Received information this date from Special Agent JOHN HEIDTKE, of the F.B.I., who stated they had received information that at 11:00 AM. this date a group called the LEFT OUT ONES, INC. comprised of thirty to fourty persons whould be demonstrating around Emanuel Hospital. According to Agent Heidtke's information we the three primary instigators of this demonstration would be TOM WILSON, KENT FORD, and NATE PROBY.

TOM WILSON, and NATE PROBY'S primary reason for demonstrating is that they want twenty percent of the work forse on the construction site and jobs at Emanuel Hospital's working project to be of the minority groups. Kent Ford's primary reason for being involved in this demonstration is that he is still upset with Emanuel Hospital for their removal of his People's Medical Clinic at 109 N. Russell St..

The pamphlets printed up for this demonstration and for the above group, Left Out Ones, Inc., were printed by the C.C.A.P., 106 N.E. Morris, by Bob Nelson.

Immediately upon receiving this information Lt. Roger Haven, of East Precinct was contacted and given the information verbally. Lt. Haven in turn stated that he would notify the district cars and have them make the appropriate action.

### Details:

On Oct. 7, 1974 commencing at approximately 12 noon, a group representing the Committee Against Political Repression and the Armsbury-Lui Kwan and Eaglin Defense Committee conducted a small demonstration at the U.S. Court House on S.W. Main St. There were approximately 30 participants and the demonstration was conducted in a orderly manner and without incidents.

There was one individual dressed to represent a German Nazi and another in a make-shift Uncle Sam costume who put on a skit for the participants. There were no handouts at this demonstration.

Persons identified as participating were GREGORY LANG LIU-KWAN, RAY EAGLIN, ROBERT GULICH, DOUGLAS HURD, MARK CHAMBERLAIN, MARTINA CURL, JEFF FIKES and KENT FORD. ## FRED HAMPTON MEDICAL HEALTH CLINIC

The Peoples' Free Health Clinic has been functioning since 1969 as a community health service center. The service is free and available to anyone.

Since 1971, the Clinic has been told periodically by Emanuel Hospital, that it would have to move from its location at 109 N. Russell St.

We responded by saying that we were agreeable to the move, provided we were given adequate relocation.

After much negotiation, a lease was signed: 5 years rent free, for a building at Williams and Stanton.

It is just a shell, four walls and a roof that leaks. The only thing inside is a wall down the middle.

We were given the impression that because Emanuel had given us the building, the Portland Development Commission would give us the money for renovation. NOT TRUE !! We had been fooled again.

Now, After being served with a notice for immediate eviction, we are told by the president of Emanuel, that Emanuel has no money to complete the expansion project.

So why the rush to remove a clinic that is trying to provide a needed service to the community?

We are aking for adequate money to renovate our "new" building, and a promise that our present building will not be demolished until we can move into the new one.

We want Emanuel to live up to its responsibilities in this community. After all, we do aid Emanuel in treating people who are unable to pay for medical attention.



In waiting for the cab to arrive the subject continued as before his statements relating to white racism and this being the reason he was discharged from from Portland Police Bureau after recruit training. He was constantly belligerar toward writers but never disorderly however had been drinking an alcoholic beverage due to the odor about his person but did not appear to be intoxicated. Upon arrival of his cab he made statements to the effect that this incident was not over adding that he had been intimate with the complainant on several jogcasions. After the subject had departed I again contacted Miss. Ankele who stated the following. She had met the subject at the "Carraige Room" in downtown area in October 681 where he had been a customer on several occasions but because of his opinions and obvious racial feelings none of the pther girls wanted to wait on him for service whereupon the complainant took it upon her. self to be courteous to him. According to Miss Ankele the subject took this attention wrongfully and began pursueing romantically at which time she severed any contact with him at all. At one time the subject had threatened to kill hor ifshe refused to marry him, Miss Ankele denied ever having dated the subject Miss Ankele states the subject probably found out her address by having semeone follow her home from work since this did occur recently. She described t this party as WMA and driving a Volkswagom .sedan, In summation it became apparent that the money element was ficticious for PAGEL

This date approx 4:50pm contacted by Sgt Miller who stated that the manager Sir: at Security officer for KEINOW'S FOOD STORE had informed him that the Black Panthers had been at the KEINOW'S Store located at 3038 NE Union this afternoon demanding food for their breakfast program and had threatened the manager and the store, if their demands were not met by 10am Monday morning.

At 5pm we contacted the security officer Mr. ZIMMERMAN and the manager of the store at 3038 NE Union, Mr, McDONALD at the KEINOW'S Store.

Mr. McDONALD stated that at 3pm this afternoon, approx 30 male negro subjects ranging in age from 12 to 16yrs, began picketing the store. He stated they were carrying signs stating that people should not shop at KEINOW"S Store since they had refused to support the Black Panthers Breakfast Program for school children. He further stated that at 3:45pm he observed KENT FORD and another subject who - he identified from pictures as being ROSCOE L. ANDERSON and 8 other Black Panthers in the parking lot of the store. He stated the subjects had 4 walkie-talkies in their possession and were directing the picketting by the other negro children.

Upon talking with the leaders of the Black Panthers, KENT FORD and ROSCOE ANDERSON, he was then ##X## demanded to fill a list of supplies which the Panthers needed for breakfast to feed 624 children every morning. He stated this list would need to be filled every day in quantities great enough to feed 624 children breakfast. Mr. McDONALD asked the subjects to leave a copy of the list with him and they refused to do so. He stated the tix items he remembered on the list were fresh milk, meat, eggs, bacon, pancake mixes and other breakfast foods. He stated that it was quite a long list, which them dwam demanded from the store.

He stated he has personally draw donated groceries bought with his own personal money on 2 previous occassions to the Black Panthers breakfast program. He also stated that he is positive that DAN KEIWNOW has also made contributions to the Black Panther party for the breakfast programs.

While Mr. McDONALD was discussing these demands with KENT FORD, he stated that ROSCOE ANDERSON shoved KENT FORD aside and stated "If you don't meet our demands by 10am Monday morning all hell will break loose." He further stated that if Mr. McDONALD wanted action, just wait until 1 minute after 10am on Monday. Mr. McDONALD stated that subj ANDERSON was very foul-mouthed and frequently referred to him as a "mother fucker."

Mr. McDONALD stated the 30 children who were picketting the store were all listening very intently to the conversation add appeared to be ready to destroy the store at that second, if their leaders asked them to. Mr. MCDONALD stated that he informed ANDERSON & KENT FORD that he would give their demands to the owner of the store, who is DAN MEINOW. At this time the pickets and the Black Panthers left the store property. Mr. McDONLAD also told us that R.L. ANDERSON notified 2 of his Black Panters to give him a report on Mr. McDONALD's activities. During our time at the store we did not observe any Black Panthers known to X these officers who could have possibly been observing Mr. McDONALD's momements.

Sir: While in the process of investigation, which carried us to the majority of the large chain stores located in the Albina area, & also to many of the small independently owned grocery stores, we met with the consensus of opinion that the subject, ED MC DONALD, mentioned in **XME** this case report number, has an extremely poor rapport with the neighborhood & the community which shops at his store.

The store owners we talked to indicated that his surly, beligerant nature combined with the fact of his long stay in the Albina area caused him to become quite embittered & to see hostility from many of his black patrons, which was due more to his attitude towards them & his treatment of them, rather than an independent aggressive attitude by the customer.

This information is forwarded as it may be of some value in the evaluation of his reported threat dated 1/31/70 at 5:00pm carrying this case number.

### 2nd Narative

Sir: By your direction, contacted numerous grocery stores within the Albina area with the same simple request; Had they been contacted by members of the Black Panther Party in regard to supplying the party with quantities of food to support their free breakfast program for black children.

Our first stop was the Tradewell Store at 15th & Fremont, where the night manager informed us that he knew of no contact & would advise us to contact the day manager. It was his belief that any or all requests of this nature would be forwarded to the main office here in Portland.

Our second stop was at the More-For-Less Store located between Vancouver & Fremont at the cross street of Beech. There the day manager indicated that KENT FORD had contacted them with such a request & he was also directed to the main office of the Tradewell Inc., of which M Pay-Less is a subsiderary.

Contacted the Albertson's Store at 909 N. Killingsworth & there spoke with the night manager, ROBERT L. MALONE, business phone 285-d6352. He indicated that prior to Christman a subject who he identified as THOMAS MILLS, PPD #50221 had entered his store in the evening & requested from him a check to support the breakfast program. MR. MILLS further informed him that the day manager had already spoken with MR. MILLS & indicated that a check would be ready & in the hands of the night manager. MR. MALONE then told him that he should return at 11:00am the following day & he would at that time have sufficient information to advise him wheather or not a check was available. He stated that he was awakened in bed the next morning & the day manager asked him if he, MR. MALONE, had told THOMAS MXXX MILLS, that the day manager would have a check ready for him. MR. MALONE recanted the experience he had had the night before, & MR. MILLS was turned away with no donation, me for the program. It is MR. MALONE's belief that there had been no threats, nor had there been any intimidation whatsoever.

Then contacted the Fred Meyer Grocery Dept., at 5405 NE Union. We were there advised that we would have to make contact during the day with JOHN CAREY, the Grocery Mgr. It was the opinion of the night manager that all such requests would be forwarded to the Fred Meyer Inc. main branch at 3800 SE Powell C-27 2/4/70

"CODED"

Then contacted the Safeway Store at Union & Ainsworth. There the night manager indicated that all such requests would have been forwarded to 1139 SE 3rd, to the Safeway Inc. employee relations dept., handled by MR. E. A. KIRK. He indicated that this gentlemen would be able to supply us with any information needed on complying to such a request.

### SUMMARY

It was readily apparent to investigating officers as they made contact that these numerous grocery stores that none of the night managers felt there was any ingrained hostility toward the program, they indicated that it was merely a matter of routine that such programs be forwarded through their main offices. Managers also indicated that in some cases damaged goods, which would be suitable for service, but which due to their physical condition would have to be sold at a reduced price, have been written off a total loss & are sometimes thrown away. They also indicated that utilization by such a program would be an excellent outlet for the goods that they necessarily had to disgard.

It became increasingly apparent that those stores which were contacted by Panther representatives felt not so much intimidated, but insulted by the manner in which the representatives approached. It was not an open business like meeting, but rather either trickery, as in the case of Albertsons at 909, or a subtle emplied threat as Kienows at 3038 NE Union.

It was readily apparent that these organizations hold no hostility toward the group, or what they are trying to do, but rather are insisting that all requests be made in a rational manner & are willing & ready to help if their proceedures are complied with.

Sir, Made contact with Mgr. Ed McDonald of the Kienow's Store at 3038 NE Union ave this am. Mr. McDonald said that he has been manager of this Kienow's store for the past fifteen years and knows most of his customers. He said that he was first contacted by the BLACK PANTHENS about three weeks ago and they told him about there program for breakfast for negro children before they go to school each morning. He said at the time that three colored subjects and on colored female made the request to him for food for the program. At the time he gave them several sacks of pancake flour and some boxes of crackers. He told them at the time that they would have to see the main office of Kaenow's before they would make any more contributions to the program. He told them to contact Dan Kienow to see about this contribution.

Mr. McDonald said that a subject by the name of R. L. ANDERSON and KENT FORD and a female by the name of LINDA THORNTON, was into the store on Tuesday, January 27th seeking contributions. McDonald told them that the contriubtions would have to come through by orders of the main office from Dan Kienow. The young girl with the two colored subjects said that she went to the office to see Mr. Kienow but that Mr. Kienow refused to see her(McDonald made contact with Mr. Kienow and he said that no such contact was made at his office).

The next thing that McDonald knew he had about thirty young negro pickets preding around the front of the store with home made signs. At this time, R. L. Anderson, Kent Ford and Linda Thornton came into the store and again asked for food. McDonald knew Kent Ford as customer in the store but this wasthe 1st time that he had seen R. L. Anderson, that is to have conversation with him. Ford told them that they needed food for the panters program, and then Ford backedoff and Anderson and the Thornton girl/ became very belligerent. Ford told him that the food contribution would have to be every week and if you don't come throught that the pickets would be around in force on Monday morning. Febr. 2nd, ( they failed to show up). McDonald did say that he got a call from the irl Linda Thornton from the courthouse on Febr. 2nd about the food and he told her that she would have to contact Dan Kienow. McDonald said that he felt that there were NO THREATS AGAINST HIS LIFE, in this incident but he felt he was being pressured.

McDonald said that there has been a small drop in business. His colored customers say that they the colored people are afraid of the kids, because they think the BOYS will hurt us. The threat made by R. L. Anderson was to the effect that "they would tear up the street, if their food demands were not met". Anderson is Loc. # 54245 and Ford is Local # 52067, unable to locate reoord on Linda Thornton. Attempted to contact Dan Keinew, 9840 River Rdd. Milwaukie 659-5220 but he was out for the day.

MCDONALD SAID THAT HE FELT THRU HIS CONTACT WITH HIS CUSTOMERS THAT HE WILL HAVE TROUBLE WITH THE BLACK PANTHERS EITHER THIS FEEDAY OR SATURDAY. UNDEVERLPED LEADS.

