- West Hayden Island is one of Portland's most important natural areas
- 826 acres of *bottomland hardwood forest, wetlands, meadows, floodplains & shallow water habitat* near the confluence of the Willamette & Columbia rivers
- Irreplaceable habitat for federally listed salmon & imperiled bird, bat & amphibian species
- An amazing place where you can see nesting *bald eagles* & rapidly disappearing species like the *pileated woodpecker* & *western meadowlark*

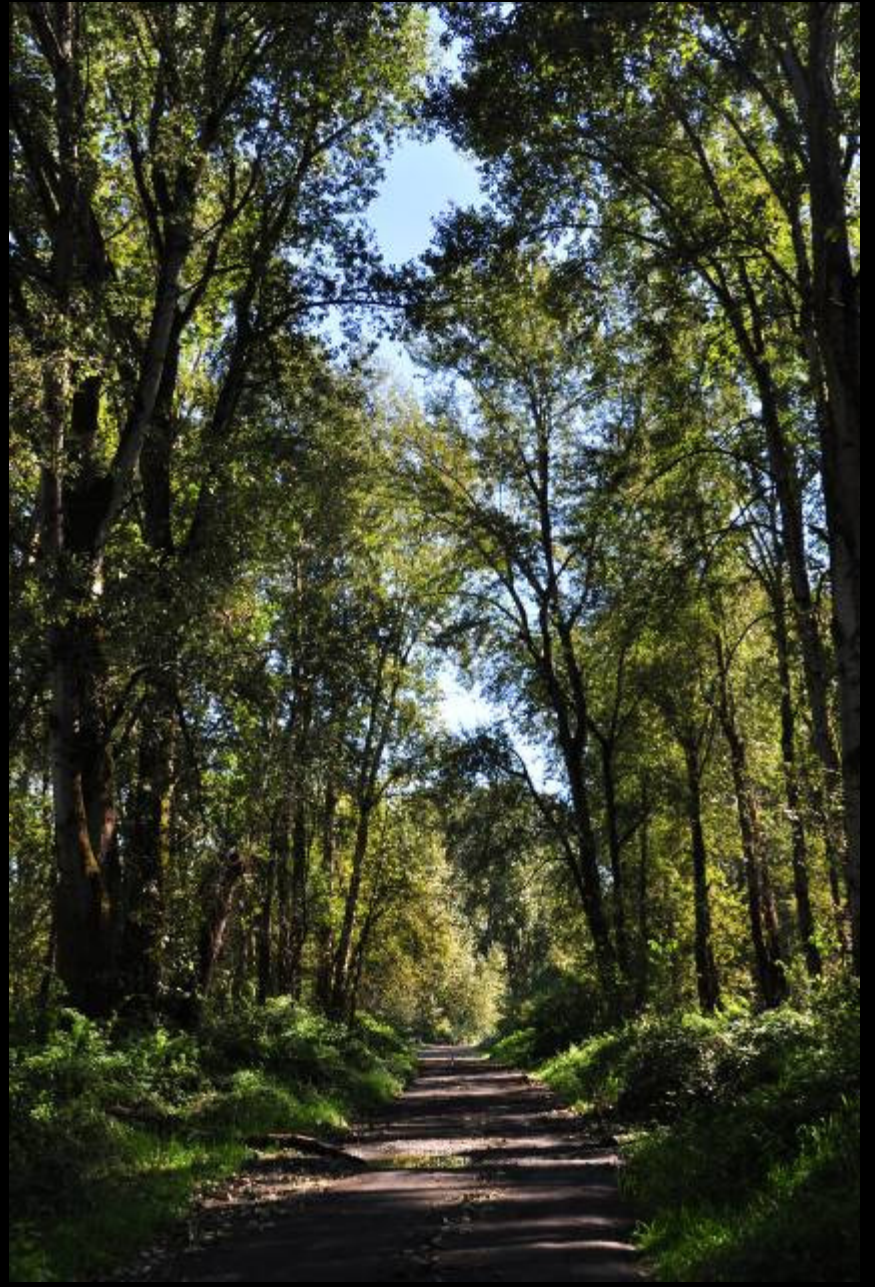

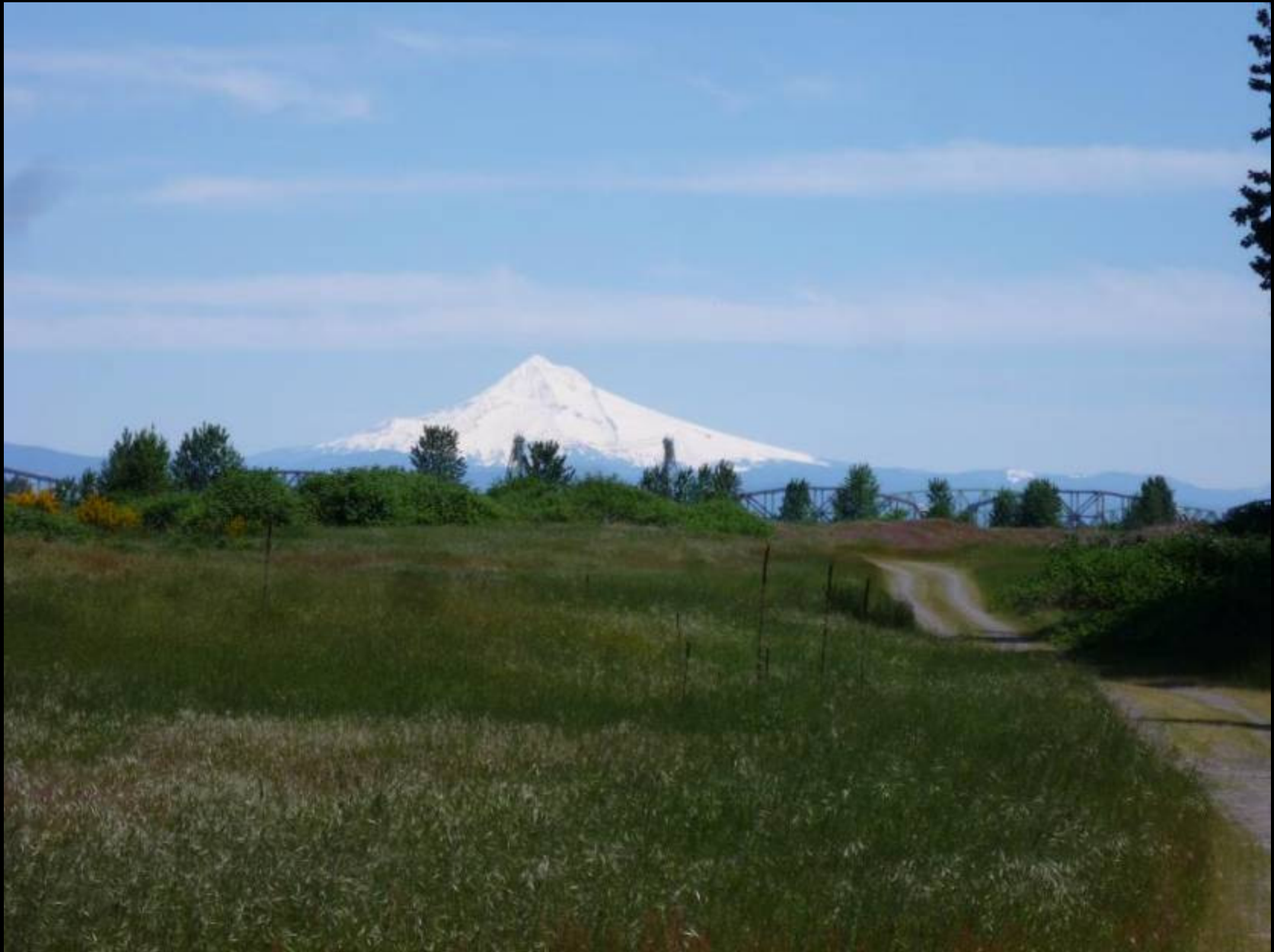

