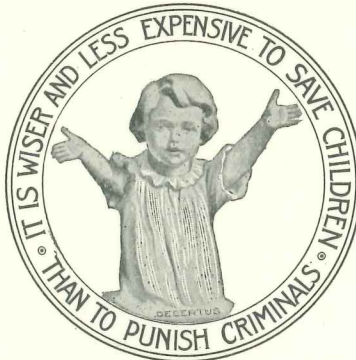

A LIST OF ASYLUMS AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN AND OLD PEOPLE.

Albertine Kerr Nursery 129 14th St. Virginia Clark matron. Cares for children of fallen mothers.

Baby Home Cor. E. 26th and Woodward Ave. Mrs. D.C. Buras, president. Receives children under three years who are dependent. Will take such children in some cases when paid for by mother. Also places babies for legal adoption.

Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, E. 29th and Irving Sts., Judge Gilbert president, ~~W.L. Gardner~~ superintendent. Cares for dependent children of the state when committed by the several juvenile courts of the state or surrendered by the parents. This is a homefinding society. The children when placed in family homes are systematically visited by paid agents to ascertain and report to the general office their condition and treatment. The agents of the society also investigate and prosecute if necessary all cases of abuse or neglect of children when reported to it from all parts of the state.

(Motto) Failing to find a refuge for a homeless child we will take it.

Children's Home 887 Corbett St. Under auspices of Ladies Relief Society, Mrs. Anna M.E. Mann president. Cares for orphans and half orphans from Multnomah County in some cases accepting such an amount of board as the parent or nearest friend are able to pay, or will accept children who are entirely destitute. Applications for admission must be made to the Board at the Home Thursday mornings.

Florence Crittenton Refuge Home 995 E. Glisan St. Mrs. Cleveland Rockwell president. Receives unfortunate girls who are about to become mothers. Cares for them through confinement and detains them for six months after baby is born so that they will learn to care for it. These girls and women are received from all parts of the state of Oregon and are given satisfactory care free of charge except when the applicant has enough money to pay a hospital fee of \$20/00, but this fee is not compulsory, neither is it demanded except in such cases as stated above. It is the effort of the management to find places at domestic service or some respectable employment for the inmates before discharging them, in case there are no relatives to look after them.

Trasler Home of Juvenile Court, 231 E. 52nd St., N. Cares for delinquent boys and girls of the juvenile court of Multnomah county, pending disposition of their cases by the court. This is a Multnomah County institution.

Fruit and Flower Mission Day Nursery 231-12th St. Mrs. E.C. Giltner president. Receives children under the age of seven years whose mothers have to go to work. These children are provided with dinner at eleven o'clock and another meal at four-thirty. The mission will care for them from seven in the morning until seven at night and the mother in such cases is supposed to pay ten cents per day for such care. There is an East side branch of this Mission situated at 368 E. Couch St.

A LIST OF ASYLUMS AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN AND OLD PEOPLE (CONTINUED)

House of the Good Shepherd, Catholic. E. 20th St., N. Southeast corner of E. Irving St. Sister Mary Steaenisnaus SUPERIOR. Home for delinquent girls. This home receives and cares for delinquent girls under the age of eighteen years, when committed by the Juvenile Courts of the state or surrendered by their parents. These girls are educated with a view of reformation. There is a steam laundry connected with the Institution where the girls are taught to work. Embroidery and all kinds of plain and fancy needlework are also taught in this institution. Common school education is given. Such girls remain in this institution from one to three years.

Louise Home for Girls' Rescue, 373 Cable St. Under the auspices of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protection Society. This Home rescues fallen girls taken from vicious environment.

St. Mary's Home for Boys, Catholic. Beaverton. This institution takes boys between the ages of four and fifteen, who are destitute or orphans, from any part of the State of Oregon.

St. Mary's Home for Girls, Catholic, Oswego. This institution receives girls over the age of four to fourteen who are destitute or homeless or orphans.

Old Peoples Home Sandy Rd. Southeast corner E. 33rd St., N. Home for old people of both sexes. The inmates in this institution are required to pay as an entrance fee the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) for which sum they are kept for life, provided, however, that if they should then or afterward have any property come to them by will or otherwise, they shall agree to divide the same with the Board of Trustees of the institution. Applications for admission must be made to the Board.

Home for the Aged situated on corner of 30th and E. Stark Sts. Catholic. Receives old people of both sexes committed from the different counties or brought in by relatives. Minimum charge for ward is \$15.00 per month provided they are mentally strong and not bedridden. Those bedridden, from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per day. Minimum for life home \$700.00 on the ward. \$1000.00 to \$1500.00 in private room.

Patton Home 975 Michigan Ave. Receives old ladies at the minimum rate of \$20.00 or will give them a life home for amount agreed upon.
