Despite the fact that a degree is the surest path out of poverty, **upper-income students** are nearly ten times more likely to graduate from college than their low-income peers.

+ COMMUNITY BENEFITS

Portland residents have dedicated ourselves to building a network of support for our young people and families most in need. **College graduates earn \$1 million more over a lifetime** than high school graduates and they're more likely to vote, wear seat belts, refrain from smoking, stay out of jail and engage in healthy, productive behavior¹. College Possible Portland is an investment consistent with our vision for the future.

+ ECONOMIC BENEFITS

By 2018, the **Portland metro area alone will require 123,000 new postsecondary educated workers.** Yet, within 10 miles of the city's center, nearly 15,000 high school students are eligible for the free and reduced lunch program and those low-income students are entering college at one-tenth the rate of their higher income peers. Additionally, a recent study found that less than 50% of Oregon high school students are prepared for college².

+ COLLEGE POSSIBLE: A PROVEN PARTNER, POISED TO HELP

+ PROVEN RESULTS

College Possible is closing the opportunity gap: 98% of our students earn admission to college and they go on to graduate at the same rate as students from all income levels nationwide. Overall our students are 10x more likely to earn a college degree than their low-income peers nationally. When a student joins our program we make an 8-year commitment to serve them through college graduation.