Dan stated that he hadn't been personally contacted by the BLACK PANTHERS, until yesterday afternoon 2-4-70. At that time he talked to a person who gave the name of LINDA THORNTON. Dan Kienow explained to Miss Thornton that he couldn't contribute daily to the BLACK PANTHERS breakfast program but that he would contribute food monthly ( one day each month) to the program. Dan Kienow explained to her that she or Anderson or Ford could pick up the food once a month.

Mr. Kienow then said that he called the store manager Edward McDonald and instructed him to give the BLACK PANTHERS, food for the breakfast program once a month in the amount of from \$5 to \$7.50 per month.

Mr. Ktennow was asked about the business outlook at this location at 3038 NE Union. Mr. Kienow said that the location is marginal, he would like to close up the store but will not for the present due to the fact that that closure might have an effect and the Kienow when chain of stores by the fact black population. In other words the Kienow markets are keeping this market open for the convenience of those blacks that live in the neighborhood.

Sir: This officer was directed to dictate a supplementary report re actions taken on 6/14/69, approx lam.

Approx lam, was called to the scene of a disturbance at Lidio's to cover the officers in the area. On arrival observed Off Harmon and Robinson with a juve in custody attempting to take him to their veh. At this time their veh was completely blocked in and Iassisted in taking the juve to dist car 73, and placing him in the rear seat.

The crowd had started to disperse and I was standing at the NW corner of Union/ Shaver by the rear of car 73, when I observed Kent FORD proceeding south fr the north side of the Lidio parking lot towards the veh. At this time they arrived at the veh and I heard numerous shouts of "get whitey, get the white mother fuckers, kill them". These were coming from Kent FORD.

Off Sanford had made an arrest and was attempting to place his prisoner in the rear of his veh when Kent FORD screamed "get whitey". At this time I observed a negro subj trying to grab Off Sanford from the rear. I pulled him off the police veh and attempted to subdue him. I was pulled from behind by at least one hand on my left shoulder and felt someone attempting to take my weapon from my holster. I knocked the person who was attempting to take the weapon away, away, and someone threw me to the ground, where I landed on the sidewalk next to the fire plug. At this time the person I had ahold of turned around and attempted to kick me in the bead. I straightened up and took the blow in the ribs, and at this time identified the attacker as <u>Curtis Lee HARRIS</u>, 19 yrs, xis nbc. I noted several officers rushing to my assistance and scrambled to my feet to keep from being kicked again by HARRIS.

HARRIS took off running thru the parking lot and went around behind Lidio's and thru the houses. He was chased by Off Buck and myself. On returning to the scene at Union/Shaver, after losing the subj who ran thru the houses between Mallory and Rodney, my side began to ache and I left the scene with Off Buck and went the McDonalds parking lot where a tow was called for our car as it 'd a slashed tire. I was transported to Emanuel Hospital by Off Robinson where I was treated and released.

At this time KENT FORD was advised by writers that he had been placed under arrest in writer's presence by Special Officer HALL and that he would be taken into custody by writers and tranported to the Portland City Jail. A preliminary search was made at this time of MR. FORD's pockets to ascertain whether he had any weapons of any kind and then MR. FORD was taken to the police unit to be transported.

Writer on speaking with MR. HALL about the charge was advised by MR. HALL that KENT FORD had come into the location approximately 6:15 p.m. this date, confronted him at the variety manager's desk and stated, "All right, I'm in the store; what are you going to do about it?" MR. HALL advised MR. FORD that he was going to place him under arrest for trespassing due to the fact that he had been barred from the store XXX 9/15/70 at approximately 9:30 p.m. by himself.

Upon an earlier call to the same location on a booster, we writers were advised by Special Officer HALL that he had had a problem with MR. FORD on 9/15/70 about 9:30 p.m. and that he had advised MR. FORD that he was barred from the store. This was at 4:19 p.m. 9/16/70 that writers were advised of this. Again at 6:17 p.m. after writers had placed MR. FORD in the patrol car, Special Officer HALL advised writers that on 9/15/70 about 9:30 p.m. MR. FORD came to location and wanted to buy some ammunition for a .22 caliber weapon. At that time FORD was advised that he would have to sign a book to buy this ammunition and also would have were to produce some identification. The clerk at that time was a JAMES or JIM SHELTON and subject FORD became very beligerent with this subject; very irate; calling him names and stating that he didn't have to sign any God damn things; that he was going to get the ammunition without having to sign or show any identification. MR. HALL came to the area or was in the area at that time and heard this conversation. He advised MR. FORD that threats would do no good; that the clerk had to follow by the federal law which requires a signature on the book and also identification to buy ammunition of this type. KENT FORD at that time became very beligerent with MR. HALL, calling him names and so MR. HALL advised him that he was to come downstairs with HALL, wher e they went down to the locker room and MR. HALL had a conversation with MR. FORD regarding the fact that he would be treated no different than anyone else in the store; that he would have to provide identification and sign for ammunition. At this time as they were leaving back up the stairs from the lower area of the store, they met this JAMES SHELTON coming down the stairs and FORD axt at that time called him a white racist, mother fucker, and then turned to HALL and stated, "You're nothing but a boot licking oreo." HALL at that time in front of MR. K SHELTON advised FORD that he was barred from the store; he was not to come back into Fred Meyer's store at Walnut Park; that he was not welcome at that location and that he would be placed under arrest for trespassing if he did return. At that time FORD on leaving the store called mxxxh MR. HALL an ass Sucking nigger cop and made other statements as to MR. HALL's character and indicated that he would like to take and burn

He then stated that a MINNER who works for the company, Mr. Reynold Olson, who had as this subj stated fired the Negro man, was also getting his own home burned down and he himself sent to the hospital. The subj on the other endof the line stated that they do know where Mr. Olson lives.

Mr. Kinnear stated that it definitely was the voice of a Negro man and when he identified himself as Ken Ford, Sax Black Panther headquarters, had no qualms about doing so, just came right out and stated that.

Stated that apparently the pick phone call was directed towards Mr. Olson .

Asked Mr. Jensen who the Negro man was that was fired and Mr. Jensen stated that the man was not actually fired, that he had just been transferred to a different dept and that there was no decrease in pay and no decrease in position. SIR: Contacted MR KENNETH KINNEAR who had received the threatening phone call. MR KINNEAR that a person who identified himself as KENT FORD did not mention names of the employees to which he referred but seemed to know that DAVID WARREN had been transferred and that another employee was about to be fired. The difficulty with the other employee OSCAR RAY WILLIAMS, 5115 NE 24th was that he was often late for work and other times was absent the entire day from work. When questioned about his absenteeism, WILLIAMS would only reply that it was a very personal matter. WILLIAMS at least pretends to be a very religious person and constantly refers to the Bible when talking to his supervisor.

I also talked with SID STODDARD of the Iron Workers local 516, who represents the iron workers at Mercer Steel. At 3:02pm 12-8-70 he had received a phone call from a Negro voice identifying himself as KENT FORD of the Black Panthers. This person stated that DAVID WARREN had been transferred, that OSCAR WILLIAMS was about to be fired and that these matters should be corrected. Stated that the same thing could happen to Mercer Steel that happened to Grandma Cookies and that the supervisor REYNOLD OLSON had also EXPIREM experienced a fire at his home. MR STODDARD will call this office should he receive any more calls.





## THE BLACK "GHETTO" -- A COMMUNIST SANCTUARY

The communist strategy for the conquest of the U.S.A. becomes clearer every day. It was revealed at the Conference for a United Front Against Fascism called and conducted by the Black Panthers in Oakland, California, July 18-20, 1969. The most sinister and significant speech at this conference was made by a white attorney, William Kunstler, who has a long record of association with communist causes.

A successful revolution requires the creation of a sanctuary in which the revolutionary forces can operate without molestation by the forces of the government.

The plan is to convert the black "ghettos" into areas where the white police dare not enter. These areas will then be terrorized and "policed" by the Black Panthers. Through their association with the Black Panthers, the white communists will be able to operate freely within these areas, store arms within them, and use them as bases from which to launch civil war.

This is brought out lucidly in the speech of William Kunstler. He informed his audience that the blacks had a legal right to possess weapons and a political right to shoot any white policeman who sets foot in black territory. He used the doctrine which the communists advanced during the 1930's. This doctrine teaches that the blacks are an independent nation which has been conquered and colonized by the Imperialist U.S.A. A white policeman in black "territory" is therefore an aggressive foreign invader who should be killed.

He chose the situation in Plainfield, New Jersey as the ideal example. He said no white policeman had set foot in the central ward of Plainfield, New Jersey since July, 1967, when a black mob stomped John Gleason, a white policeman, to death. This statement evoked prolonged applause from the audience. Kunstler lauded this lynching and presented Plainfield, New Jersey as the model for Oakland, Watts, Harlem, and Bedford-Stuyvesant. It is paradoxical that a man can publicly advocate lynching without trial and remain a privileged member of the American Bar.

. The communists also plan to create additional sanctuaries in the Universities and the Colleges.

The full text of the speech of William Kunstler is presented with the hope that appropriate legal action may result.

# SPEECH BY ATTORNEY WILLIAM KUNSTLER TO THE CONFERENCE FOR A UNITED FRONT AGAINST FASCISM OAKLAND, CALIFORNIA, SATURDAY, JULY 19, 1969

Tonight I was asked to talk about the right to self-defense from a legal point of view. Because I am not wholly a lawyer in a nonpolitical sense, I want to talk about it from two points of view: legal and political. The law is simple. The law is that every man has the right in every state to defend his home, his life, person, and the lives and persons of those he loves or has a duty to protect from any molestation by any person, whether he is wearing a uniform or not. That's the law, the simple law. It is in existence in the State of California, the State of New York, and all the states in between and out to Hawaii, and up to Alaska.

Now from the political point of view the black communities around the United States have learned, and hopefully many more will learn, that this is a political weapon as well as a legal weapon. It does no good to hear a lawyer tell you, you have the right to self-defense if you do not understand politically what self-defense is.

One community in the United States learned this lesson well, and L think to talk about it, is to talk about Oakland, Harlem, Bedford-Stuyvesant, Watts, and so on. That community is Plainfield, New Jersey. You will remember during the Newark rebellion in Plainfield, New Jersey, some 40 Garand M1 rifles were found missing from the Armory. (Applause) The governor of New Jersey, Richard Hughes, ordered the police to search every home in the central ward of Plainfield, the black ghetto of Plainfield, to find those missing Garand rifles. Three hundred police--state police, city police-broke into every black home in the central ward to try to find those guns. I am happy to say that not a single gun was found. (Applause) What happened after that was, with the exception of one more episode which I will tell you about in a moment, the police structure in Plainfield has not molested the black community. There has not been a white policeman in the central ward of Plainfield since July of 1967. (Applause)

Now the other episode in Plainfield which made it certain that this would be so, occurred some weeks after the theft of the guns. One white policeman by the name of John Gleason moved into the central ward of Plainfield on a Saturday afternoon. He marched down a street leading under a railroad underpass and then he shot a black man by the name of Bobby Lee Williams through the stomach. Bobby Lee Williams fell to the ground at this intersection near the railroad underpass. Gleason began to retreat out of the ghetto. He was followed by a crowd of black men and women, and a block and a half past the intersection he was stomped to death. (Prolonged applause) In my opinion he deserved that death. (Applause)

Now these are words which I might never have said several years ago until I lived a little longer and spent a little more time watching what happens in the black ghettos of the metropolitan areas of this country. Gleason signed his death warrant when he shot Bobby Lee Williams, an unarmed man, through the stomach. The crowd, justifiably, without the necessity of a trial, and in the most dramatic way possible, stomped him to death. The reason was one that comes back from 400 years -- from the pillaging and marauding of black communities throughout the United States and the world by white power structures that have preyed upon the ghettos the way vultures prey on meat. This is a sad story of the control of the black community. The right to self-defense legally is tied up intimately with the right of self-protection of the black ghetto. Without that self-protection, the black ghetto is at the mercy of whatever power structure happens to sit in the city halls throughout this country. The policeman, with the modern armory which he possesses, with his immunity, essentially, to prosecution for whatever he does, can only be stopped in one way: if he knows that he might fall like Gleason if he violates the rights of black men, women, and children in the ghetto areas of the United States.(Applause)

There is only one way to let him know that, and that is to be in a position to retaliate if the community is invaded.

You have a perfect right legally to possess certain weapons. I won't go into the nature of each oneyou know it as well as I do, but in most states a weapon that cannot be hidden on the person, with the exception of certain automatic rifles, can be legally maintained by you. That goes for semiautomatic carbines, ordinary rifles, of whatever caliber. If the power structure knows that you are determined to use that piece if your community is invaded, if people you love or respect or who are merely your sisters and brothers are being unjustly persecuted, victimized and destroyed by police, you have the right to use whatever force is necessary to prevent that depredation of human rights. (Applause)

It is hard for lawyers sometimes, like myself, who come out of the middle class, who have come out of an environment which is one in which language such as I am using tonight was not what we learned. But life teaches many lessons, as most of you know, and after you have lived awhile and after you have seen what happens in ghetto after ghetto, then you begin to understand sometimes that fear of retaliation is possibly, until we reach the millennium, the only fear that prevents those who prey on the oppressed from going too far. It won't stop them entirely, that would be asking too much, but it will slow them down, and in Plainfield it did stop them. It cost a grievous bullet wound in Bobby Lee Williams' stomach; it cost the conviction for murder of a man and a woman who were convicted for the murder of John Gleason and whose appeals are pending. Bobby Lee Williams, because he refused to testify for the state at those trials, has just been indicted for an attempt to murder John Gleason, although it is hard to realize how you can attempt to murder somebody when you are lying on the ground with a 38-caliber bullet in your guts, which is exactly what the position of Bobby Lee Williams was. That case goes to trial this September.

