Background

- The Trust for Public Land (TPL)
 facilitated a land-use application
 for rezoning the Colwood
 natural area property.
- In October 2013, City Council approved the rezoning of the northern portion to commercial/industrial.
- In March 2014, City Council approved PP&R's and BES' acquisition of the remaining 85 acres of the Colwood property.



Background

- Public ownership of the Colwood property ensures that it will remain as open space permanently, offering a green oasis in the midst of intense industrial development.
- More than one-third of the property will be restored or enhanced and managed as natural area
 including permanent protection of habitat and water quality along the Columbia Slough.
- The property will offer a unique future opportunity for access to nature for Portland's residents.



EMSWCD Priorities



- Permanently protect critical natural lands for habitat, water quality, climate, and biodiversity values.
- Permanently protect lands to increase public access to nature and open space in areas lacking such access, particularly in underserved communities.






EMSWCD Priorities



 Institute innovative community based models for the planning, design and implementation of Colwood Park.

 Prioritize neighborhood job creation and neighborhood economic development of Colwood Park.



EMSWCD Grant



- EMSWCD has awarded the City
 \$1 million through its Land Legacy
 Program.
- EMSWCD's contribution will reimburse the City for funds used to acquire the Colwood property.
- The total cost of the Colwood property acquisition = \$5 million.



Terms of Agreement

- The City will uphold commitment to protect the natural areas.
- EMSWCD will have the Right of First Refusal if the City considers conveying the natural area to another entity or entities.
- EMSWCD will have the right to participate as a direct project collaborator in any future planning of property.
- The City will publically recognize EMSWCD's contribution.
