1) Legislation Title: *Authorize application to Department of Housing and Urban Development for three Continuum of Care renewal grants in the total amount of \$698,524 and submission of the Consolidated Continuum of Care application on behalf of the Portland/Gresham/Multnomah County Continuum of Care (Ordinance) 2) Purpose of the Proposed Legislation: The purpose of the proposed legislation is to receive Council approval to apply for an annual renewal of three HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) grants in the total amount of \$698,524. Renewal grants are for administration of the regional Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), OTIS supportive housing program, and a Continuum of Care Planning Grant. Though funding for the OTIS supportive housing program is awarded to the City of Portland through PHB, PHB subcontracts all funds to Cascadia Behavioral Healthcare, Inc. and Transition Projects, who deliver the supportive housing services. 3) Which area(s) of the city are affected by this Council item? If awarded, acceptance of the grants will generate \$698,524 in Continuum of Care homeless assistance funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The HMIS grant requires a cash match of \$61,417. Funds for the match come from non-City user fees collected in the Housing Investment Fund. The OTIS grant requires a cash match of \$72,290. Funds for the match are provided by Cascadia and Transition Projects as a

user fees collected in the Housing Investment Fund. The OTIS grant requires a cash match of \$72,290. Funds for the match are provided by Cascadia and Transition Projects as a contractual obligation for their receipt of the subgranted funds. The Continuum of Care planning grant requires match of \$40,925. The match is provided through existing PHB staffing, funded by a mix of City General Fund and federal Community Development Block Grant funding.

a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

Anticipated benefits to the City of Portland include \$698,524 for administration of the regional Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), the OTIS supportive housing program, and Continuum of Care planning activities. Funds will support regional systems coordination and planning work required for receipt of Continuum of Care funds; data collection and analysis to evaluate the Local Plan to End Homelessness and meet federal reporting requirements; and 33 units of permanent supportive housing for chronically homeless individuals living with mental illness.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved? As required by federal regulations, a Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) describing the overall framework for public involvement was developed and adopted with the 2011-2016 Consolidated Plan.

A series of hearing and public meetings were held regarding the development of the Plan, in all areas of the city to ensure access to a broad range of community members. Translation services were provided when requested. All hearings locations were accessible to persons with disabilities. All documents were posted on the Portland Housing Bureau website.

As part of the Plan, the Portland Housing Advisory Commission (PHAC), the bureau's advisory body, reviewed the Plan and its recommendations. The Federal Funding Oversight Committee, a representative body of the three jurisdictions (Portland, Gresham, and Multnomah County) also reviewed the Plan.

c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item? In the Consolidated Plan process, public involvement affected the City's understanding of community needs. For this particular initiative needs include addressing the increase in homelessness and continued lack of affordable housing.

These needs, in turn, influenced the set of investment priorities that shaped PHB's 2011-13 Strategic Plan and budget decisions. PHB's Strategic Plan, a goals- and outcomesdriven framework guiding Portland's housing investments, synthesized available data on trends, needs and program outcomes, as well as community input gathered from focus groups, surveys and the strategic plan community forum.

d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item?

The public involvement process used in the decision to apply for Continuum of Care funds is contained in the Citizen Participation Plan (CPP), within the 2011-2016 Consolidated Plan. The CPP was adopted by the former Housing and Community Development Commission, and reviewed by the new Portland Housing Advisory Commission. Implementation of the CPP is managed by public involvement staff of the Portland Housing Bureau.