I would just like to add a few words before I quit, on this subject of self-defense. The Black Panther Party, as you all know, is named the Black Panther Party for Self-Defense; one of the cardinal principles which I have learned to regard as one of the most important, because it is most important, is to secure your community. Sometimes it is difficult to march ahead when you have a fear-ridden community that winces every time a siren goes down the street. Sometimes it is difficult to operate as human beings when every knock on the door might bring the pig inside. Often it is almost impossible to live knowing that you are almost an outlaw in the old English sense where every man could take your life without penalty or fear. It is difficult to live that way, and yet as most of you know much better than I, that is the way life in the ghetto runs in this day and age, in America 1969. If you have the power to defend yourself by weapons that are legal, then you have the power to start to rid the ghetto of the overriding fear of invasion that paralyzes so much action. You have the power to put an end to one of the chief drawbacks of all black communities--the control of the black community by the white policeman.

Now I say to you, and I'm speaking both as a lawyer and as a human being, that what I am advocating here is perfectly legal; it is perfectly in the American tradition; it is in the tradition of all men who respect themselves and their families and their friends and those who share their common scene in society; that you must stand ready until a better age arrives to protect yourself, your community, your friends, your lives, your property, and the very things that give life meaning. You must be able to stand as a man and a woman, and if you have to, it is better where it is necessary to retaliate, than to bend the head or bare the back for one more minute. One more minute of back bending, one more minute of scraping to the voice of white authority, is one minute too much. You cannot afford to spend that minute. You must stand up to defend yourself. And if you are ready, I hope that you won't have to. But don't shrink if you have to. It is almost worse to be ready and able to defend yourself, and to freeze on the trigger when the time comes, because then you will have told the power structure that they need not fear you, and you open up the whole sad trail of misery and depredation that has characterized life on this continent for so many years. Power to the people! (Applause)

#### ROBERT FRANKLIN WILLIAMS ON URBAN GUERRILLA WAR

The summer edition of the CRUSADER, the newsletter published by Robert Williams has arrived. As usual, its contents are informative and frightening. Since Robert Williams was the first to advocate armed violence by the blacks of the United States, he may be regarded as the father of the present black rebellion. This gives him stature among the black militants, and he tries to play the role of elder statesman advising the black organizations on their programs.

Robert Williams continues "in exile". He fled this country to escape arrest and persecution on the charge of kidnapping. His exile has been spent in Cuba, Communist China, and various countries of Africa. A year ago he announced that he was returning to the United States to face trial on the kidnapping charge. He advocated that thousands of blacks should surround the courthouse while the trial was in process. Prior to this newsletter, he was last heard of in Tanzania, allegedly on his way back to the United States, but his plans now appear vague and indefinite. He writes:

"This is my eighth year of exile from racist USA. I agitated for and initiated armed self-defense to white supremacy racist terror more than twelve years ago, consequently, my frame-up greatly preceded the current crop being leveled against black militants.

"In wake of this glaringly reprehensive fact, the question arises as to what reaction I expect on the part of the gods of Americanism when I return. A mad dog can always be expected to act like a mad dog...It is excessive asininity for black people to expect justice in a hostile white jungle society.

"The most positive aspect of my possible return to racist America will be an opportunity to demonstrate the extent of the black man's commitment to our ever widening struggle for liberation. I hope to set an example that will serve notice that in face of white supremacy terror, unjust and cruel imprisonment and threats of coldblooded and savage death, the black man can no longer be intimidated. I hope to bring home the point that the day has gone forever when the bullying white man can frighten the black man out of existence. He has the power to assassinate but not to intimidate." Page 22.

He fails, however, to give any indication concerning when his return will take place.

The CRUSADER is full of advice for the black militants. He discusses many subjects of interest to black people and informs them what the correct attitude is. Subjects which receive attention are:

- 1. Black capitalism.
- 2. Black morality.
- 3. Black studies.
- 4. Integration.
- 5. Birth control.
- 6. Hijacking of planes.
- 7. Infiltration of white institutions.
- 8. The Sino-Soviet dispute.
- 9. Urban guerrilla warfare.

#### Black Capitalism

He pours vitriolic scorn upon the whole concept of black capitalism. He states:

"Capitalism is the thing that has enslaved and dehumanized our people. It is the cause of our present misery. Our people are not being offered justice, they are being offered a bigger dose of what already ails them. The establishment full well knows that small time capitalism is doomed.

"The concept of black capitalism is tantamount to the urban advance of Afro-American communities across the race line into deserted white areas that are already in a state of deterioration.

"This new myth has been designed to create superficial class divisions and ultimately to deepen the inferiority complexes that are beginning to dangerously wear thin in Black folks. Black quasi-capitalism is nothing more than pocket coins or pin money tossed contemptuously to the more sophisticated version of the white man's idea of Little Black Sambo to have him scramble and dance a jig while pandering his self-respect to the white man's ego." Pages 5-6.

Robert Williams advocates socialism according to the prescription of Mao Tse-tung.

## Black Morality

He urges a stringent code of revolutionary morality for black youth:

"It is imperative that revolutionary youth undergo personal and moral transformation. There is a need for a stringent revolutionary code of moral ethics. Revolutionaries are instruments of righteousness. Violence applied in the pursuit of justice is what distinguishes revolutionary violence from that which is committed by tyrants and villainous thugs. Clean up the ghetto. Stop fratricidal warfare and conflict. Discourage the agents, provocateurs, Judases and criminal elements. Prepare for a struggle of survival." Pages 7-8.

### Black Studies

He appears ambiguous in his attitude to black studies. He resents the present picture of black life presented by black authors and film stars as much as he resents the old stereotype of "Little Sambo." He says:

"The black and white students are right to rebel against the rigidly sterile and reactionary system of ante-bellum brainwash.

"The image of the pious little Sambo, submissive God-fearing Uncle Tom and Uncle Remus nigra is being changed to that of the vulgar, tough talking welfare-made and white subsidized nigger, who is even of less value to white civilization than his hat in hand predecessor." Pages 10-11.

#### Integration

He warns against integration in the United States and claims that school integration is a farce. He says:

"We must seriously examine rash proposals of school integration that require the complete abolition of school facilities in the black community. The school should be a community institution that reflects local tradition and culture...Now that there is a growing spirit of Black Nationalism and a growing demand for self-determination, coupled with unveiled coercion, the phasing out of black schools and the shift to total and arbitrary integration is more punitive and spiteful than progressive. As the black school in the South is being slyly phased out, so is the black teacher. The hardest hit victim of all is the black student." Page 11

### Birth Control

He views birth control as part of a wide conspiracy for the extermination and genocide of the black race:

"Despite constant efforts at extermination and genocide, on the part of our great 'Christian benefactors' the black population is increasing faster than any other ethnic group in racist America. As a result of this phenomenon, there is growing interest in a campaign to arouse Afro-Americans to the need of birth control. Yes, Afro-Americans are being sold the idea of birth control while white so-called refugees and immigrants are being welcomed to America with open arms...This is another indication of how the black man's fate in the social jungle of racist America rests on the white man's whim and fancy. The man speaks of a welfare burden and a negative factor on the tax system...What a niggardly complaint on the part of one who has picked decaying flesh from the myriad bones of a plundered and raped humanity that he savagely victimized in his Christian endeavor to build an affluent society divorced from what he considered the trivialities of social responsibility." Pages 11-12.

## Hijacking of Planes

He opposes hijacking of planes except where a criminal is faced with the consequences of a serious crime. He points out that the hijacker of a plane is eliminated as an active agent in the revolution:

"Aircraft highjacking should be discouraged among black militants. Such antics should be looked upon as negative factors in the Black liberation struggle unless activists are forced to flee for their lives or are desperately trying to escape an acute felony frame-up. Black militants should be reminded of the fact that highjacking entails a serious felony that contributes nothing to the liberation struggle. This act is no way to defeat or escape U.S. racism. This type of action neutralizes the militant and completely isolates him from his people and their struggle." Page 12.

### Infiltration of White Institutions

He advocates this as an effective tactic of struggle:

"It is a grave error for militant and just-minded youth to reject struggle-serving opportunities to join the man's government services, police forces, armed forces, peace corps and vital organs of the power structure...Meaningful change can be more thoroughly effectuated by militant pressure from within as well as without. We can obtain invaluable know-how from the oppressor. Struggle is not all violence...With the threat of extermination looming menacingly before Black Americans, it is pressingly imperative that our people enter the vital organs of the establishment." ### Sino-Soviet Conflict

Since Williams writes from China, it is natural that he should take the side of the Chinese Communists in their conflict with the Soviet Union. He does this without reservation. He parrots the line of Mao Tse-tung with precision:

"The ruling hypocrites of the USSR have been ardently vocal in singing the peace parody tune that 'war is unthinkable'...They disclaimed violent struggle and brayed of how they were righteous champions of peaceful coexistence...They sang love songs to savage America and made vows never to betray her imperialist cause...Now the capitulationists have become aggressors. In regards to their socialist neighbor, People's China, they have changed their tune of 'war unthinkable' to a land grabber's ballad of armour and bullets... The defensive bullets of socialist China kill just as deadly as those of imperialist America. Why is war not 'unthinkable' on the Chinese border?... People's China is not Czechoslovakia! Aggression against one quarter of the world's population is the iniquity of madmen indulging in the folly of fools." Page 21.

#### Urban Guerrilla Warfare

The new feature in this issue of the CRUSADER is the emphasis on urban guerrilla warfare. Previously, Robert Williams stressed warfare in the rural areas through wandering fire teams creating a conflagration from coast to coast. This time he urges urban guerrilla warfare and points out that the blacks have already achieved one of the great objectives of every attacking military force. They are already in the heart of the enemy's territory. They do not need to breach the external fortifications or to employ the stratagem of the "trojan horse." He writes:

"The question now is not one of whether there will be violence but the type and extent of it. The question is no longer one of whether the deprived will resort to violence as a means of social change, but it is rather one of whether the establishment elects to make a suicidal last ditch defense of the doomed status quo or grudgingly resigns itself to a new structure of social order.

"Not only are the deprived peoples of the world becoming more and more convinced that because of violent repression they must express themselves through violence, but they are now devising new concepts of violent resistance and struggle. The concept of urban people's war is sweeping over the earth like an uncontrollable fire storm. Urban guerrilla warfare is being perfected to a most effective and decisive point...Recently, in many cities of the world we have witnessed a limited application of urban guerrilla warfare, or street combat. In these mere skirmishes we have been given some idea of the colossal potential of what could really happen, and how, in such a conflict. Conventional military science and tactics can be rendered ineffectual in massive people's war. A poor man's arsenal of light arms and home-devised weapons can wreak havoc on a nation. Extensive dispersal of combatants makes it impossible for repressive forces to concentrate the necessary power to quell the resistance. When thousands of freedom fighters fan out over a city in a campaign of obstruction and destruction, paralysis prevails. A salient feature of this type of conflict is that all of its destructive action takes place right on the enemy's own premises. Both offensive and defensive combat extract a heavy toll from the establishment ... Less than ten per cent of a given population can bring a highly mechanized and industrialized tyranny to its knees in a surprisingly short span of time if the ten per cent is well organized and devoutly committed to all-out urban guerrilla warfare. Urban guerrilla warfare does not mean that the countryside is completely neglected; it means that most mass activity would be concentrated in urban communities because most of the population is there. It means that rural campaigns would be conducted on the basis of targets being selected out of the dictates of necessity, overall strategy and diversionary tactics." Pages 17-18.

The writings of Robert Williams often provide a preview of what is about to take place. To be forewarned is to be forearmed.

