Good morning Mayor and commissioners For the record Carl Wikman

After last years update
I received a number of phone calls and even two letters.
People asking what's the difference between satisfactory and good ?(hold up pieces) These are from the bridge, I'm not sure I know which is in good condition!

Commissioner Novik, thanks to you and Erika Nebel for arranging a very productive meeting with David Oh Long gee. He brought engineering plans and I brought photos.

We focused on the southwest corner

The issue, sidewalk flooding and roadway ponding. Cars send a continuous spray of water saturating the siding.

Lack of maintance allows water to go inundate the area. The drain's clogged with a silt and gravel; we went looking for the source and found it...

Who could tell that under these mounds of dirt and debris are culverts, gutter and catch basin. ...gravel washes down the road and flows on to the bridge.

On December 9th I got word the USGS was conducting a survey, I made my way past mudslides and fallen trees

They' re documenting record setting stream levels and flow volumes, to be used in computer modeling

USGS noted that the city may want to have the abutment inspected

On December 22, when the wreath was put up, I was greeted with this.. and after the torrential rains was concerned,

The closure was to make needed repairs and maintence .. First, removing a 2 and a half foot accumulation of debris..

daylighting 200 feet of gutter and a catch basin, an end to ponding, flooding and splashing!!!

asphalt was ground down to the wood sub road and then a water proof membrane was overlaid. thank you PBOT!

So, what else needs attention

The rotten interior panels, on both west and east sides

100 feet of pedestrian top rail

I'm willing to pay to have the bullet hole peppered signs replaced,

Graffitti continues to be an ongoing issue, but has lessened this year

Saturday marks the bridges grand opening.., please keep in mind that

Under Mayor Clark, the bridge site was identified as a scenic viewpoint,

in the adopted comprehensive plan, it's a goal 5 scenic resource, an enhancement to the city's appearance, making the city a better place

Under mayor katz, and then commissioner Hales Cedar Crossing was the cover girl for the outer south east plan, agreeing to protect the scenic and historic areas for future generations

I met a women who'd often go to Cedar Crossing with her grandpa. For a science fair they created a popsicle model. Now that 30 something women is a highway engineer. Maybe we can inspire more students.

Working with Happy Valley and clackamas county tourism to develop a route to highlight the areas unique attractions and features

Lastly, find a partner to conduct a photo contest

Cedar Crossing is the only example in the Portland metro area,

CEDAR CROSSING

This covered bridge, the first ever built in Maltnemah County, was dedicated January 16, 1982, by County Executive Donald E. Clark and Lea Wikman, chairwoman of Powelhurst Community Planning Group, as a nostalgic tribute to ingenious frontiersmen who built such structures throughout western Oregon in the 19th and 20th centuries.

This bridge was named by Ginell Lamont in a contest among David Eouglas School students.

The creek below is named for William Johnson who built a sawmill in Lents in the 1850's. The road commemorates WA Deardorf who petitioned the Courty to build the original road in 1858.
