance Measures

MCSO will report on the Personnel program during the reporting periods in accordance with performance measure reporting requirements.

City of Gresham Program

The City of Gresham will use 2014 JAG funding to enter into a contract with a local service provider for additional street-level gang outreach services. The City currently contracts with Portland Opportunities Industrialization Center, Inc. (POIC) to provide one full-time employee who provides outreach services to high-risk gang-involved and gang associated youth and young adults up to the age of 25. Grant funding will allow Gresham to amend their contract with POIC for the additional limited-term full time outreach worker.

High-risk gang-involved and gang-associated youth and young adults are defined as those individuals who:

1. Admit/identify gang involvement;
2. Associate with known gang members;
3. Have been directly involved in gang-related crime as a victim, suspect or perpetrator; and

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4. Are related to known gang member(s).

The POIC street-level gang outreach employee is expected to:

1. Identify and intervene, utilizing effective violence reduction strategies in the cycle of street-level violence between high-risk gang members and their associates.
2. Provide intervention outreach services to city areas considered hot spots for gang-related activity, while working in coordination with law enforcement and other service providers during hours of highest activity probability.
3. Build relationships with community programs for the purposes of connecting gang members/associates and/or their families to educational, social, medical, and employment related services.

Coordination of Related Justice Funds and JAG Funds

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Review Narrative
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Application Review

The City of Portland, Oregon Police Bureau posted a notice regarding the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program FY 2014 Local Solicitation on the City of Portland website <http://www.portlandonline.com/police/> on April 25, 2014.

Visitors to the site were able to view a description of the grant program, a link to the Office of Justice Programs solicitations web page as well as the solicitation.

The name, telephone number, and email address for the Bureau's grant program manager was listed in the event someone wanted to contact the Bureau. The solicitation posting was removed and the final joint application posted on May 14, 2014. The application was removed from the webpage on June 4, 2014, after the Portland City Council approved the application, application ordinance, Intergovernmental Agreements and their respective authorization ordinances (JAG documents).

Governing Body Review

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program FY 2014 Local Solicitation JAG documents were submitted to the bureau's Commissioner-in-Charge (the Mayor) on May 14, 2014.

Copies of the JAG documents were made available to each City Council member (4), the Mayor, the Auditor's Office, the City Attorney, members of the press and the public seven days prior to the first Council session, which was May 23, 2014. Prior to each Council meeting, the Council Agenda items and related documents were also posted to the City's website. The Auditor's Office emails the agenda link to a variety of email addresses in the region. The agenda