ARTICLE 10. THE POLICE DEPARTMENTS

Section 2-1001. Establishment of Separate Police Departments. For the purpose of providing police services to the people of the City of Portland, there are established two police departments, one for each of the two Districts into which the City is divided as hereinafter set forth and described. Section 2-1002. Police Departments. Each Department of Police shall be administered by a Commission comprised of three members, hereinafter referred to as Commissioners, each of whom is selected by a Division Council as hereinafter provided. The Commissioners shall fix the policies of the police within the Department, shall punish police officers for violations of said policies and for violation of the law, shall determine qualifications of members of the police department and shall fix compensation of all employees of said Department. They may enter into necessary agreements with other police departments and other government agencies and generally conduct the affairs of the police department. Each Commissioner shall bring before the full Commission any matter or proposal which his council instructs him to place before the Commission, and shall vote as his Council instructs him. The Police Commission shall hold regular public meetings at a time when the residents of the Department District are most able to attend. The Police Commissioners shall serve on a full-time basis and shall be compensated therefor. Compensation shall be set by the respective Division Councils. The Departments may enter into agreements with each other for the operation, maintenance and staffing of certain facilities in which there is a common interest, including, but not limited to laboratories, vehicle repair and communications. The Departments may cooperate together in the requisitioning of equipment, including vehicles and weapons. Funds for the Departments shall be appropriated annually for the City of Portland by the City Council and shall be disbursed to each Department on the basis of the number of people residing in each Department District on the last preceding election. Neighborhood Divisions. Police Department District 1 Section 2-1003. is divided into three neighborhood Divisions described below. District 2 is not to be divided. Section 2-1004. Police Council. Each District 1 Neighborhood Division and District 2 shall be divided into fifteen Police

Council Precincts by the Auditor; the population of each such Precinct is not to exceed any other Precinct by more than 10% of the population of the entire District divided by the number of Precincts therein. The legal voters in each Precinct shall elect a Police Councilman who will serve in that capacity for a term of two years, unless recalled. The Councilmen shall serve on a part-time basis and will be compensated for the time spent in the performance of their duties.

Section 2-1005. Qualifications of Councilmen. Any person who has resided in the Precinct for six months next preceding the election and is of voting age at the time of elections is qualified to serve as a Councilman. There shall be no other qualifications established for the office.

Section 2-1006. Duties of Council. Each District 1 Neighborhood Council shall, within ten days of its own election, select a Commissioner. The District 2 Neighborhood Council shall, within ten days of its own election, select three Commissioners. addition to selection of Commissioners, the Councils shall review the policies of the Police Department and will recommend changes or modifications of such policies when such policies no longer reflect the needs or will of the populace of the Neighborhood represented by the Council. The Councilmen of each Neighborhood shall have the power, exercised by a vote of the majority of that council, to remove and replace their Commissioner when he is no longer responsive to the Council. Each Council shall establish procedures necessary to hear and process complaints made against individual members of the Police Department by persons residing within the district or concerning police practices within the district, and shall have the power to discipline members of the Department for violations of law or policy occurring within that District.

Section 2-1007. Meetings. The Neighborhood Council will meet regularly at a time convenient to the Councilmen and at a time when interested persons may attend. Special meetings may be called when requested in writing by 20% of the Councilmen. When requested by a Neighborhood Council, as expressed by a vote of the majority of said Council, the Councils of the Department shall meet jointly within ten days. At such a joint meeting the councilmen by majority vote may change, institute or modify any Policy of the Department, upon which the Commissioners fail or refuse to act.

Section 2-1008. Recall of Councilmen. The people of a precinct may recall their councilman by a petition bearing the signatures of residents equalling 20% of the number of people voting within the precinct in the last preceding general election. Upon certification of the requisite number of signatures an election shall be had not later than 30 days thereafter. Notice of intention to recall a councilman must be given not more than 30 days prior to seeking certification of the requisite number of signatures by the Auditor. Section 2-1009. Recall of Commissioners. Commissioners may be recalled by a petition bearing the signatures of 20% of the number of people voting in the precincts comprising the neighborhood to which the Commissioner is responsible.

Section 2-1010. Annexation. Whenever 30% of the adult residents of a precinct within one Department District, which is contiguous to anotherDepartment District, petition for annexation into said other Department District, an election shall be had within 30 days of certification of the requisite number of signatures by the Auditor. Such precinct shall be annexed if the majority of the people voting in such election so indicate, unless a majority of the councilmen of said other Department District reject such annexation within 30 days of said election. A notice of intention shall be given not more than 60 days prior to filing for certification of the petition. Where such annexation has taken place, appropriate adjustments shall be made between the affected Departments in regard to funding, whenever practicable.

Section 2-1011: Disposition of Current Assets. All funds, files, records, property, supplies, and other assets currently possessed by the Portland Police Department shall be divided among the Police Departments herein created in proportion to the population of each records shall be distributed so that each Department shall obtain all records pertaining to citizens living within its geographic confines, or to organizations operating therein.

Section 2-1012. Residence. All Police Officers shall reside in the area covered by the department they work for.

Section 2-1013. Authority of Commissions. Neither the City Council nor the Mayor of the City of Portland shall establish any police department or agency. The Police Commissions and the Neighborhood Councils shall possess exclusive authority to administer and direct the police departments.

Section 2-1014. Civil Service. The Commissioners of the separate Police Department Districts and the employees thereof shall not be subject to the civil service rules of the City of Portland. Section 2-1015. Department Districts Defined.

(A) Police Department 1 shall have exclusive jurisdiction over the areas of the city not served by Police Department 2. (B) Police Department 2 shall have exclusive jurisdiction over the area of the city bounded as follows: Starting at the intersection of Dekum Street and 18th Avenue, south along 18th Avenue to Broadway Street, west along Broadway Street to the Willamette River, north along the center line of the Willamette River to the projected Fremont Bridge, northeast along the projected center line of the Fremont Bridge to National Interstate Highway Number 5 (Minnesota Freeway), north along Highway 5 to Ainsworth Street, east along Ainsworth Street to Union Avenue, north along Union Avenue to Dekum Street, east along Dekum Street to 18th Avenue.

(C) All references to streets in this section shall be construed to mean the center line of such streets.

Section 2-1016. Neighborhood Divisions Defined. Police Department 1: Neighborhood Division A shall include the area both east of the center line of the Willamette River and north of the center line of East Burnside Street (not including Department District 2). Neighborhood Division B shall include the area both east of the center line of the Willamette River and south of the center line of East Burnside Street. #### WHO IS HUEY NEWTON?

Huey P. Newton is the cofounder and Minister of Defense of the Black Panther Party. The purpose of the Black Panther Party is to organize the defense of the black community in this country from the internal occupation forces--the police-to liberate the black colony in this country from the racist forces of oppression. They are implementing four key community programs to serve the people of the black community: 1)breakfast for school children paid for by the businessmen who rob the black community; 2)petition campaign for community control of police to rid the black community of the running dogs of the racist, decadent power structure; 3)free health clinics in the black community; 4)black liberation schools in the community.

#### WHY IS HUEY IN JAIL?

Over a year ago Huey was ambushed and shot by two Oakland pigs. One pig was killed. Huey was held in jail for months without bail while the state tried to build a case. They could not. Despite the pressure of the court and the State of California, the jury could only return a split verdict which was completely contradictory. Huey did not have a fair trial. He was not tried by a jury of his peers from the black community but by racist businessmen. Huey was sentenced to 2-15 years for manslaughter. Despite the fact that the star witness changed his testimony during the trial, a mistrial was denied.

#### WHY MUST HUEY BE FREED?

Huey is a political prisoner of the racist power structure of this country. His trial was a political trial to keep him off the streets. It was the first step in a massive and systematic campaign of repression directed at the Panthers. Eldridge Cleaver, Minister of Information of the Panthers, has been driven into exile. Bobby Seale, Chairman of the Panthers, has been indicted for conspiracy in the Chicago riots although he was there for only 2 hours to raise money for the Party. George Murray at SF State has been fired and arrested. In Chicago, 19 Panthers were busted on April 2 on minor violations, and Fred Hampton, Illinois Panther Chairman, faces 10 phony charges, including 1-20 years for "robbing" an ice cream truck and giving the ice cream to kids. In New York, 21 Panthers are being held on 2.1 million dollar bail on trumped-up charges of conspiracy to blow up 5 New York department stores, a railroad track and the Bronx Botanical Gardens to boot. This national offensive against the Panthers shows the real nature of racism and the racist nature of justice in this society.

Huey is the symbol of the movement for liberation in this country. Huey and all political prisoners must be freed, for the attack leveled at the Panthers is a racist attack on all the people of this country and the peoples' movements. He must be freed.

#### WHY NOW?

Today, May 1, a federal judge is asking the State of California to show cause why Huey should not be released on bail pending the appeal of his case. How he rules will be determined by how much support Huey gets from the masses of people. The Panthers have called for massive demonstrations throughout the world to demand that Huey be set free. In San Francisco, New York, Los Angeles, Detroit, and Seattle, thousands of people are demonstrating right NOW---

#### BLACK PANTHER PARTY PLATFORM AND PROGRAM What We Want -- What We Believe

1. We want freedom. We want power to determine the destiny of our Black Community.

2. We want full employment for our people. We believe that the federal government is responsible and obligated to give every man employment or a guaranteed income. We believe that if the white American businessman will not give full employment, then the means of production should be taken from the businessman and placed in the community so that the people of the community can organize and employ all of its people and give a high standard of living.

3. We want an end to the robbery by the white man of our Black Community.

4. We want decent housing, fit for the shelter of human beings.

5. We want education for our people that exposes the true nature of this decadent American society. We want education that teaches us our true history and our role in present-day society.

6. We want all black men to be exempt from military service. We believe that black people should not be forced to fight in the military service to defend a racist government that does not protect us. We will not fight and kill other people of color in the world who, like black people, are being victimized by the white racist government of America. We will protect ourselves from the force and violence of the racist police and the racist military, by whatever means necessary.

7. We want an immediate end to POLICE BRUTALITY and MURDER of black people. We believe we can end police brutality in our black community by organizing black self-defense groups that are dedicated to defending our black community from racist police oppression and brutality. The 2nd Amendment of the Constitution gives us the right to bear arms. We therefore believe that all black people should arm themselves for self-defense.

8. We want freedom for all black men held in federal, state, county, and city prisons and jails. We believe that all black people should be released from the many jails and prisons because they have not received a fair and impartial trial.

9. We want all black people when brought to trial to be tried in court by a jury of their peer groups or people from their black communities, as defined by the Constitution of the United States. We believe that the courts should follow the United States Constitution so that black people will receive fair trials. The 14th Amendment of the US Constitution gives a man a right to be tried by his peer group. A peer is a person from a similar economic, social, religious, geographical, enviornmental, historical and racial background. To do this the court will be forced to select a jury from the black community from which the black defendant came. We have been, and are being tried by all-white juries that have no understanding of the "average reasoning man" of the black community.

10. We want land, bread, housing, education, clothing, justice and peace. And as our major political objective, we want a United Nations-supervised plebiscite to be held throughout the black colony in which only black colonial subjects will be allowed to participate, for the purpose of determining the will of black people as to their national destiny.



# Cómmittee to fight fascism organizes its power base By KATHY KUCERA Of the Emerald

The people met.

Their purpose was to create a power base to make the phrase "all power to the people" a reality in Eugene.

The people constituted the organizational meeting of the <u>Committee</u> to <u>Combat</u> Fascism, about 125 persons who met Tuesday night at the Univer-

sity. "The Minutemen, Birchers, and other right-wingers are just a smokescreen," according to Chuck Armsbury, one of the committee organizers.



Those groups hide the three elements of fascism, said Armsbury, because "fascism ain't nothing more than domestic imperialism."

The power of finance capital, demagogues and politicians, and "fascist pigs in the street (police)" are the facets of "domestic imperialism" that must be combatted if the people are to build a basis for self-governance under the terms endorsed by the commmittee, said Armsbury.

With an overall goal to decentralize the power, the Eugene group met to organize into nine committees to create an effective means to change the present government structure of Eugene. Other similar groups, coordinated by the National Committee to Combat Fascism, are engaged in the same goal in other cities.

Speakers at the Tuesday meeting tried to define fascism and outlined an ultimate system by which a 15-member council elected by citizens would deal with complaints. Under the system, police and other governing officials would be more directly responsible to the persons by whom they were elected than they are at the present time.

But while working for this ideal the speakers realized those working must know that a powerbase is necessary before the ideal can be reached. The leaders emphasized the power base must be their first step.

Howard Anderson, a leader in the Black Panther party, said "90 per cent of the beefs in Eugene can be beat if you have the money of subpoenas, transcripts," and legal costs. He charged it was necessary to get the power base and funding "so we don't have to run to Charlie Porter," a Eugene attorney, for help.

The committees set up include religious, labor, political prisoners, students and education, fund raising, and women's groups.

The leaders who spoke Tuesday indicated a thrust at the structure of the police department and how it relates to the city of Eugene would be one of the first ways to fight "domestic imperialism" on the local scale. The committee as a national group would be better prepared to combat fascism in the other two areas of Fascism, industry and politicians, if the police structure has been changed on a local level, according to Bill Green, a University student, and Anderson.

## Combat Fascism group slates speakers

The Eugene Committee to Combat Fascism will hear a series of speakers at its first regular meeting at 9 tonight in Room 3 Fenton Hall.

The committee, being organized by the Black Panther Party and Patriot Party, is part of the National Committee to Combat Fascism.

The handbill—stated objectives of the group include: (1) community control of decentralization of police, (2) mobilization and rallying of people to attend the national meeting of UFAF workers conference and (3) rallying people to defend and support political prisoners.

#### State YD officers visit Eugene

Three officers of the state Young Democrats organization from the Portland area are visiting Eugene this week "talking to people and testing out opinions" in an effort to establish new YD chapters and promote a "revitalization" of the group's image.

They are Paul Bigman, national committeeman for Oregon, Diane Morrison, national committeewoman, and Rick Spirties, college group coordinator.

The YDs said they are interested in "returning the country to the people. Returning a political party to the people is a means to that goal," they added.