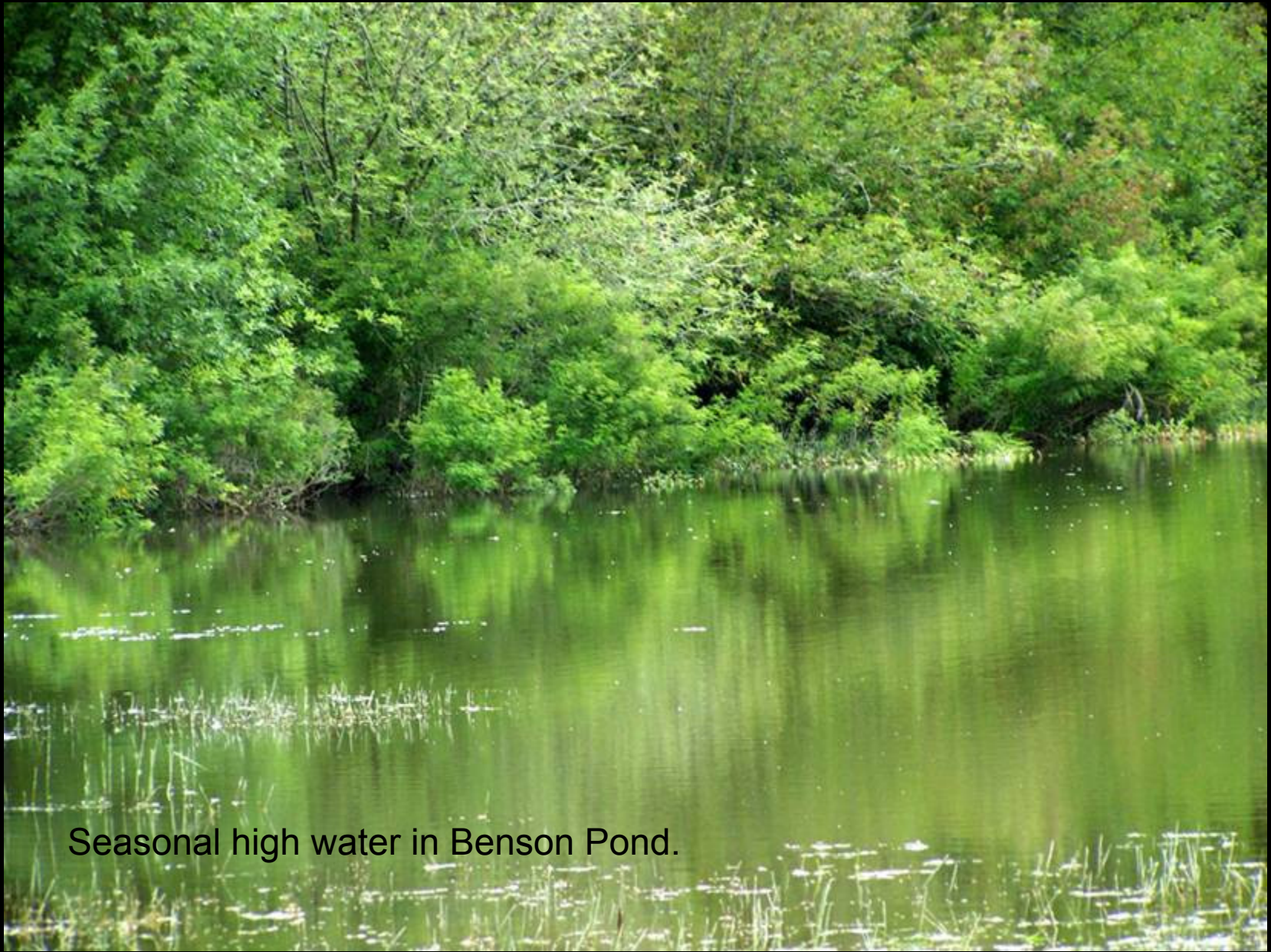

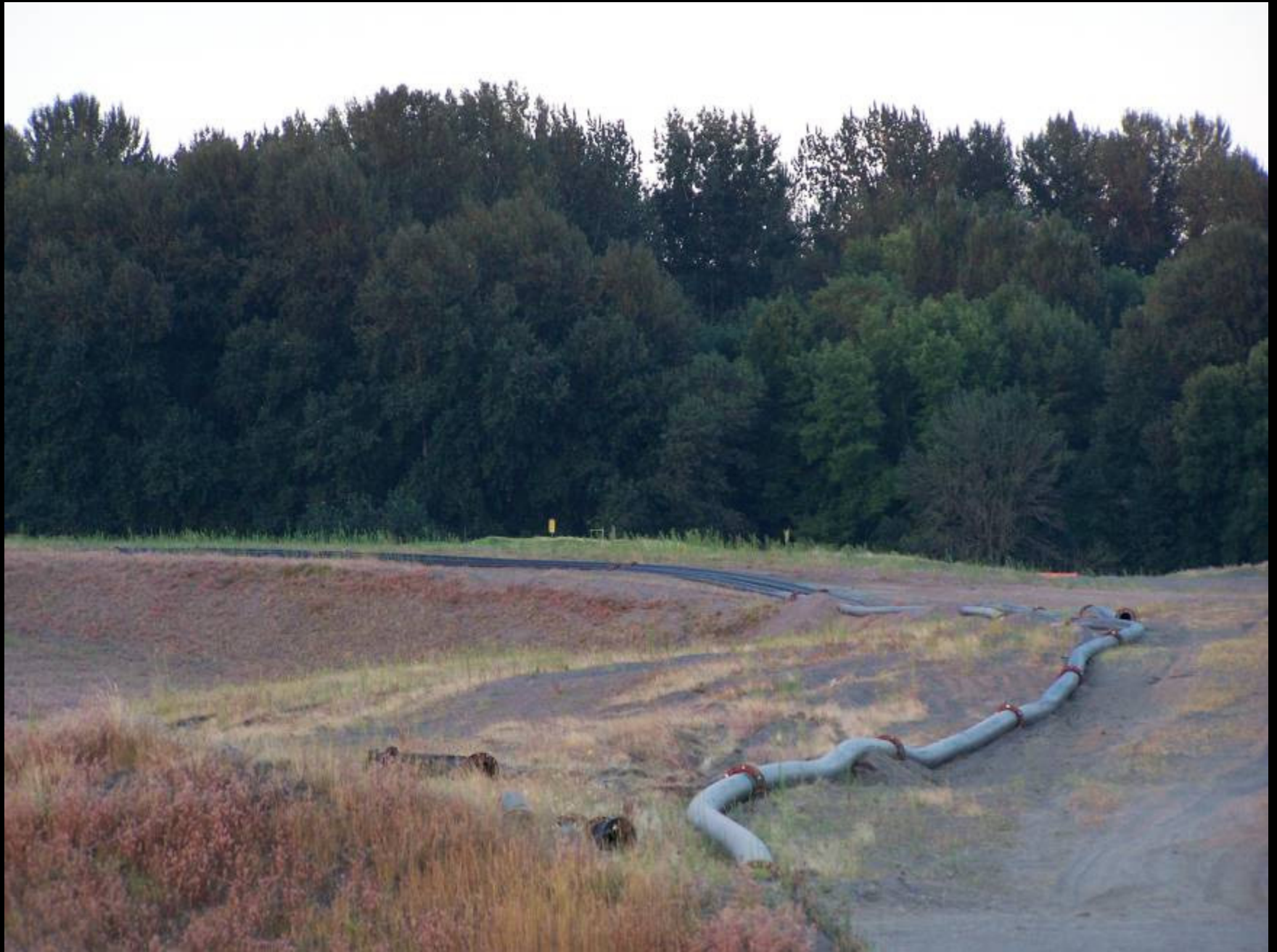

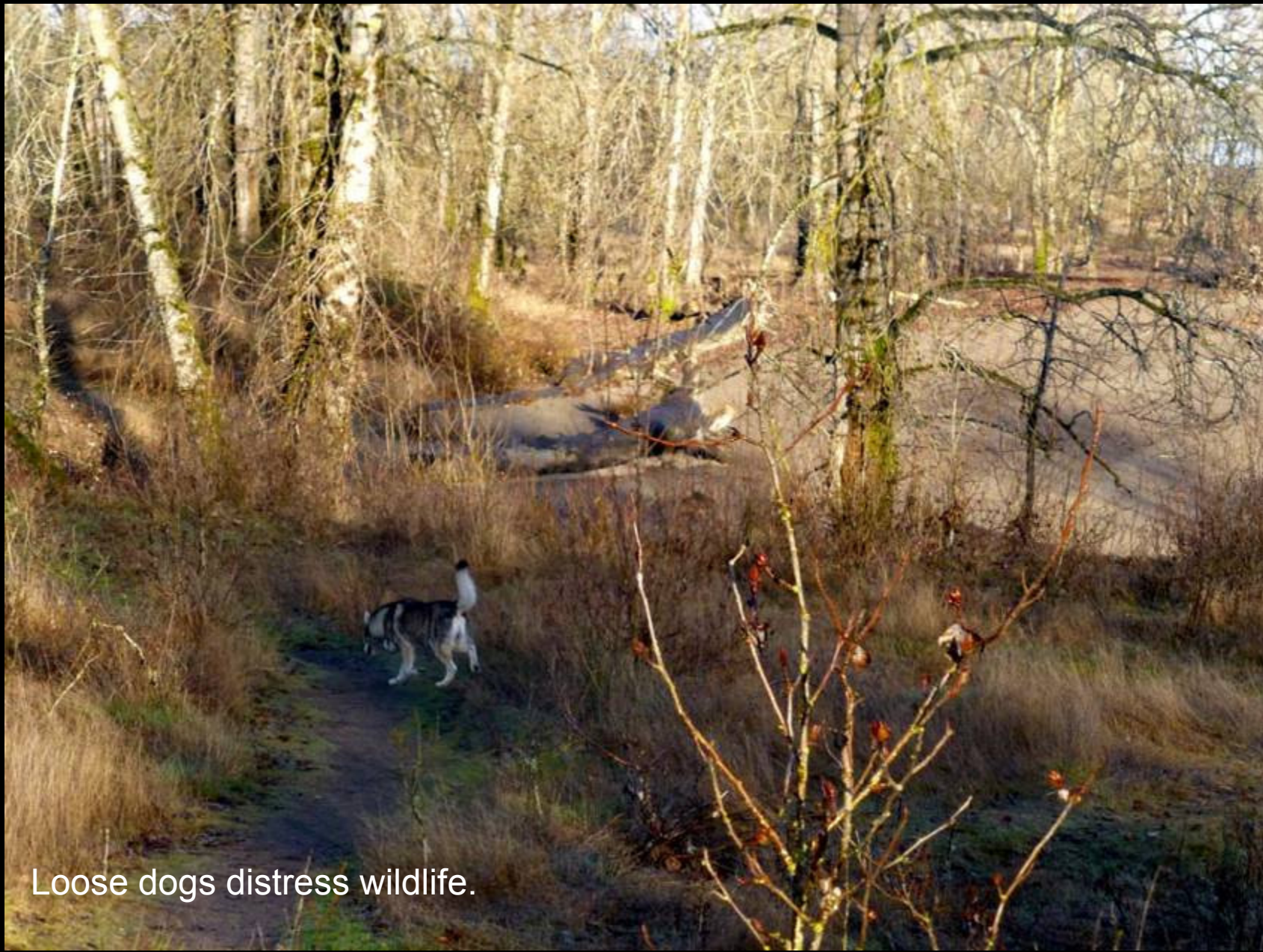
