While I consider it a bad precedent to loosen the regulations for the Environmental Conservation overlay zone to facilitate a single project, my primary objection regards the amount of greenhouse gases (GHGs) this project would cause to be released into the atmosphere and its concomitant contribution to climate change.

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> "Portland has been recognized nationally and internationally for our work to control greenhouse gas emissions. Approval of the proposed Zoning Code amendment to make way for a propane export terminal would be a giant step backward. It would negate the important work that our citizens and our government have done to reduce our contribution to climate change.
