  - a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

\$209,277 in ESG-funded short-term rent assistance will be available to eligible households experiencing homelessness through the county-wide Short Term Rent Assistance (STRA) program administered by Home Forward.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

Recent federal regulatory changes resulting from the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act (2009) established the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program, administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The City of Portland, through its Housing Bureau (PHB), is the local Recipient of federal ESG funds. In order to receive these funds, PHB must submit to HUD (and HUD must approve) a five-year Consolidated Plan with associated Annual Action Plans. Together, the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plans describe local housing and community development needs, outline general priorities for use of federal and local resources to address these needs, and identify recipients of annually-awarded federal funding to specific community-based agencies for specific projects. The current Consolidated Plan covers 2011-2016, and was adopted through City Council Resolution in 2011. Where Consolidated Plan resources are identified to prevent or end homelessness, those strategies are directly aligned with A Home for Everyone.

As required by federal regulations, the Consolidated Plan includes a Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) describing the overall framework for public involvement in developing and implementing the Consolidated Plan and its Annual Action Plans. Following the process outlined in the CPP, a series of hearings and public meetings are held annually regarding the development of the Consolidated Plan and its Annual Action Plans in all areas of the city to ensure access to a broad range of community members. Translation services are provided when requested. All hearings locations are accessible to persons with disabilities. All documents are posted on the Portland Housing Bureau website.

In addition to the CPP process, the Portland Housing Advisory Commission, the bureau's advisory body, and the Federal Funding Oversight Committee, a representative body of the

three jurisdictions included in the Consolidated Plan (Portland, Gresham, and Multnomah County), reviewed the Consolidated Plan and its recommendations. Also, PHB conducted a series of public meetings and focus groups focused on the topic of prevention, housing and support services for people experiencing homelessness in the development of its Consolidated Plan.

Further community and inter-jurisdictional involvement was provided in approving the funding priorities represented in the FY 2014-15 Action Plans through coordinated public hearings with the Coordinating Committee to End Homelessness (CCEH). The Steering Committee of CCEH also review and commented on the housing and homeless services priorities presented in Action Plans. CCEH represents a committee of stakeholders committed to preventing and ending homelessness efforts, including: nonprofit agencies, governmental departments, faith groups, community advocates and homeless or formerly homeless individuals.

#### c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item?

In the Consolidated Plan process, public involvement affected the City's understanding of community needs to prevent and end homelessness. For this particular initiative, it emphasized: the continued shortage of permanent supportive housing and other affordable housing; the impact of the economic recession on very low-income households; demand for rent assistance; and the need to promote greater systems alignment of housing and services. The recommended and approved strategy for use of ESG funds included award of \$209,277 in ESG funds for short-term rent assistance through the county-wide Short Term Rent Assistance (STRA) program administered by Home Forward.

These needs also influenced the set of goals outlined in PHB's 2011-13 Strategic Plan and budget decisions. Investment in preventing and ending homelessness efforts is reflected in two of the Strategic Plan's four investment priorities. PHB's Strategic Plan, an outcomesdriven framework guiding Portland's housing investments, synthesizes available data on trends, needs and program outcomes, as well as community input gathered from focus groups, surveys and the strategic plan community forum.

# d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item?

The public involvement process used in the contracting of funds for Housing Access & Stabilization and Ending Homelessness Initiative programs is contained in the Citizen Participation Plan (CPP), within the 2011-2016 Consolidated Plan. The CPP was adopted by the former Housing and Community Development Commission, and reviewed by the new Portland Housing Advisory Commission. Implementation of the CPP is managed by public involvement staff of the Portland Housing Bureau.
