Dear Mayor Hales and City Commissioners:

The Budget Advisory Committee (BAC) of Portland Parks and Recreation (PP&R) is pleased to write in support of Commissioner Amanda Fritz's proposal to refer a Parks Replacement Bond to Portland voters.

Representing a wide variety of interests and stakeholders across the city, PP&R's BAC is comprised of the Portland Parks Board, labor partners and community members. Earlier this year as part of the 2014-15 budget process, the BAC once again examined the scale of resources needed to maintain our cherished city park system. While we were pleased with the City Council's decision this year to add \$500,000 in general fund dollars to PP&R's maintenance budget, we are all aware that with major maintenance needs of more than \$365 million over the next ten years, currently available resources are insufficient to keep all of our park facilities safe and operational.

As noted in our January recommendation concerning PP&R's requested budget, we struggle to address infrastructure needs with a pie that is not big enough—this is a significant challenge that our community must address. At that time, we advocated for a stable, long-term, dedicated funding strategy to address the significant backlog of capital maintenance needs that will not be met solely with general fund allotments. The proposed Parks Replacement Bond is a strong start. The Replacement Bond will allow us to address the most critical and urgent maintenance needs, without raising tax rates for Portlanders.

On July 2 we reconvened as a Budget Advisory Committee to review Commissioner Fritz's proposed Parks Replacement Bond; our vote was unanimous to recommend that the Portland City Council refer it to voters. We also voted unanimously to recommend favorable consideration of the draft Replacement Bond Project List, as well as the general process for determining additional Parks Replacement Bond projects for the second bond issuance. Commissioner Fritz has submitted this package for Council discussion on July 24. Thank you for your thoughtful consideration and for your strong support of Portland's parks.
