White Bikes

We had just gotten back from a super job at Katmai National Monument Books Camp and I had a pocket full of money. Since one of my biggies was clean air I decided to put up prize money and promote a contest in which the best ideas for cleaning up the air win \$100 and most humorous \$25.

Stan Jones at the Fanning Daily News liked the idea and they ran a free form to fill out and send in. Bob Atwood said nothing would ever come of it so he wouldn't run anything.

I lined up a review panel of three Assembly members: David Rose, Tony Knowles, and Lydia Selkreg, and Leo Kay from the Lung Association.

One day I was telling a friend, Paul Vdal, about the contest, and an idea I had for winning. He wrote it up and sent it in.

Lydia very generously offered her place to meet. I came with all the entries from the Daily News. Everyone showed but Tony. He had to do payroll taxes.

We split the pile in ¼ and went through the entries. David Rose read Paul's entry and said to Lydia "Hey this sounds like fun. We ought to do this one." Lydia read it and enthusiastically agreed. Well Paul's didn't win but the most humorous one was to make all the streets in Anchorage one-way. The N/S streets would be one-way south and the E/W would be one-way West. Then all the cars would run in the inlet and there would be no more air pollution. When I called to congratulate him he said, "Humor! That was a serious entry." He cashed the check.

Well I waited about a year and went back to David and said want to do this? He said yes but both he and Lydia were busy but Tony could help me.

Well we got it past the Assembly by declaring an emergency, past iron jaw Mayor George Sullivan through purchasing over the Police Department by the City Manager to the bid process, wow, wow, wow, what a lot of work.

Finally we win the bid for \$3,293 to convert 60 abandoned bicycles to one-speeds painted white with a bar welded on, make 4 bike racks and turn these bicycles loose downtown and let people ride them where they may, hoping they would stay downtown.

We probably had 15 to 25 different people working on the bikes. Then came the day of the big release. About 30 people showed up. What fun. We

rode en mass to the racks downtown. The front page of the Daily News. We are taking up the whole street. What a high. Everyone is having so much fun. Whooo.

Two days later all the bikes are gone. Media heyday. Talk of the town. All the bureaucrats duck and cover. They never want to hear from me again. They don't understand I want to make it work. They don't care, just go away.

We still have about 20 1-speeds we haven't turned loose yet. We get this wild idea: Why not check them out like a library book? Piece of ID and a \$5 deposit. We try one on 4th & F and it works. All the bikes come back.

Went to the media. Look it works. We solved the problem. No interest. Not newsworthy. What an eye-opener.

We did the bikes off and on for 15 years. It developed into the EARTH cycles and the non-profit EARTH was founded by Elaine Hammes and Mark Tillitson to receive Assembly funds.

The idea was lifted from the provosts in Denmark. They had a White Bike program, which also saw bicycles disappear. Some of their members checked out EARTH Cycles and said oh, this is how you do it. We will take the idea back. Years later we heard you can check out bicycles in the Danish national parks.

15 years ago Tom Fink became Mayor. He thought the \$5,000 per year to run the program was too much so it got axed.

In 1998 we were in Portland at a Saturday market on EARTH Day. A parade of over 100 yellow bikes was being released. The traffic signal stopped ½ the bicyclists as we crossed in the crosswalk. What a high.

In 1999 EARTH bought 20 one-speed bicycles and started the program with EARTH's resources. They now are being operated by the Downtown Youth Hostel at 7^{th} & H.

The revolution is a bicycle wheel.