One of the officers said that as an organization YDs have in the past been "flunkies for the senior (Democratic) party." He said, however, the group is working to change that image and make YDs "something other than a joke."

# Local Panthers blast 'pigs,' 'honkies'



The occasion was a "Free Huey Newton" rally. Newton, cofounder (with Bob Seale) of the Panthers in late 1966, was convited of manslaughter last Sept. 8 after the fatal shooting of an Oakland police officer. He was sentenced from two to 15 years in prison, and was scheduled to appear before a San Francisco judge Thursday to apply for release on bail, pending a new trial.

The Eugene rally was but one of dozens scheduled nation-wide by Panther members, who contend that Newton is a political prisoner.

Small groups of Panthers arrived at the rally area promptly at 10 a.m., where they regrouped. A contingent of 13 beret-clad members then marched to the center of the plaza, which was crowded with about 200 persons, mostly students. Two panthers carried blue banners emblazoned with silhouetted black panthers.


The platoon leader then directed the dissemination of copies of organized group chants, and the emphasis of the two-hour observation keyed on group chanting and demonstrations by Panther members.

Two leaders of the local chapter, Tommy Anderson ("minister of education") and Oliver Patterson ("field lieutenant") took the microphone, Anderson haranguing lengthily on "honky pigs, and the attempts by the "White power structure" to "keep the Black man down" through such federal policies as the present involvement in Vietnam.

"It's not just the Black man that's getting ----- over," "I'm here to hip every last one of you to the injustices of this ----"

Oliver directed the body of his attacks to members of the Eugene City Police allegedly covering the proceedings, charging that photographs of the rally were being taken by plainclothesmen.

In this context, he volunteered the crowd a definition of 'pig,' saying "A pig is anybody who robs from the poor and robs from the people. You're with a bunch of madmen that just don't give a ---. And if this keeps up and these people kill me, I'm gonna get some beautiful Blacks and some beautiful Whites and kick God out of his kingdom."

## Portland Black Panther captain describes cop attack on ghetto

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21 – This city's black community of Albina is preparing a major defense campaign for the victims of a police attack which took place June 14-18 (see The Militant, July 4). At that Ford, captain of the Portland Black Panther Party, was charged with inciting to riot and kept in jail for 13 days on a punitive bail of \$40,000.

what happened Tuesday night and carly Vednesday morning. June 17 and 18, yhen black people rallied to defend their ommunity from the police invasion. The incident which began the mass arrests ccurred late Friday night and carly sat-inday morning, at Lidio's Drive-In Res-aurant at the corner of Union and Shaver, where groups of young black people often ongregate. Police provoked an incident which led to the arrests of 12 black people. In the following night the cops returned in force to Lidio's - attacked people with

their nightsticks, arrested them or drove them off. Other groups of cops armed with shotguns engaged in similar actions in other parts of the ghetto. Mass arrests continued. Sunday night. Monday night there were fewer arrests, apparently because they had driven people off the streets by then. The Oregonian reported Tuesday morning that, "Shortly after 10:30 p.m., police moved into Lidio's, a popular drive in restaurant at NE Union and Shaver streets ... "A few moments later police reported, "The situation is under control at Lidio's." An hour later all the streets in the area were 'fairly clean of pederstrans." Ford, capuain of borland's Black Panther

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21 - Roscoe L. Inderson and Percy Hampton, both ar-ested during the June mass arrests, were ecently subjected to summary trials, con-icted, and given harsh sentences on char-es that stemmed from incidents previous the June arrests. A look at the "justice" ey received demonstrates the need for a publicize igorous defense committee to publicize ae truth about police behavior in Albina.

R. L. Anderson, leader of a group known s the Black Berets, and former president f the Albina Citizens Council, a council f black organizations in Portland, was brvicted of interfering with a police of-cer in an incident at Jetterson High School the latter part of May.

The incident occurred when Anderson, ho had been awarded high praise by hool authorities for his work in race attention of the shool, was called by the nool to deal with an incident. According to Anderson, he was sitting a car near Jefferson, when a cop on a otorcycle saw him and called him a lack bastard and used other abusive inguage. Anderson went to the police ation and complained about the officer I Inspector Springer, whereupon the cop, Inspector Springer, whereupon the cop, in the advice of government officials, presd charges against Anderson.

At the trial, July 15, R. L. Anderson ad 'ten witnesses in his behalf—not all f whom took the stand, since they had sentially the same testimony. Judge Ed-und A. Jordan found Anderson guilty ung A. Jordan Iound Anderson guilty a the testimony of one cop. According to fficer Clark E. Paul, Anderson kept yel-ng, "Don't let them arrest him," to a owd, while Paul was making an arrest. Judge Jordan sentenced Anderson to 90

"Black people's testimony meant abso-lutely nothing in the whiteman's court," commented Anderson, when he finished recounting what happened. Anderson ap-pealed the conviction, and is out on pealed the co \$1,000 bond.

Percy Hampton, a 19-year-old student at Portland State University, was tried by Municipal Judge Edmund Jordan, June 27, and found guilty of disorderly conduct by using profane language against police. He was sentenced to 30 days jail suspend-ed, and one year probation.

The verdicts and sentences were such a The verticits and sentences were such a blant, miscarriage of justice that even the **Oregonian**, which has consistently given the pollee version of arrests of blacks, reported the trial in sufficient detail to expose what happened. Here is what they wrote June 28:

"In the trial before Municipal Judge Ed-mund Jordan, police testified they attempt-ed to search Hampton. They received hear-say information from a carnival follower that the youth might be carrying a rubber base of a lawn power splice hidden is hose or a lawn-mower roller, hidden in the front of his pants.

The ront of his pants. "They said they found nothing to in-dicate Hampton might be carrying this concealed weapon and that he was orderly. "When the police told him to open his jacket, and said they thought he was carry-

ing a weapon, Humpton ignored them and continued to walk down the midway with a friend, they testified.

"Hampton's testimony, which went un-contradicted, except for the amount of profanity used, was that police pulled at his arms, stopped him three times, and attempted to pat him down each time with out his permission, and without putting him

"Hampton said, on the third occasionprior to which he had just told the police to leave him alone — he used one profane word towards the police. Police said he used more, beginning with almost the first contact.

"When Hampton swore at police, they put him under arrest. Police found no weapon on him.

"Douglas Wilson, 4405 NE Cleveland Ave., who was with Hampton in Holli-day Park, testified to the same events. "Another defense witness, Edward Mitch-ell, 37, of 1526 NE Saratoga St., co-

"Another detense whites, income ell, 37, of 1526 NE Sarafogar St., co-ordinator of community services for the Model Schools Program, testified that Hampton's reputation for honesty and good behavior in the community was impeccable.

peccable. "Hampton's attorney pointed out that Hampton's behavior was perfect until the police began harassing him by patting him down without his permission and against his objections and by impeding his free passageway.

"The attorney said that the police acted In a attorney said that the police acted on hearsay information – without having seen anything themselves – and provoked Hampton until they could make an arrest. "Judge Jordan found Hampton guilty. 'I don't have any choice,' he remarked. 'Hampton himself testified that he used one

word of profanity, wheih was apparently said loud enough for four officers to over-hear. I just had no choice but to find him guilty.

"Then Jordan opened up on Hampton: "You apparently have some kind of thing about police officers. I don't know what happened to you to make you think the way you do, but you sure don'tlike police. That

'Let me tell you young man, police are here for your protection and for mine. Your attitude is unjustified. I sure don't need any crystal ball to know that unless you

change your ways... you are facing a future of nothing but trouble." At a prior trial the same week, Hampton was convicted of disorderly conduct and resisting arrest growing out of an incident which occurred May 24. The charge of which occurred May 24. The charge of assault based on the same incident was dropped. Hampton described the incident to me as follows: At about 8:30 p.m. there was some

confusion around the corner from his home, and his mother asked him to see if his nine-year-old brother had been hurt. When he got to the scene, a police officer, Kan-

he got to the scene, a police officer, Kan-zler, spoke to him. "Kanzler told me to stop, and said. 'Don't move.' "I had seen the police guard go around the corner, and they were beating up this black kid. I told him (Kanzler) all that police do is come in the black community and brutalize black people."

Then Hampton walked around the corner Then Hampion walked around the corner to look for his brother. He saw Kanzler talking with another cop, Harmon. Soon after, six cops jumped him, threw him down, choked him and hvisted his arms. He was arrested for assaulted for resisting arrest.

At the trial, he was convicted on the testimony of Harmon and Kanzler, Ham-pton said the trial was "a regular Kangaroo court. All the judge said was guilty on both charges, and he sentenced me to two 90-day terms to run concurrently." In neither trial was there a jury. Hampton expects to have a jury when his appeals

BERKELEY—Eldridge Cleaver made his first appearance as a lecturer at the University of California last week, but the Berkeley campus may still see a confrontation between students and administration, probably after the Board of Regents meets Friday and Saturday.

In a resolution aimed specfically at Black Panther and exconvict Cleaver, the regents have limited all outside lecturers without instructional titles to one classroom appearance. Any more than that will result in removal of credit for the course. Cleaver is scheduled to give the second of 10 scheduled lectures this week.

About 800 students met last Wednesday night and planned a course of action aimed at challenging the regents' decision. They decided to:

• Hold a mass rally in support of the 100 students who are taking the Cleaver course, known as Social Analysis 139X. Students must file lists of courses by Friday and any lists which contain 139X will have the course ignored or crossed off their schedules. The students plan to march to the administration building with the students to turn in their study lists. The students in the course have asked that the demonstration be peaceful.

• Demand that faculty members publicly grant credit for 139X either as special sections of other courses or as independent study. More than 100 professors have already agreed to do this.

• Demand that faculty members and teaching assistants defy the Regents' ruling by bringing in outside lecturers next week for more than one appearance, without seeking special titles for them.

• Hold another mass meeting after the regents meet to decide on a course of action based on the regents' decision. The students rejected committing themselves to "mass militant" action" before the meeting, but no one expects the regents, who

almost banned Cleaver from the campus entirely, to take a more liberal position. Many radicals hope the regents' action will unite students and faculty, making a Columbia-style takeover possible.

Cleaver's first lecture was mild. "I'm not here to be a demagogue," he anounced as the lecture opened. Reporters were barred from the classroom, but several got in anyway and heard the Black Panther deliver a fairly dispassionate analysis of racism. Students applauded Cleaver at the end of the lecture, but he told them, "Now, students, this is a classroom. You can bring me apples, but no applause."

Course sponsors were unhappy with the turnout for the lecture. Besides the 100 students registered for the course, another 400 had signed up as auditors, but only about 300 students heard the lecture.

Some students want to expand the movement to include larger issues and more militant tactics.

Other students are opposed to expanding the issue right now, however, and a majority are opposed to militant action at least until after the regents meet. "You're just afraid Berkeley will lose its position as the radical capital of the country," accused one student who wants to keep the fight to the issue of credit for the Cleaver course.

The students are also divided on how to work with the faculty, which disappointed them by not voting to defy the regents' decision. But most students seem to want to give the faculty a chance to defy the regents' ban next week before they act alone.

Some students also fear they will play into the hands of California 'right wingers like Governor' Ronald Reagan and Senatorial candidate Max Rafferty, who'clearly want a campus confrontation to aid Rafferty's flagging campaign against Democrat Alan 'Cranston.

Most of the students seem to agree with one speaker who said, "There will always be someone who will tell us not to act because it will help the right wing, but if we don't act it's the right wing that benefits. That's the way they come to power."

In their back-room strate-gy sessions, SNCC leaders have contended that riots no longer are worthwhile be-

longer are worthwhile be-cause the "white establish-ment" is now prepared for them. New tactics should be developed, they argue, to keep the authorities off balance.

The Black Panthers, how-ever, want to continue ghetto rebellions, which they believe will lead to anarchy and revolution.

It is imperative that the Uni-It is imperative that the Uni-versity immediately institute a written policy stating its posi-tion in regards to hiring of po-tential University personnel ac-cused of committing a crime. The University, at present, is utilizing either a written or un-written policy with one of its faculty members. The chemistry instructor accused of inciting

instructor, accused of inciting to riot during the Democratic convention in Chicago, is still on the staff. In this case, it has been shown that until proven wilty in the current during guilty, in the eyes of the Uni-versity, the instructor is innocent.

Previous to an alleged felony charge, I was a potential Uni-versity employee who was given more than a strong verbal affirmation of my ensuing employment.

There has been a refusal to employ me in a counselor capac-ity due to this yet-to-be proven charge.

In other words, the Univer-sity has wittingly or unwittingly adopted a hiring and firing policy. The position of the Univer-sity seems to be that personnel employed on the University staff previous to a charge are inno-cent until proven guilty, while potential employees, regardless of qualifications, are guilty until proven innocent.

University's intent

Is it the intention of the Uni-versity to set a standard such as this?

