The Proposed Draft Citywide Systems Plan has been updated to reflect comments received from the general public, agencies, organizations, and internal bureaus during review of the Working Draft in fall 2013.  - Treatment of green infrastructure and tree canopy as an asset class (including information on value, condition, needs, investments, etc.)
 - Description of the role of green infrastructure in meeting the City's regulatory requirements

Natural areas	
 Clearer description of the role of Portland Parks & Recreation in protecting and enhancing the City's environment and natural resources, including habitat restoration in natural areas. Desire for improved public access and passive recreation in natural areas. 	Enhanced discussion of PP&R's role in protecting and stewarding Portland's natural resources and urban canopy . (see p. 212-216 and 230-231)
Existing parks	
 Interest in development of planned parks or improvements to existing parks to provide additional recreation opportunities. Maintenance and security concerns about existing parks and other facilities, including vandalism, dense tree canopy and lack of lighting. Trails	
 Support for expanding the trail system, particularly to create connections to existing trails, and provide access to natural areas. Completing the Springwater Corridor Trail through inner Southeast Portland. New parks	
 Commenters identified desired park acquisition areas, including locations for improved recreation access to the Willamette River and a desire for additional parks in the Hollywood Town Center, Goose Hollow, West Portland Park, Madison South, and Kenton neighborhoods. 	Desired improvements prioritize providing services in underserved areas and include target acquisition areas. <i>(see</i> <i>p. 207-209, 224-228, and 233)</i>



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
