Purpose of proposed legislation and background information:

The purpose of the 2016 State Legislative Agenda is to advance the City's legislative priorities to the Oregon State Legislature. The Office of Government Relations opened the state legislative agenda building process in August 2015. One work session was held with Council, on December 1, 2015. This report will provide guidance for lobbying efforts during the 2016 State Legislative Session.

Financial and budgetary impacts:

Several items in the 2016 State Legislative Agenda could have a positive direct or indirect impact on City finances.

Community impacts and community involvement:

The City's 2016 State Legislative Agenda is focused on increasing access to housing, improving community livability and safety, supporting stable long-term revenue, and advocating for local authority. Successful implementation of the 2016 State Legislative Agenda will impact Portland residents by improving access to housing, economic opportunities, neighborhood livability and budget stability for critical infrastructure and public services. The Office of Government Relations, in partnership with the Office of Neighborhood Involvement, hosted a community event called "Advocacy 101" on December 2, 2015. The purpose of the event is to help community members become effective advocates at both the state and federal levels. The event featured a panel of state legislators, Portland City Commissioner Amanda Fritz and staff from Oregon's congressional delegation and was attended by more than 70 members of the public. The Office of Neighborhood Involvement conducted broad outreach to a diverse set of community groups and all neighborhood associations in advance of the event.