There are several facts I think should be illuminated. On March 18, I, Tommy Lee Anderson applied for a head residents' position on the Uni-versity staff. I talked to Bob Shepard (counselling super-visor) and he told me that there was and is a demand for Black head residents but that a bachelor's degree was necessary to hold down this position. Given hold down this position. Given my qualifications, however, Bob Shepard said that he was will-ing and ready to employ me in this capacity. We decided that I would take on a job as a dor-mitory counselor. this spring term and then, next fall, come on as a head resident. The qualifications which so

The qualifications which so impressed Bob Shepard were the following: (1) I have been a dorm counselor for the Upward Bound summer program. (2) I've worked with minority relations and staff development, along with the President's Com-mittee Against Racism, coun-seling dorm counselors and bringing the racism out of them, and out of the students that are in the dorms.

This was done in order to lay the truth on the table, and deal with the racism in an orderly with the racism in an orderly way. (3) I have worked with Arthur Pearl in New Careers teaching the new careers pro-grams every Monday during winter term, and continuing through this term. (4) I have been employed at the Tongue Point Iob Comps Contor in the been employed at the Tongue Point Job Corps Center in the recreation program. (5) I have worked with the HEP program here on the Oregon campus, and have Bob Carl's full endorse-ment behind me on this. Bob Shepard told me that I have more guilfections in

Bob Shepard told me that I have more qualifications in counseling than he himself had. He told me that it would be more than a gift to have a man with as much experience as I have, holding down a dorm counselor's position on this campus. He also explained the demand

He also explained the demand for Black male counselors and was ready to put me into that position as a dorm counselor. Tuesday, Bob Shepard told me when I went into his office around 11 a.m. that there were three positions open for dorm counselors, but that there were nine applicants for the position. He then arain said that given my He then again said that given my experience, I shouldn't worry about one thing, because he would love to see me in that dorm counselor's position.

Wednesday morning at 9:15, Howard Anderson and I had a

confrontation with the Eugene Police Department. In this con-Police Department. In this con-frontation with the police I was charged \$5,000 bond and given a felony charge. Legally, and according to justice, I am inno-cent until proven guilty. Thursday, when I entered the office of Bob Shepard, the entire-atmosphere had, changed. Wed-nesday when I walked in I was Tommy Anderson, more than well equipped for the job' as a

well equipped for the job as a dorm counselor.

Thursday when I walked in I was no longer Tommy An-derson. In the eyes of Bob Shepard I was a vicious, hostile, uncompromising Black Panther wanting to poison the minds of the people around me. Guilty until proven innocent was the attitude Bob Shepard had. He said because of your beliefs in the Panther Party and because of the confrontation with the police department, I'm not going to hire you for the job this

spring. I tried to convince Mr. Shepard that in spite of the confron-tation with the Eugene Police Department, I was still capable of holding the dorm counselor position.

I was led to make several as-sumptions due to actions taken by the housing department, Bob Shepard in particular: (1) There is no written state-

ment or policy that says that a qualified, bona fide person should be rejected or denied em-ployment because of his affiliatwith any religious, fraternal or social group or organization.

(2) This entire issue goes deeper than just a guestion of policy. The Panther Party, in this particular instance, is an organization formed to protect Black lives, and prevent harass-ment of Black people by police-men men.

To deny me the right to belong to a group formed off campus to protect members of the Black community is to tell me that I do not have the right, to defend myself. This I cannot see.

see. (3) Viewing things in per-spective, I see many problems of this kind occurring. Why? Because Black students and Black people everywhere are starting to assert themselves as Black people. This means, in meet instance that in a concept most instances, that in a society constructed for the good of the majority of its people, (who are White), this assertion will be perceiced as negative and illegal.

gal. I personally feel that it is the job of the University to pre-pare itself for change. Room must be made for Black stu-dents to be Black students. If I am a Panther it does not mean that I cannot be an excel-lent counselor; I am a counselor on campus a Panther of camient counselor, I am a counselor on campus, a Panther off cam-pus. Fear should not blind us to the facts on hand. I was qual-ified until I was publicly ac-knowledged as a Panther. In a White mind, I guess it follow-ed that I should become un-cualified qualified

# Student claims job loss due to court charge Frmer. 4-3-69 due to court charge

A University student facing charges of assault accused the University Wednesday of considering him "guilty until proven innocent" by refusing to ful-fill its promise of hiring him as a dorm counselor.

In a written statement, Tommy Anderson called on the University to immediately institute a written policy stating its posi-tion in regards to the hiring of potential University personnel accused of committing a crime." Anderson and his brother Howard, were indicted by the grand jury this week on charges of assaulting a Eugene police officer with a deadly weapon March 19.

Both posted \$5,000 bail bonds and have been given until tomorrow to enter pleas in the Lane County Circuit Court.

Previous to the alleged felony charge, Anderson claimed he was "a potential University em-ploye" since he had been given a "strong verbal affirmation" of his ensuing employment as a head resident by Counseling Supervisor Bob Shepard. Shepard, declined to make

any specific comments on Anderson's statements, but noted, "Obviously there is a difference in viewpoint."

Shepard said Anderson's application for dorm counselor has been referred to the Dormitory Counselors Selection Commit-tee, which will make the ultimate decision on Anderson's employment. "The matter of record will be

made by the committee and not by me," Shepard said.

A co-chairman of the com mittee, Dean of Students Donald DuShane, said yesterday the committee will meet "as soon as possible."

The remaining seven committee members include co-chairman H. P. Barnhart, director of

University housing, David Brinks, counseling center director; Dick Jones, ASUO presi dent; Larry Large, acting dean of men; Scott Nobles, chairman of the student conduct committee; Richard Romm, assistant director of dorms and Shirley Wilson, dean of women.

According to Anderson's statement, Shepard had agreed to overlook the normal bachelor degree requirement for the head resident position and "was will-ing and ready to employ me in

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# Rally scheduled in park blocks in sympathy with Huey Newton

Huey Newton, founder and Minister of Defense for the National Black Panther Party, will be the subject of a downtown sympathy rally Thursday according to University student Tommy Anderson, Minister of Education for the local Panther chapter.

Newton, who founded the Black Panthers in Oakland,

Thursday, simultaneous rallies across the națion will call for the release of Newton on bail while appealing the charges against him.

According to Anderson, Newton will appear before a San Francisco judge Thursday to apply for release on bail.

The rally in Eugene, Anderson said, will serve to educate "the people."

Speakers from the Black Panhers, Peace and Freedom Movement and the Eugene Police Department will address the crowd beginning at 10:30 a.m. in the Park Blocks downtown.

Anderson said the rally will attempt to educate the people about the Black Panthers and the work they do, as well as to call attention to the imprisoned Newton.

The Panthers are not racist, Anderson added. "Huey Newton taught to look beyond Black People, to all people and to the people's revolution; racism is gone for all people." He claims that Newton h a s been held in prison as a political prisoner.

"Huey Newton has served as our leader," declared Ander 'son. "I will continue to fight under Huey Newton as long as God gives me strength and breath to live."

Anderson said there would probably be a mobilization rally at the University before the rally downtown.

Andersons plead innocent to police assault charges

Two University students entered pleas of not guilty Friday in Lane County Circuit Court to charges resulting from alleged incidents with state and local police two weeks ago.

Howard Anderson, 24, pleaded innocent to grand jury indictments charging him with threatening to kill state police officer Jack Winchester March 21, and assaulting Eugene police detectives Jack Cater and Howard Williams with a carbine March 19.

Tommy Anderson. 20, faces two counts of "assault with a dangerous weapon" for allegedly "threatening and menacing" Cater and Williams with a pistol March 19.

The trial date will be set later.

After the pleas were entered, Judge Edward Leavy heard testimony concerning reduction of bail bonds posted by the Andersons.

Howard and Tommy Anderson have posted bonds of \$15,-000 and \$5,000, respectively.

Their attorney attempted to prove their willingness to voluntarily appear in court by interrogating the three officers involved.

Each officer testified the Andersons had not attempted to flee from the jurisdiction of the alleged crimes. Cater and Williams said the brothers, appeared in court voluntarily and did not require an arrest on the "assault, with a dangerous weapon" charges. Deputy District Attorney Stephen Kreutzer testified for the prosecution that Howard Anderson had failed to appear after an arrest last year in Lane County.

Kreutzer stated Howard Anderson is presently facing charges in Saginaw, Michigan, and that he left Michigan without the court's permission.

Each application for bail reduction was denied.

# Panthers plan innocent plea

Two brothers attending the University, Tommy and Howard Anderson, •are scheduled to appear at 9 a.m. today in the Lane County Circuit Court on charges of assaulting a Eugene police detective March 19 by "threatening and menacing" him with "dangerous weapons."

According to Tommy Anderson, both will plead innocent. Tommy Anderson told the Emerald Tuesday night, "I did not threaten any officer and my brother did not threaten any officer."

A separate incident March 21 in which Howard Anderson allegedly threatened to kill a state police officer led to his second charge of the week — "threatening the commission of

a felony." He will also be ar-

raigned in circuit court this morning on charges stemming from that incident.

The Andersoh's were arrested on charges stemming from events at the home of Oliver Patterson.

The brothers allegedly threatened officers serving Patterson with Eugene Municipal Court warrants with a rifle and pistol.

The detectives said they left the porch of the house when the Andersons said, "There aren't going to be any more Black Panthers arrested."

On the afternoon of March 19 the Andersons were arraigned in Lane County District Court on assault charges and were later released after posting \$5,000 bail bonds.

The second charge against Howard Anderson—"threaten ing the commission of a felony" --resulted when Anderson allegedly threatened to kill Jack Winchester, a state police officer.

According to Register-Guard reports, Winchester and sheriff's deputy Roy Dirks were in a parked car in the 300 block of East 13th Ave. when Anderson allegedly approached the vehicle and voiced a threat.

At the same time, police said, several cars with armed men approached and virtually surrounded the detectives' car.

After driving away from the area, Winchester and Dirks were followed for several blocks by the armed motorists, according to police reports.

Anderson was arrested that evening and he offered no resistance, police said. He was released the morning of March 22 after posting a \$10,000 bail bond.

R. L. Anderson, past presi-dent of the Albina Citizens Council, acted as judge and "indicted" the City of Port-land on "150 counts" of abuse and mistreatment of blacks in the Albina area. He also claimed the police were at fault for "causing" two riots last summer.

A half dozen black witnesses testified they were "harassed and smacked around" during the tussles with police at the height of the outbreaks.

Ford told those attending he had stopped at a drive-in, re-staurant on NE Union Ave. on his way home from work to find out why a crowd of "about 100" had gathered.

He accused police of beating he accused police of beating him up without cause shortly thereafter and then said he was "kidnapped" and taken a few blocks down the street where the "harassment con-tinued."

Among the others who were asked to "testify" in im-promptu fashion were Jimmy "Bang Bang" Walker, editor-publisher of The Clarion Def-ender, and Alvin R. Batiste, former director of the Model Cities program.

Walker told the audience that he had also been mis-treated during the June events by police who he said told him they were arresting him for his "personal protection." Police later offered an apology to Walker, who claimed he also suffered bodily injury in

the fracas. Batiste, who was fired by Mayor Terry Schrunk earlier this month as Model Cities director, said he felt there was 'no question that there were repressive measures being taken." He said he was pleas-ed there was a "community effort" behind Ford.

# **Ballot Seeks** Police Split Ores. 1-15-70 A ballot title seeking a char-

ter amendment to establish two separate police departments in Portland was reluctantly approved Wednesday by the City Council.

The title, prepared by City Atty. Marian C. Rushing at the request of a group calling it-self the Portland Committee to Combat Fascism, reads:

"C h a r t e r amendment re-quires two separate police de-partments, one for area pre-dominantly black (including Albina), other for remainder of city; each administered by three paid commissioners, ap-pointed by paid elected neigh-borhood councils; police com-missioners fix policies, sala-ries city pays, discipline po-licemen; abolishes police civil service; requires policemen reside within employing de-partment." "Charter amendment repartment."

partment. Officers of the group filing the petition are listed as Kent Ford, c h a ir m a n; Thomas Mills, secretary; and O.M. Johnson, treasurer. Ford has identified himself as leader of the Black Barther party in the Black Panther party in Portland.

The petition will require 24,562 signatures by March 6 to be placed on the May 26 pri-mary election ballot.

In response to questions from city councilmen, Miss Rushing explained that the city does not pass upon the le-gality of the petition, but merely attempts to give it an upbigged and fair title unbiased and fair title.

A court test would be required to determine the legali-ty and constitutionality of the proposal, she said.

"I do not personally approve it," said Mayor Terry D. Schrunk, "and I question its constitutionality." He added that he respects the right of anyone to circulate a petition.

## Signs Point To Urban Wasteland As Troubled Area Loses Stores

It's only one block in the middle of a large city, but in a few days or a few weeks it may be an urban wasteland.

It's the 3900 block of NE Union Avenue between Failing and Shaver.

Since last Friday night more than \$4,000 worth of windows have been broken in the 10 or so businesses on the block, and Tuesday night Weimer's Furniture Store, 47 years in the same location, was gutted by fire. The fire-bomb that started the blaze destroyed at least \$250,000 worth of building and inventory, Lawrence (Bud) Weimer, second generation manager of the store, said Wednesday.

The accounts receivable were saved, "but that's worth only two bits on the dollar now," he said.

#### Help Offered

alston Officials said the loss was about \$200,000.

Weimer is bailing out; there is no possibility that he will reopen, he asserted.

