1) Legislation Title:

Create a fee schedule for tree review, tree inspections, tree permits, and tree related enforcement (Ordinance)

2) Purpose of the Proposed Legislation:

This Ordinance will allow Portland Parks & Recreation Urban Forestry to charge and collect fees required for implementing a new Title 11, Trees. Title 11, Trees (Ord. No. 184522) was adopted by the City Council on April 13, 2011 and will go into effect on January 1, 2015. The Tree Code replaces the two existing tree ordinances Tree Cutting (No 170775), and Street Tree and Other Public Tree Regulations (No 159490). Existing fees charged under these ordinances are included with the new Title 11, Trees fee schedule.

Re: Parks & Recreation Urban Forestry Title 11, Trees Fee Schedule & Housekeeping Code Amendments

Portland Parks & Recreation Urban Forestry has prepared an ordinance proposing fees under the new Title 11, Trees, and a second conforming amendment ordinance that updates certain Titles to be consistent with Title 11. As to the second, conforming amendment ordinance, there are no substantive or procedural changes proposed rather, they are housekeeping changes that are necessary to establish conformance between Title 11 and Title 17 of City Code. Both ordinances are scheduled to be heard by City Council on Wednesday, November 19, 2014 at 10:15, Time Certain.

Background

On April 11, 2011, the City Council adopted a new Title 11, Trees, as part of the Citywide Tree Policy and Regulatory Improvement Project (Citywide Tree Project). Title 11 creates new permit review categories for trees in both development and non-development situations. The proposed fee ordinance will allow Urban Forestry to collect permit fees for the non-development section of Title 11 and to collect tree mitigation fees for development permits. The Bureau of Development Services (BDS) will evaluate any necessary permit fee increases associated with the development section of the Tree Code. Any development related fee proposals will be included with the BDS fee schedules as part of their regular process.

Urban Forestry collects fees to partially support tree inspections, development plan review for street tree requirements, customer assistance, and other functions. Most bureau programs receive General Fund support while a few programs are self-supporting. The proposed fee ordinance does not propose a significant shift to this funding structure. Title 11 implementation requires the addition of some new fees to account for/address new permit and mitigation requirements for street and private trees. The majority of the proposed fee schedule however, contains existing application review fees.

Urban Forestry maintains a strong commitment to provide excellent care and oversight of Portland's Urban Canopy. This commitment coupled with the improved regulatory framework of the Citywide Tree Project under Title 11 will help ensure the preservation and continued expansion of Portland's green infrastructure. The proposed fee schedule will help achieve the Citywide Tree Project's goal of providing transparency. Currently some existing fees are billed through the Bureau of Development Services and the Portland Bureau of Transportation. Putting all of the tree review fees into one schedule allows an open review process for new and future fee increases. The fee schedule will be available on the Parks website as well as the new tree website upon adoption.

Fee Schedule Overview

Urban Forestry is not proposing any fee increases to existing fees. The proposed fee schedule captures existing Urban Forestry fees, three new Title 11 fees described below, and enforcement fees and penalties described in Title 11.

- 1. **Existing Fees:** These fees apply to development projects, tree removal applications, and tree mitigation. <u>No increase in fees is proposed to existing fees</u>. The only change is a reduction in the tree removal fee from \$35 to \$25 to incentivize applications for removal to occur.
- 2. New Fees: There are three new fees that will take effect on January 1, 2015.
 - a. <u>Tree Preservation Fee</u>. This fee may be paid in lieu of complying with tree preservation requirements.
 - b. **Planting Fee.** This fee may be paid in lieu of meeting tree planting requirements.
 - c. **<u>Programmatic Permit Fee</u>**. Utilities and public agencies that have on-going needs for tree maintenance, pruning, and removal may apply for a Programmatic Permit. This permit replaces the need to apply for a permit for each individual tree-related action.

Certain fees such as inspection fees for the regulation of City and private property trees (shown with asterisk on the fee schedule) will not go into effect until July 1, 2015, because Council has provided funding to cover these costs so that staff may work with and educate applicants during the first six months of the program.

3. **Enforcement** fees as prescribed in Title 11 (11.70): These fees implement Chapter 11.70. Staff will emphasize education rather than enforcement during the first phase of implementation. Urban Forestry will continue to issue fines and penalties consistent with their existing policies. The proposed enforcement fees will enable Urban Forestry to penalize egregious Title 11 code infractions.

Public Involvement.

Since Tree Code adoption in 2011, the Bureau of Development Services and the Portland Parks & Recreation Urban Forestry program have been actively engaged in public outreach. A new Tree website was launched on October 31, 2014 which can be viewed at <u>www.portlandonline.com/trees</u>. Training on the new tree code regulations is well underway and will continue throughout the first phase of implementation. The fee schedule will be available on the new tree website.

The proposed fees have been reviewed by the Development Review Advisory Committee (DRAC) in the Bureau of Development Services, and by the Urban Forestry Commission in Portland Parks & Recreation. The Tree Code Community Oversight Committee will review fees over the first six months of implementation, and amendments may be proposed as part of the 2015-16 City Budget process or by ordinance later in 2015.
