RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO PROPOSED ENVIROMENTAL OVERLAY ZONING CODE AMENDMENT AT TERMINAL 6 TO ACCOMODATE PROPOSED PEMBINA EXPORT FACILITY

WHILE we acknowledge Pembina's safety record and appreciate their efforts to address the concerns of our community, we remain steadfast in opposition to amending the code to permit the proposed Pembina terminal. We cite the following ongoing concerns in support of our position:

THE QRA provided by Pembina and its consultants inadequately addresses the risks that occur while transporting propane by rail and boat. While Pembina has no direct control over these aspects of the endeavor, they none-the-less present the dangers of potential spills, explosions and fires that threaten our own infrastructure and populace as well as that of every community that borders on the river or the rails.

THE potential for terrorist targeting of the proposed facility, in addition to creating catastrophic risk to nearby communities, will likely require security zones around marine transport vessels that could seiously disrupt Columbia River commerce and recreation initialy from four to six days monthly and eventually from eight to twelve days monthly following the proposed expansion.

THE increased rail traffic, in addition to imposing risk and inconvenience on our communities, also limits rail capacity for Oregon's agricultural exports and other regionally manufactured products- thus benefiting foreign companies and foreign workers rather than creating local jobs and supporting local economies.

THE proposed site at Terminal 6 is prone to soil liquifaction that could cause tank failure during a predicted magnitude nine earthquake.

PEMBINA'S own QRA shows that a catastrophic event at the proposed terminal could put the safety of ST Johns and Hayden Island residents and businesses at risk. Its hazards extend to downtown Vancouver, Sauvie Island and the Interstate Bridge. The flammable vapor cloud could drift as far as 5.3 miles downwind.

THE propane moved through this facility would be a significant local and global carbon pollution source, generating 0.7% of Portlands CO2 emissions, and accounting for 0.01% of global CO2 emissions-figures that do not account for the additional emissions from extraction, refinment and transport; and there is no solid evidence to support the assertion that Pembina propane will play a significant role in displacing other fossil fuels once the propane reaches Asia.

The proposed terminal directly conflicts with Portland's Climate Action Plan, threatens Portland's ability to meet its own climate goals and undermines its leadership role and credibility as a climate action leader.

Allowing this terminal to be built will tarnish Portland's international reputation for sustainable planning.

THEREFORE let it be known that the ST JOHNS NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION:

THIS resolution was passed by unanimous assent on June 9th, 2015

STRONGLY OPPOSES the proposed environmental zoning amendment at Terminal 6 and STRONGLY URGES the Portland City Council to vote against the proposed zoning change.