"There's no assurance this won't happen again; they've told us once they don't want us. We don't have to be told a second time."

Bystanders watched Weimer shovel charred debris from his 50-x-100-foot building into the gutter, and neighborhood residents — blacks and whites — asked if there was anything they could do to help. SVAL.

Weimer thanked them and replied that all that is left to be done is clean up the mess, talk to his insurance company and see if the building can be restored to the point that it can be leased as a warehouse.

#### **Police** Praised

He praised the police:

"I mailed a letter of praise about the police to the mayor and the Police Department yesterday, before the fire. Up to last night police protection was very adequate; we felt they did all they could do, but the truce broke down . .

Down the street at Repp Bros. Groceries & Market, three generations of family management on Union Avenue, the man behind the counter said: "Get out if you're going to use my name; we're afraid to let you use our names."

This is a big grocery store with a walk-in cold room behind the butcher's department, not a mamma-pappa operation.

#### We're Afraid

The man behind the counter was silent until a Negro customer left and then:

"This truce is a big joke; 24 hours and see what happens? It's got to be met with force.

"If someone walks in here, picks something off the counter and walks out, we're afraid to stop him anymore. We don't want trouble; we don't want them ganging us."

Repp Bros. are selling out their inventory; the store will go out of business.

Across the street at 3933 NE. Union Ave., Robert Geist of Geist's Clothing stayed in his store until dawn Wednesday morning to protect his property. His store was not damaged.

"There are lots of decent, honest, wonderful people in this neighborhood, but then there are also the hoodlums. The truce didn't work last night, but the police are doing a wonderful job."

Pressed, Geist admitted: "We'll probably close as soon as feasible; if this keeps on we'll go, but we could change our mind."

Geist's Clothing has been in business 50-odd years; Bob Geist says he has lost the precise count.

At the corner of Union and Shaver, Salzmann Motors is barricaded like the Bastille. Werner Salzmann and his partner Franz Wirkner take a break from repairing Volkswagens. The garage is crowded with cars. The owners are uneasy about leaving vehicles in the adjacent parking area.

#### Shop Opened

Salzmann and Wirkner are immigrants from Germany. After working for a car dealer in Vancouver, Wash., for several years, they opened this shop of their own 10 years ago

They sell BMWs in the front of the 100x100-foot building and repair VWs in back.

"Since the trouble started, we haven't had any floor traf-fic out front," said Salzmann. "We can't sell cars if our windows are broken and boarded up.

Giving the police version of the shooting, Capt. William Taylor, North Precinct commander, who like Ford, was not present, said Williams had the .303 Enfield rifle in his hands when Harmon shot him.

Taylor said Harmon and Larsen were southbound in their patrol car on NE Union A v e n u e about 4:20 p.m. Wednesday. They had a 10year-old girl, accused of shoplifting, in custody.

#### Warrant Held

Taylor said the officers had a warrant for Williams' arrest, also on a shoplifting charge. Harmon, Taylor said, recognized Williams on the sidewalk in front of the Panther office, 3619 NE Union Ave.

The officers stopped, told Williams they had a warrant for his arrest and Williams refused to surrender, Taylor said.

Harmon returned to the patrol car to verify the warrant by radio. Williams went inside the Panther office, Taylor said.

Harmon called for help and two more policemen arrived. Police entered the storefront office, Taylor said, and Williams appeared on a balcony at the rear of the room. He had a rifle in his hands, Taylor said.

#### Surrender Urged

Police had holstered their pistols, Taylor said. He said they tried to convince Williams to drop the rifle and surrender. Other persons in the office also asked Williams to give up, Taylor said.

Taylor said Williams told

Harmon, "I'm going to kill you, Harmon," and fired a shot. The bullet hit the center of the ceiling.

Taylor said Harmon drew his pistol and fired once. Williams fell. No other shots were fired, according to Taylor.

Ford said he was not in the office during the incident. He said witnesses told him Williams was unarmed and had raised his hands to surrender "when Harmon jumped up on a desk and put two shots in him at point-blank range."

Ford said Williams "had a right to defend himself."

He said police had "beefed up patrols" in the neighbor-hood since Ford was acquitted last week of riot charges stemming from disturbances in Albina last June.

Ford said the Panthers had been "tipped off" that police planned to raid the party headquarters. Taylor termed the charge "a bunch of B.S. "We don't make a 'raid'

with a two-man patrol car with a 10-year-old child in the car," Taylor said.

Taylor said the child made a statement to the district attorney Wednesday night which substantiated the officers' account of the incident.

Ford said the shooting was

"a pattern of pig harassment to keep the Black Panthers from serving the community.

"This means no one in the black community is safe from the fascist, racist pigs," Ford said.

# Bail Pared For 2 Men

Bail was reduced in Multnomah County circuit court Thursday for two young men who face criminal charges in connection with disturbances earlier this month in Portland's Albina district.

Presiding Judge Dean Bryson cut in half the \$40,000 bail of Kent Ford. 26, of 23 NE San Rafael St., alleged head of the local Black Panther organization.

Ford had been held under bail of \$15,000 for riot, and \$25,000 for inciting to riot. Bryson reduced bail to \$10,000 on each charge.

Roscoe L. Anderson, 24, address unknown, had been held under \$25,000 bail on a seconddegree arson charge, and \$10,000 on a charge of conspiracy to commit a felony. Bryson reduced Anderson's bail to \$5,000 on the arson count, and \$7,000 on the conspiracy charge.

# Counselor selectors hold Black's petition

A committee considering the job application of a University student charged with a felony decided yesterday to await the outcome of the student's trial before taking action.

On Wednesday Tommy Anderson accused the University of considering him "guilty until proven innocent" by refusing to fulfill its promise of hiring him as a dorm counselor.

Anderson is charged with assaulting a Eugene police officer with a deadly weapon on March 19. He will enter a plea this morning in Lane County Circuit Court.

The Dorm Counselors Committee met for two hours yesterday before co - chairman Don Du-Shane, dean of students, released their only statement: "The committee met this morning and decided to hold further action in abeyance until the settlement of the case downtown."

Thursday Anderson told the

Emerald, "delaying the decision is just a proper way of saying, 'No, you're not getting the job.'"

"There is no policy," Anderson said, "which says the committee should be able to reject me from a job because of my affiliation with the Black Panther party."

Anderson said the committee was using the assault charge as "a cover-up to keep socalled 'militant Blacks' from having contact with Whites."

Bob Shepard, counselør supervisor, was present at the meeting but is not a member. Anderson claimed Shepard had "great influence" on the committee when he told it Anderson should not get the job "because he is a member of the Black Panther Party."

# Police Hold

Kent Ford, self-described captain of the Black Panther party in Portland, appeared at Portland police headquarters Wednesday night to post bail for a man he thought was arrested.

The man, Nate Proby, director of the 7 of Diamonds Teen Club in the Albina district, had not been arrested.

But Ford was. Officers handed Ford copies of Multnomah County grand jury indictments charging him with inciting to riot and felonious assault, with total bail set at \$25,000 and \$15,000.

The charges were in connection with a disturbance at a Northeast Portland drive-in restaurant early Saturday in which a police officer was injured as he and other officers were attempting to arrest a youth on curfew violation.

Police had earlier charged Ford with inciting to riot in connection with the incident, which was followed by disturbances on three successive nights.

Proby had come to police headquarters to discuss the arrest of Roscoe L. Anderson, 23, on an indictment charging him with conspiracy to commit a felony in connection with a fire May 25 at Jantzen Knitting Mills Inc.

# Trio Jailed <sup>sp</sup> For Attack

Three Portland men are being held in Rockey Butte Jail under \$25,000 bail in connection with an attack June 14 on a Portland police officer.

They are Curtis Lee Harris, 18; Ralph Allen Stevenson, 20; and Kent Ford, 26, of 23 NE San Rafael St., alleged head of the local Black Panther organization.

All are charged with attempting to incite a riot, with bail set at \$15,000; and with a g g r a v a t e d assault, bail \$10,000.

The charges involve an attack on police officer Richard E. Sothern, 23, who was kicked in the chest during an altercation at Lidio's Drive-In. Sothern suffered a cracked rib and torn rib cartilage.

# Dental Clinic Opens Doors

Dentists are now joining physicians in providing a better health program for residents of the Albina community.

About 20 dentists and dental students have volunteered to provide free dental care at the <u>Malcolm X Memorial People's</u> <u>Clinic, Vopening March 16 at</u> 2341 N. Williams Ave., according to Sandra Britt, spokesman for the Neighborhood Committee to Combat Fascism (Black Panther Party) and Health-RAP (Research Action Project). The clinic will be open Mon-

The clinic will be open Monday through Wednesday from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. and Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to noon. First priority will be given to emergency cases, second priority to children and third priority to routine dental care for adults.

Equipment for the clinic has been donated. The clinic is located a short distance from the Fred Hampton Memorial People's Clinic, 109 N. Russell Ave., where doctors and nurses provide free medical care Monday through Friday from 7 to 10 p.m.

According to Miss Britt, about 14 patients are being seen every night at the Fred Hampton Clinic. Response from doctors to do the volunteer work has been "excellent," Miss Britt said.

Black Panthers. To most white Portlanders the name means menacing warlord figures, militant slogans, shootouts and subversive politics.

But to another group of Portland residents, the name means children with full stomach's, free dental care, or help to cure venereal disease.

For almost two years, the Panthers have been winning widespread approval in the Albina community with a group of programs designed, according to the Panthers, to "serve the people, body and soul."

The free breakfast program for school children, free dental clinic and free health clinic will soon enter a third year of operation, despite constant f i n a nc i a l shortages, early inexperience and one hard fight at City Hall for a permit to solicit donations.

"The purpose of our programs is simple," said Black Panther Kent Ford. "To help our people Survive."

our people survive." "Our people" does not mean just Panthers — there are fewer than a dozen active members of the group in Portland — but any black and anyone else in need.

From 60 to 100 youngsters gather each morning in Highland United Church of Christ, a few blocks from King School, for a hot breakfast of eggs or French toast, pancakes, ham or sausage, juice and milk.

The breakfasts are more orderly than meals in most school cafeterias. Even a soft drink machine in the church annex is taped up each morning so the children won't spend their lunch money.

### 'Not all poor'

"Most of these kids wouldn't be getting breakfast at home," said Ford. "Not all of them are poor, but most come from homes where the mother doesn't have time to get up and cook in the mornings."

In the children could eat at school, but according to King School Principal <u>Bill D.</u> White, "The Panthers serve a much better breakfast than we do." "When the government

"When the government steps forward and gives our people a balanced diet," said Ford, "we'll be glad to stop."

Ford is aware of the outside suspicion that the Panthers are "indoctrinating" children. A year ago, teachers at King complained that the breakfast program was making the children more hostile in the classrooms, but since then the complaints have died out.

"Indoctrination?" s a i d Ford. Let's put it this way. In China when the kids sit down to breakfast they are told to ask God for food. No food. Then the kids are told to ask Mao for breakfast, and there it is. The only thing we're teaching here is by example, that socialism can work."

Ford said the children are sometimes told about Panther heroes, like George Jackson, for whom the meal program is named, or they may get a lesson in the perills of drug abuse. But there is no preaching.

Food for the free breakfasts is donated mostly by local businessmen. Critics have accused the Panthers of intimidating businesses into contributing, especially after a Panther boycott

helped convince McDonalds Hamburgers to contribute 50 pounds of meat each week.

"It is our belief," said Ford, "that the businessmen who take from our community should leave a little something in return. Of course, our image can't hurt us. Some of them see us coming and just hand over the food."

Observers are welcome to visit, without warning, the breakfast program and the impression left by such a visit is drastically different from that held by whites who have never met a Black Panther.

There is a similar openness at the Fred Hampton Peoples Free Health Clinic and the Malcolm X Peoples Free Dental Clinic, both in the core of Albina.

About 20 to 25 patients white and black, young and old — visit the health clinic each Monday, Wednesday and Friday night with complaints ranging from severe colds to venereal disease. Work starts when the doctor arrives, usually about 7 p.m., and ends when the patients have all been seen, about 10 p.m.

### Transportation provided

The dental clinic, which is open Monday through Wednesday, serves six to nine patients a day in addition to a monthly four-session program of preventive hygiene.

The volunteer support staff for the two clinics includes about 30 doctors, six dentists, and numerous nurses, dental students and technicians. Free rides are available to patients who live beyond walking distance. When Rose City Cab was in business, the company delivered clinic patients free, but now the Panthers provide transportation themselves.

Doctors and patients interviewed said the only politics apparent in the clinics is the posters on the wall and the Panther literature in the waiting room.

"I'm not even too sure what the Panthers' politics are," said a white, out-ofwork production planner on his second visit to the Hampton Clinic. "But at the county hospital they told me it would be 30 days before I could get somebody to look at my back. Here, I don't have to wait."

### Clinic always busy

Dr. Gerald Morrell, director of the dental clinic, said the facility started with 24 d e n t i s t s: "Some moved, some were scared off by the political aspects of the Black Panthers and some were just all talk and no action — I guess they thought this was going to be glamorous.

"It isn't glamorous, but it is needed. I've been working here one or two nights a month for almost two years, and I've never seen a night when there wasn't a crowded waiting room."

Most dentists who donate time use two operating chairs at once, treating one patient while a technician is taking X - rays or administering anesthetic in an adjacent room.

Morrell, who was on the board of the Multnomah County Dental Society when the clinic opened, said the society has ignored the center's existence.

"When the clinic started, it was the first in the area. For years, public health groups had been crying for it and doing nothing," he said. "But since the Panthers opened their clinic, other established groups have gone into the business, so it is easy for the dental society to pretend the Panthers don't exist." olexity programs ficier eople. government Americ eople. Does all of this represent an about-face in the Black Panther image?

"No," said Ford. "We're still basically a vanguard party with a Marxist-Leninist philosophy. If we have to, we can be just as vicious as ever. We're here to serve the people and if you mess with our programs, prepare w meet your maker."

Albina residents say the Panthers have always had a better image in the black community than in the national headlines.

"The Panthers express something that many of the people here feel," said King Principal White. "They may express it more strongly. But if you took a vote on the street the Panthers would get a good majority of support, mostly because of programs like the free breakfast and the clinics."

One leader of a federally funded antipoverty program said: "I have some m' vings about the Panthers I think they are doing one helluva job. It makes you wonder, if they can do so much with volunteer help. what happened to all those agencies living on federal money?

"Most people in the black community are, frankly, more familiar with the Black Panthers than they are with established programs. And while whites tend to think of the bad things the Panthers have done, the blacks may think of the first time their youngsters had breakfast, or the first time they were able to get a tooth pulled without feeling like they were the scum of the earth."

McNamara said that if trebling police forces in the troubled area is inadequate to maintain the peace, "we will impose a curfew - and call in the sheriff's office and state police. If those forces are in a d e q u a t e, the National Guard will be called," he stressed.

Black Panther Kent Ford won a lawsuit against the city of Portland on August 27. It is the first time a Panther has won a suit against the pigs, in spite of the amount of violence that all levels of government have inflicted on the Black Panther Party.

APTAIN.

Federal District Court Judge Goodwin found that Kent Ford was beaten by the Portland pigs while handcuffed and in their custody for "inciting to riot," a charge he was later acquitted of.

The court said that "Mr. Ford was handcuffed at the time he was dragged out of the car. If he was handcuffed as I find that he was, it is incredible that he would be seriously thought to be swallowing anything that would be either harmful to him or to the community," and that the pigs' use of force was unjustified. The court also said, "The people of the community cannot be expected to have confidence in the Government until the Government's officers act fairly and according to law toward all members of the community." 19

Kent was awarded a total of \$6,000 in damages, \$1,000 for "indignity that he suffered at the hands of the police," and \$5,000 punitive damages "because it is time that the community realizes that the police are not authorized to inflict punishment at their own discretion..."

Kent Ford, Captain of the Portland branch of the Black Panther Party has won \$6,000 in damages from two policemen who maced and kicked him after his arrest on a trumped-up charge in June, 1969. He was later acquitted on the riot charge by an all-white jury. \$1,000 of the damages were general compensation, \$5,000 were punitive. The two policemen were Ronald Hegge and Larry Brown.

Early last Saturday morning a bomb exploded at the Union Ave. McDonald's. causing \$1,000 damage; the store is still closed. The Panther Party had been picketing the store for two weeks demanding that the store be responsive to community needs, and demanding an end to McDonald's unequal hiring practices and to the discrimination of the present compnay in granting franchises. The picketing had been 80-90% effective, with virtually all blacks and many whites refusing to cross the line. Mc-Donald's was losing money, staying open simply for appearances. Even an attempt at an injunction had failed to Ack Ponther

halt the boycott.

The Panther Party strongly attacked the bombing as a pig effort to get the Party. Sure enough, the impression left from a meeting of Deputy D.A. Des Connell (notorious for his PSU McDonald's lawyers and Panther lawvers was that the D.A.'s office is going to try to get Kent and others on conspiracy and related charges.

The possible charges could have similarities to the Panther 21 indictments on conspiracy charges in New York. There, charges which changed almost weekly were used to jail the entire leadership of the Party in New York.

"Ransom" was set at astronomical figures, the defendants were prohibited from meeting together to plan a common defense, and were denied rights such as medical care.

One of the things that makes bombing charges against the Panthers absurd is Grand Jury performance), Judge Jones, that the Party nationally has consistently denounced bombings as provocateur actions and has relied on its support within the community to press its demands.

## Panther Leader Tells of Group Goals

### By Bill Hedlund

The following is an edited and much shortened transcription from a tape recorded interview with Kent Ford, chairman of the Portland chapter of the Black Panther Party.

The Bridge: What position do the Panthers take in regard to black studies in the universities?

Ford: Black studies? It is a bourgeois cop out, its just what you said, black "studies." It doesn't integrate you into the world at all. You can know all the facts and all the history about the people but that still does not do you any good because you still don't have your freedom.

The Bridge: What lines of education do you feel are more relevent?

Ford: Education along the Marxism-Lenninism line of socialism. In other words, teach people to be individuals, to live together, work together to build for the betterment of humanity; not the advancement of some corporation.

The Bridge: Is a coalition between students and the black community desirable to you?

Ford: Of course not. The students from the black community go to the white middle class universities, bourgeois universities, to get integrated with the system. We look at them as foreign exchange students. They go there and learn skills, then go back into the white community to work for corporations and never come back to serve their own community

munity. The Bridge: How about a coalition with students in general?

Ford: I would agree to a coalition between students to a coalition between students and the Black Panther Party. If they really want to come into the community and do something meaningful, learn how to get down and work with the people, come to us and we'll show them. You see the thing is they go down there and theorize about what's going on in the black community.

This is what black studies teaches them; when in reality they come from bourgeois families in the first place and go to school to stay in the bourgeois class.

The Bridge: Do you anticipate any involvement on the part of the Panthers at either the convention in San Diego or Miami?

Ford: Not at this time. In the first place the Republican and Democratic parties are just a matter of the most racist and least racist, and that's what your voting for.

The Bridge: What is the single most important problem facing the Black Panther Party?

Ford: Well the single most important problem facing us is in reality the problem facing black people. The problem of sicle cell anemia. How to treat this disease. We have the problem of income; jobs, unemployment. Political problems. You see you cannot really isolate these things. You cannot deal with them separately. Another thing is the poverty program. The people don't really get a chance to run these programs. These are problems facing the grass roots people too. You see these poverty programs, all they do is create jobs for good-will Negroes, and that's all they do. And Nixon knows this! The people he puts in charge of these programs, all they do is hire their friends. It's the black bourgeois that administer these programs, not those who are closest to the problems.

The Bridge: What problems do you encounter recruiting members into the Panthers, from the black community?

Ford: That segment of the black community turned off by the Panthers are really those who want to integrate into the white community. The ruling class is never really going to let them integrate at all, they are going to use them against us. In reality we are not a mass membership organization. We are a small elite group. We don't go around looking for members, or go around handing out membership cards.

The Bridge: What do you feel whites can do to genuinely help the social-economic situation in the black community?

Ford: Until capitalism is ended, white people cannot really do very much for us. That is the white ruling class. The Bridge: What are your feelings regarding the hostilities shown Penny Jackson when she spoke at the Sylvania campus? Ford: Well that's a long story, but I figure this way; Penny was invited out there she didn't ask to come. She was a guestspeaker and those dudes should not have tried to change her while she was speaking. She is a sister who has lost two brothers to the

revolution, I think she is entitled to respect for that aside from being invited there in the first place.

The Bridge: There was a much different reception for her at the Cascade campus. Do you feel PCC is a segregated school?

Ford: Of course. In the first place do you see where they built that college? What they did in our community was convert an old gymnasium for us to go to school in. Why I know dudes who run out of gas trying to get to that Sylvania campus. A black man is nothing but a

Continued From Page 2 foreign exchange student anyway, trying to come out with white middle class values, that's all.

The Bridge: What are some specific proposals the Panthers have to improve relations between the black and white communities here in Portland.

Ford: I would like to see the people downtown stop trying to make a political thing out of everyting. I'd like to see them really come down to the community level, let those people that are really in tune with the needs of the people run the poverty programs so that they are meaningful for the people they should be serving. So we won't have winoes walking the streets and brothers going to jail because they ripped something off just in order to live because they could not get a job. That Metropolitan Steering Committee, I'd like to see closed down. I'd like to see everybody over their fired, and kicked out. They've turned into what you would call a clan, into a "godfather" type thing. Everybody's looking out for PSMSCs own intrests, that's all it is, it's just like on big syndicate over there. Same way with model cities, you have the major and his Negroes getting together, I'd like to see this investigated. I'd like to see this money put into the community. I would like to see the police disarm themselves in the black community. We should have our own precinct. I am not saying we should run it but it should be in our own area. I'd like to see better judges downtown, judges that really understand the black community and

our socio-economic problems; judges that stick a black person with the same sentence they would a white person instead of twice the amount of time. Where were the people from police community relations when Cheryl James was taken in? At nearly any given time you can go to the pool hall and see two or three of them in there shooting pool.

We'd like to have adequate medical facilities, aligned with the needs of the people. Ones \* that treat you like...human beings. We'd like a hospital over here that would treat you because you were sick, not because you could pay for it.

The Bridge: The Panthers sponsor a free medical and free dental clinic in addition to a free breakfast progam. Have you received any hassles from the city over these programs?

Ford: Yes, they tried to close us down, on the matter of collecting donations. The first time we applied for a permit they sent back word that I was untrustworthy and not of good character, so they denied the permit. We took it to court and finally got the permit. You see, they thought we wanted these donations to buy guns and ammunition to wage war. In reality all we want are facilities that serve poor people, black and white facilities as adequate as those the white ruling class has made for themselves. When they start closing down our clinics, that's when we make our move.

The Bridge: What is your average in donations per month?

Ford: Just enough to pay the utilities. Some times the lights get turned off. Man, we're just trying to survive, that's all.

### **Panther Party Works For People**

by Martin Crommie

When the Black Panther Party was founded, it was called the B.P.P. for self-defense.

Today the B.P.P. has dropped 'defense' because they no longer feel defense is the way. They feel that, like other radical groups, they should work for revolution instead of defense.

Because of events that have happened since then, like the murders of Fred Hampton, Mark Clark, Bobby Hutton, etc. The Black Panther Party is surely the vanguard of the Black revolutionary movement.

The B.P.P. platform and program article 1 states that "We want freedom. We want power to determine the destiny of our black people.

Many of you know that Kent Ford, Panther leader in Portland, was brought to trial about three weeks ago on the charge of inciting to riot, and you may also know that the jury was all-white, all fairly well off financially.

### Kent Ford

Friday, Feb. 3, Kent Ford was found innocent, probably the only Panther found innocent of any charge. The day after the verdict was returned, a rally was held in downtown Portland in the South Park Blocks about community control of the police.

This is not what the Oregonian and the Oregon Journal printed.

The Oregonian stated that the people at the rally were from Portland State University. Most of the people at the rally were from Portland high schools.

Now, the Panthers are passing around petitions to try to get the issue of community control of the police on the May election ballot.

Kent Ford admitted that it was unlikely that the city would permit that. He was also skeptical about getting the necessary 26,000 signatures. The Panther stated that community control of the police means that the police have to live in the community they serve.

### Alfred Williams

A few days after the rally, a Panther, under the name of Alfred Williams, was stopped in front of Panther headquarters. The police had gone by five or six times.

The police then chased him; Alfred ran into the Panther office for advice. He ran up to the balcony in the office and grabbed a gun; the police entered, and he shot into the air.

The hole in the ceiling of the Panther office proves this. The police and the people that had gathered had convinced Alfred to put down the gun. One policeman jumped up on a table and fired two shots at point blank range, once in the abdomen and once in the lower right arm.

### 'Got a Panther

Alfred, the Panther, fell down, and the police came up and clamped handcuffs on Alfred. They pulled him into the street, while yelling, "I've got a Panther. I've got a Panther."

At the outrage, people stoned the police, breaking windows, trying to free Alfred. A 10-year-old girl in the back of the police car, arrested for petty larceny, witnessed the police raiding.

### Serve People

The Black Panther Party in Portland is established to serve the people. Examples of their services include the Free Breakfast program, Free Health Clinic and a Free Clothing Store.

### For open testimony

To the Editor: The current controversy regarding granting of a solicitations permit to the People's Clinic raises some fundamental social and legal questions. My understanding is that the negative recommendation for permit granting by the solicitations committee was based on police testimony concerning alleged shakedowns of merchants for funds to support the clinic. The testimony was unsupported by witnesses or evidence.

There is little question that the clinic performs a valuable service in the Albina area, as indicated by testimony at the recent City Council hearing. The only basis for refusal, therefore, is the police recommendation.

The application for the permit represents an attempt by an alienated group to work within the system — as stated by Kent Ford — "we didn't have to

come down here." The Council is bound, in view of the gravity of this decision, to require open public testimony by the police, with the presentation of facts and evidence, not opinion only. If the refusal is based only on opinion, the City Council is in effect denying equal access to a fair and just hearing substantiating the claim of the alienated — of a "disinterested, establishment-oriented power structure."

This can only result in further, if not total alienation.
